

authorised and required, to cause to be published without delay in two of the daily newspapers, printed in the city of Baltimore, and in one newspaper in each of the counties in which a newspaper is printed, the several acts of the present session relating to licenses, and the coloured population of this state, provided that the expense thereof in no case shall not exceed the amount charged for such publication in the newspapers of the city of Baltimore, and to draw upon the treasurer of the western shore for the cost thereof.

Which was read the first and second time by special order, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate returned the bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Sam's Creek Rail Road Company, endorsed, "will pass;" ordered to be engrossed;

Also, the bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act of December session, 1827, chapter 117, entitled, An act to regulate the issuing of licenses to traders, keepers of ordinaries and others, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment," which amendment was twice read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed;

Also, the bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish Pilots, and regulate their fees, endorsed "will not pass;"

Also, the resolutions relative to paying the funeral expenses of Dr. Octavius Taney;

Also, the resolution relative to the public printing;

Also, the resolutions in favour of Andrew Slicer and John Quynn;

Also the resolutions in favour of William Hughlett and William M'Neir, severally endorsed, "assented to," ordered to be engrossed;

And delivered the following message:—

By the Senate,

March 14, 1832

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

As the proceedings of the senate are not published in the newspapers, and as we believed that it was important for the public to be apprised of them as promptly as possible, the senate, in consequence of application to that effect in behalf of the public, passed an order at an early period of the session authorising four copies of the journal to be daily furnished to each senator.

These copies have been punctually supplied by William M'Neir, the printer to the senate—and his account herewith sent is in conformity with the contract made by the

committee appointed under the order for the printing of the copies. These copies were ordered 100, to save the extra expense which would otherwise have been incurred of printing resolutions of the senate for distribution.

Which was read.

Mr Teackle submitted the following resolution:—

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the treasurer of the western shore be, and he is hereby authorised and directed to pay to William M'Neir, printer to the senate, or to his order, thirty-eight dollars and forty cents, for printing and furnishing sixty extra copies, daily, to the senate during the present session as per contract with the committee on printing on the part of the senate.

Which was read the first and second time by special order, and rejected.

Mr. Teackle submitted the following resolution:—

By the House of Delegates,

March 14th, 1832

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the treasurer of the western shore, pay to Jeremiah Hughes, or order, one hundred and forty one dollars, and thirty-one cents, for so much due to him for the printing of this house, since the closing of the journal of accounts.

The clerk of the senate delivered the following message:

By the Senate,

March 14th, 1832.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We beg leave to return to your honorable body, and respectfully submit to you the propriety of reconsidering the bill which you have rejected, entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, an act to provide a summary mode (as respects the city of Baltimore) of recovering possession of lands and tenements. This bill is of great importance to the rights of landlords as well as of tenants in that city; and for want of the provisions it contains, much individual loss and embarrassment is now daily suffered.

We trust that it may receive your favorable consideration, and submit it to you again at this protracted period of
