SENATOR MUSKIE, NATIONAL, STATE LEADERS TO CONFER AT HOPKINS. ENEY, MANDEL, TO SPEAK

BALTIMORE, Feb. 9--The Johns Hopkins University will host a conference on legislative and state government improvement this Wednesday and Thursday, February 14-15, featuring an address by United States Senator Edmund Muskie (D. Maine), expert in federal-state relations and chariman of the U.S. Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

The conference is co-sponsored by the University and the Citizens Conference on State Legislatures, under a grant from the Sears Foundation. The 2-day session will include legislative leaders, editors and publishers, civic, business and academic representatives from Maryland, Delaware, Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia.

According to J. Edward Day, former Postmaster General of the United States and Chairman of the Citizens Conference Board of Trustees, "the purpose of this meeting is to increase interest on the part of top-level policy makers and opinion leaders in the goal of strengthening their state legislatures and governments."

After a welcome to the Homewood campus by Dr. William Bevan, University Vice President for Academic Affairs, Mr. Day will deliver one of the plenary session addresses, "Federalism or Centralism: Action vs. Apathy." Also scheduled for major speeches are Senator Muskie, a former Governor of Maine, and Mr. Brady Black, editor of the Cincinnati Enquirer.

Presiding at the plenary sessions are Mr. Mark Collins, publisher of the Baltimore News-American; Mr. Price Day, editorin-chief of the Baltimore Sunpapers; and Mr. George S. Wills, chairman of the Citizens Commission on Maryland Government that has made recommendations for modernizing the General Assembly and is now studying local government operations under the sponsorship of the Greater Baltimore Committee.

Among the Maryland governmental leaders who will participate on three in-depth panel discussions are House of Delegates Speaker Marvin Mandel, Constitutional Convention President H. Vernon Eney, Comptroller Louis L. Goldstein, and Senate President William James.

MARYLAND CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION STRENGTHENS
THE LEGISLATIVE ARTICLE

Nearly three years of planning and work by the Constitutional Convention Commission followed by the Constitutional Convention of Maryland have resulted in a new constitution to be voted upon in referendum, April 12, 1968.

Should the proposed document be adopted, the General Assembly will benefit from a more flexible legislative article than is contained in the current constitution. The new provisions would remove salary limitations from the constitution and allow compensation to be set by statute. Legislative sessions would be lengthened and means would be available to extend the session for a maximum of sixty days. The new constitution also provides for a moderate reduction in the size of the two houses.

Other sections direct the General Assembly to establish a legislative agency to conduct post audit, require the governor to submit a program budget and allow the governor a "strike-or-reduce" item veto on appropriation bills.

In the attached chart, selected provisions of the proposed and the current constitutions are compared.

#### CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Legislature shall prescribe by law a code of ethics.

#### STAFF

Legislature shall prescribe by law for legislative post audits and the auditor is to be elected by the assembly and shall serve at their pleasure. No provisions.

#### GOVERNOR'S VETO

1. Governor has no pocket veto.

- 1. Governor did have pocket veto.

# Legislative Improvement Sought

Legislative improvement won the backing of Maryland political leaders yesterday at a conference held at the Johns Hopkins University.

Delegate Marvin Mandel (D., 5th Baltimore), speaker of the House of Delegates, and Louis L. Goldstein, State comptroller, agreed that the Legislature has failed to operate to its full potential during past years.

"But things are improving," said Mr. Mandel, who added that the Maryland Assembly has, in the last two or three years, "begun to reassume some of its policy-making role."

Goldstein Favors Higher Pay Robert Steadman, director of the committee for improvement of management of the Committee for Economic Development, told the gathering there is room for improvement in almost every State legislature.


Mr. Steadman was among those who testified on governmental reorganization at Maryland's Constitutional Convention.

Mr. Goldstein, while pointing to improvements over a longer period of time-including when he was president of the State Senate-agreed, and said one major need is for higher pay for legislators.
