WESTERN SHORE TREASURY,
Annapolis, January 20th, 1830:

To the Honorable
the House of Delegates
of Maryland,

In obedience to your order of the 6th instant, received here the 15th, the Treasurer for the Western Shore has prepared, and submits the enclosed lists, of all balances or sums due to the State, from the clerks and sheriffs of the several counties on this Shore, or from others chargeable in his office—shewing when they became due, what process, if any, has been used for their recovery, and, as far as he is informed, the present state of them, and the suits therefor.

The several enactments of the General Assembly, by chapter 127 of November session 1809, and Resolution No 38 of 1818, providing for the collection of the Revenue by the Treasurers, respectively, were successively superseded by the act of 1816, chapter 271, and by chapters 190 of 1821 and of 139 of 1825, confiding its collection to special agents.

These, in pursuance of the enactments last aforesaid, reported their proceedings to the General Assembly only, and therefore, in reference to the sums yet due, which accrued before 1st December, 1828, but little authentic information, either of the proceedings had for their recovery or their probable issue, has reached the Department.

The partial repeal of these laws as of that day, by the acts of 1827, chapters 188 and 217, left the future course,
