

large enough to hold all the ordnance, and that all the artillery and carriages &c. ought to be placed therein and safely locked up, so that no access can be had to them, without the knowledge of the armourer; we are further of the opinion, that we have amongst us, a population not too good to make a much more improper use of the artillery than has ever yet been made of it. For the foregoing reasons, we think the sooner such a building is erected the better.
