*To Brigadier General James Sewall,*

SIR:

In obedience to your order, bearing date of the 22d inst. directing me to "detach from my regiment one hundred men, well armed and equipped, and with ball and cartridge, to march to Charlestown to suppress a riot." I beg leave to report, that having received the order above alluded to, at 3 o'clock, A. M., and having enlisted the aid of several active citizens, in five hours we had a full company armed and equipped, as well as the nature of the case, and circumstances would admit, and at half past eight o'clock, A. M., took up our line of march at North East, six miles distant—we took into custody five men suspected as rioters—we next proceeded to Serey's Contract, distant from Charlestown two miles—here we found, and made prisoners of ten or twelve more, Serey amongst the rest, most of those by gun shot wounds and bruises bore incontestible evidence of participation in the late riot—having secured our prisoners with a sufficient guard, we proceeded to Charlestown, the scene of the riot—here we arrived about two o'clock, P. M. when all was tranquil, the only evidence of riot, was to be seen in broken windows, and bullet marks, both in and out of doors—we remained here until after six o'clock in the evening, during which time, the civil authorities were arduously engaged in an examination of the prisoners which we had brought in, which resulted in the commitment of the principal part—they being placed in the hands of the Sheriff.
