

The Board of Trustees, in their memorial, allude to unhappy collisions, in which the Faculty participated. There however, it will be borne in mind, occurred in relation to fiscal affairs in regard to which, your memorialists seek no power.

Your Memorialists fully concur with the Trustees in their commendations of the judicious management of the fiscal concerns of the Infirmary by its assiduous Governor, S. Eting, Esq. and would at once dispossess your minds of the impression conveyed by the Trustees in their memorial, that the Faculty desire to interfere in those matters, by declaring that they seek no power, in relation to such pecuniary affairs and are willing that the form of the bill introduced should preclude it.

The memorial of the Trustees would also imply that your memorialists seek an influence in the government of the academical and other departments. To their argument founded on this presumption, it is unnecessary to reply, as the Faculty make no such petition.

Your memorialists believe that no difficulty can occur in forming a bill which shall so modify the charter as to give to the Medical Faculty seats in the board, with power to act, in relation to all medical appointments and removals—all modifications of the duties of the several chairs—the duties of the demonstrator—the appointment or removal of the jointor, &c.

Your Memorialists cannot conceive how a participation of the Faculty thus far in the government of the Medical Department, can, in any manner compromise the general prosperity of the University, declared in the memorial of the Trustees. Your memorialists cannot but be persuaded that, if they are unworthy of the confidence which they ask, and of being associated with the Board in securing the prosperity of the Department to which they are attached, they are alike unworthy to occupy the chairs with which they have been honored.

The Medical Faculty further solicit your indulgence in regard to a pecuniary obligation under which they lie to the State. It will be remembered that they pay annually into the treasury, the sum of \$1500, as the interest of a debt incurred by the Faculty, in a loan from the State thirteen years since. The money thus obtained by the Faculty was employed by them in completing the build-
