Your Committee further report, that they have also examined the proceedings and documents of the said Treasurer, in reference to several funds confided to his care, and find from an account settled 1st Dec. 1836, by the Committee of Claims of the last General Assembly, there then remained in the Treasury to the credit of the funds, \$17,164 02 cents, cash.

That it appears to your Committee, by the accounts of the said Treasurer, he has received from 1st Dec. 1836, to 1st Dec. 1837,

On account of the Free Schools Fund,	-	\$32,917
And on account of the Sinking Fund,	-	44,317

Amounting to \$77,234

That it appears to your Committee the said Treasurer has disbursed in the same time the sum of sixty-nine thousand four hundred and twenty-six dollars and twenty three cents, viz:

On account of the Free Schools' Fund, he paid to certain accounts as set forth in the accompanying account current,	\$24,833
And on account of the Sinking Fund, he invested	44,384

For all which payments and investments he has presented to your Committee satisfactory vouchers.

He has also shown to the satisfaction of your Committee, by the exhibition of proper vouchers, that in the same time he converted \$58,888 06 cents of the special deposit belonging to the Sinking Fund, into \$59,156 1 cent of the State's 5 per cent Stock as directed by ch. 299 of the acts of Dec. session 1834, and by an authentic certificate, that on the 1st Dec. 1837, there remained
