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Maryland Editorial Convention.

Pursuant to a call, the Convention of Editors of the State of Maryland met at the Temperance Temple, Annapolis, on Tuesday evening, the 21st ultimo, at 8 o'clock.

On motion of G. W. P. Smith, late of the *Washington County Herald*, Geo. W. Wilson, of the *Montgomery Sentinel*, was elected President.

On motion of H. Vandorfer, of the *Cecil Democrat*, G. W. P. Smith, was appointed Secretary.

The object of calling the convention having been stated by the President, on the motion of J. Schofield, of the *Talbot Enterprise*, seconded by H. Vandorfer, a committee to prepare business for the Convention to-morrow was proposed and adopted.

The President appointed as the committee, Messrs. J. Schofield, H. Vandorfer, J. E. Martin, J. Shaw, of the *Cecil Democrat*, and E. Wells, of the *Port Tobacco Times*.

On motion, the Convention adjourned for business until 11 o'clock on Wednesday morning, and for generous hospitality to the residence of Thos. J. Wilson, Esq., of the *Annapolis Gazette*, where a pleasant social time was enjoyed.

At 11 o'clock on Wednesday morning the Convention met, when the chairman of the committee on business reported a series of resolutions, which were unanimously adopted, and the following taken up, and a pleasant discussion on each prior to their adoption:

W. Wilson was nominated and unanimously elected. For Recording and Corresponding Secretary, J. Schofield was nominated and unanimously elected. For Treasurer, J. S. Downs was nominated and unanimously elected.

MARYLAND LEGISLATURE.

ANAPOLIS, Feb. 20, 1890.

SENATE.—Mr. Davall presented an order of the President of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company to furnish the names and residences of holders of bonds and scrip of the company; which was adopted.

Mr. Davall had leave to introduce a bill for the appointment of an additional magistrate in Montgomery county.

Mr. Goldsborough, of Talbot, reported an act amending the code of public laws relative to county commissioners, giving them power to reduce assessments—lost by 9 yeas to 8 nays. Reconsidered.

Mr. Gardiner reported an act to repeal sections 470 to 531, inclusive, of article 1, of the public laws, relative to tobacco inspections, and substituting sections carrying out the suggestions of the joint committee appointed to examine the condition of the State tobacco warehouses.

Mr. Goldsborough, of Talbot, reported a bill to incorporate the Baltimore city passenger railway company, was referred to the Senate, and referred to the committee on corporations.
