THE CAMPAIGN NOT OPENED.

It is very evident that the Presidential campaign will not fairly commence until after the adjourned meeting of the Democratic Convention. There is a positive holding back, an uncertainty all over the country. The great controlling element which has to be led the way in these quarrelsome battles, says a contemporary, is not yet marshalled into the ring. People generally have not "made up their mind."

DEATH OF WM. C. PRESTON, OF S. C.

This gentleman died at Columbia, S. C., on the 22d ultimo. He was born in Philadelphia in 1794, while his father was attending Congress in that place as a member from Virginia. He was educated at the University of South Carolina, where he graduated in 1812. He studied law in the office of Wm. Wirt of Richmond, and subsequently took up his residence in South Carolina, from which State he was, in 1824, elected to the House of Representatives. In 1832, in the very midst of the nullification strife, he was elected to the Senate of the United States, John C. Calhoun being his colleague, and at once assumed a position among the first-class orators and debaters. He held a seat in the Senate for ten years, and resigned in 1842.

Mr. Lincoln appears to be a man after Joshua R. Giddings's own heart, and a brutal abolitionist as he is. That old fanatic has made a speech at Oberlin, warmly commending Lincoln to the support of the abolitionists of the neighborhood, and has also written a letter to the honoree expressing his pleasure at the nomination. The following is the note: "DEAR LINCOLN: You're nominated. You will be elected. After your election thousands will crowd around you, claiming rewards for services rendered. I, too, have my claims upon you. I have not worked for your nomination, nor that of any other man. I have labored for the establishment of principles; and when men came to me asking my opinion of you, I only told them 'Lincoln is an honest man.' All I ask of you in return for my services is, make my statement good throughout your administration. Yours, GIDDINGS."

Giddings also says that Lincoln, in Congress, was his bosom friend. Yes, and they voted together; and the latter now comes before the country as the representative of the Giddings doctrine.

THE CRAWFORD ADMINISTRATION CASE. This case is now pending in the Charles County Court, Judge Crain, in session at Port Tobacco. We are informed by an intelligent gentleman, who has just returned from the Court, that the case is based upon a claim for letters of administration. Dr. David A. Crawford, of Prince George county, died intestate, leaving an estate valued at \$220,000 to \$300,000. Dr. Blackwell, of Virginia, a cousin of the deceased, applied to the Orphans' Court of Prince George county for letters of administration as the eldest son. There he was met with the application of George T. Crawford, natural son of Thomas Crawford, deceased, a brother of the late Dr. Crawford, who claimed the letters of administration as the legal son of Thomas Crawford, and entitled to administer. Upon this question of legitimacy the Orphans' Court was unable to decide and appointed Dr. Blackwell administrator for the time, and made up the issue which was sent to the county court for settlement. The Crawford case to remove the case to the Charles County Court, where the trial is now pending. Fourteen lawyers, chosen among the highest of the Maryland bar, are engaged in the trial. It is said that a hard contest may be expected. — Washington Star, of the 24th ult.

THE STATE TOBACCO WAREHOUSES.—The "Plaster's Advocate," of the 23rd inst., publishes a notice, inviting the tobacco planters of Prince George's county to attend a public meeting, to be held in Upper Marlboro' to-day, for the purpose of "taking into consideration the subject of the removal of the State Tobacco Warehouses in the city of Baltimore, and to take such steps as may induce the Commissioners to decline to carry into effect the late act of the Legislature on this subject."

LANDS IN ST. MARY'S COUNTY.—The Leonardtown (Md.) Beacon states that John D. Long, of the Eastern Shore, Oscar Miles, Geo. H. Morgan, L. W. B. Hutchins and Uriah Tippett, of St. Mary's county, have obtained warrants from the land office at Annapolis for two hundred thousand acres of land under the waters immediately surrounding St. Mary's county, and that Benjamin Tippett is now engaged making surveys for the company.

WE learn that the friends of Messrs. DELL and EVERETT, in this county, intend to hold a ratification meeting, in this place, on the 10th instant. Great preparations are being made for a grand rally. No notice of this meeting has been sent us for publication, or we would, with great pleasure, have published it.

CEASUS.—Mr. WATKINS, the U. S. Marshal for this District, has appointed Wm. Thompson, of R., his deputy, to take the census in the First and Fourth districts of this county; Joseph A. Tarter to take the Second and Third, and Wm. M. Glassy, to take the Fifth.

THE EDITORIAL UNION OF MARYLAND. We learn that this body will assemble in Baltimore on Tuesday next, with a view to a further organization and the transaction of business.

THE JAPANESE EMBASSY.

The dinner given by the President on Friday to the Japanese Embassy is said to have gratified the "distinguished strangers." The States says: "The ambassadors had been driven about the city that they might leave cards at the residence of the Senators. The 'cards' are pieces of mulberry bark paper, about six inches long by three, on each of which were inscribed the names of the three Kamis, in Japanese and in English characters. They are now formally installed in the diplomatic corps at our republican court.

On their recent visit to market they were delighted with the articles exposed for sale, and indulged in many exclamations of surprise. The butcher's stalls they turned away in disgust, but they made a careful examination of the fish market, being extasies of the finny race. A gigantic halibut, brought from Boston market, in ice, was to them a marvel, but they recognized rock fish, flounders, crabs and lobsters. Terrapins seemed familiar, as did chickens, pigeons and ducks. Butter and cheese they regarded with indifference, as they use no dairy products, or even milk. The vegetables they examined carefully, recognizing lettuce, radishes, beans, peas, and all these they are very fond of, and the United States Agricultural Society is having prepared for them a collection of garden seeds to carry to Japan. They say that our rice is not equal to theirs, but that our vegetables are better. Strawberries, now abundant here, they do not fancy.

After breakfast on Friday the party received their week's washing, from the steam laundries of the hotel. There were upwards of 500 pieces, and the "washing list," written in Japanese characters, was a curiosity in itself. The dignitaries wear under garments of raw silk, while those of the retainers are of cotton.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN is a man of fifty-one years of age, who in early life was in humble circumstances, and got part of his living by splitting rails. "Old Abe," as they call him out West, and the rails, which he split are now in a fence on a farm near Chicago. One of these rails has already been taken to Ohio, and it is said Tom Corwin will stamp the State, carrying the rail on his shoulder. A letter from Illinois says: "The old fence at Decatur is being bought up at ten dollars per rail, and forwarded by express to all parts of the country. The lucky owner of the timber has turned his possession to account rather more wisely than was fitting the occasion, but nothing can illustrate the irrepressible desire for 'those rails.' Major Eggleston, president of the Cincinnati board of trade, paid his twenty dollars for a pair of them."

CHILDREN SCORCHED BY HOT SOAP.—The Port Tobacco Times records the death of three children, under circumstances of painful mystery. It says: "Died at Cedar Point, in Charles county, on the 23d of April, George, in the 11th year of his age; on the 20th of the same month, Benton, in the 6th year of his age; on the 27th of the same month, James, in the 4th year of his age, child of John H. and Elizabeth H. Burroughs. The circumstances attending the death of these three children—the suddenness and short period of illness—their previous good health, and other reasons, induce their friends to believe that they met their untimely end at the hands of the poisoner—how, or by whom the poison was administered, is not positively known."

ONE OF THE METEORIC STONES.—The Ohio State Journal of the 18th, speaking of the recent meteoric showers in Guernsey county, of that State, says: "One of the meteorites has been laid upon our table by Mr. John Burdick, of this city, who dug it from its concealment in the bosom of the earth on his farm in Guernsey county. The meteorite weighed a black, wedge-shaped mass of conglomerate rock, with a very mysterious smell. The meteor weighs just nine pounds, and was seen to descend like a streak of lightning, blazing like molten iron. It penetrated the earth about a foot and a half, leaving a huge hole."

THE KEY WEST CORRESPONDENCE of a New York paper says that the crew of the United States steamer, killed five of the negroes to keep them quiet. "The William left the Congo river six days before the Wildfire, having on board 700 slaves, and arrived here with 513—33 died after capture, on their passage here."

THE CATTLE DISEASE.—The cattle disease now raging in eastern Massachusetts, prevailed in England from 1744 to 1755. In Nottinghamshire 40,000 head of cattle died in six months; in Cheshire 30,000. During the third year of the disease 1,135,000 were paid out of the public treasury as a recompense for slaughtered cattle. In 1857, in forty-three villages in Holland, 14,000 head of cattle died or were killed.

ANOTHER SLAYER CAPTURED.—On Tuesday the Government received intelligence from Lieut. Moffit, commanding the United States steamer Crusader, that he had captured another slaver off the coast of Cuba, with four hundred and fifty slaves on board, and had taken them into Key West.

DEATH OF REV. THEODORE PARKER.—The Arabs bring intelligence of the decease of this divine, who sailed for Europe some months since, in the hope of regaining his health.

The Chicago Journal says: "We have Mr. Lincoln's authority for saying that his name is Abraham."

The tallest man in the Chicago convention was Mr. Baugh, a fine specimen of the genus Homo, measuring six feet and seven inches in his toes.
