COUNTY MASS MEETING.

Parsons to public call the city of Georgetown, D. C., on the 10th of January, 1861, at the Court-House, in Rockville, to confer with each other upon the political condition of the country, and to adopt such measures as in their judgment the exigencies of the times demand.

It was probably the latest meeting that ever assembled in the county, and was organized, on motion of Wm. H. Howard, Esq., President, and J. T. Vason, Secretary.

The President, on assuming the chair, made a calm, dispassionate and patriotic address, on motion of E. J. Hall, Esq., it was Resolved, That the Vice-Presidents be selected from each election district of the county.

Whereupon, the following gentlemen were appointed: Vice-Presidents, Griffith, Jr., and E. J. Hall, of Cricklin District; Zachariah Waters and Robert Sellman, of Harkburg; Wm. H. Howard and John H. Gassner, of Medley; Samuel C. Vels and Samuel T. Rousset, of Rockville; and Pannel Palmer and Benjamin Bush Roberts, of Berry.

On motion, John T. Vason, Secretary, Robert W. Carter, John T. Benson, and George H. Bradlock, Esqs., were appointed assistant secretaries.

On motion of Wm. V. Baine, Esq., it was Resolved, That a committee of two from each election district be appointed by the county convention, to be organized on the 10th of January, 1861, to report to the convention on the 15th of the same month.

Thereupon the chairman appointed: Richard J. Bowie, Wm. V. Baine, Samuel Eggs, J. H. Allen, B. Davis, Francis Miller, Benjamin C. Waters, Robert C. DeLoach, Howard Griffith, and Benjamin C. Gott, Esqs., a committee to report business.

On motion, the convention took recess of one hour. On the reconvening at 2 o'clock, on motion, the chair appointed Mr. A. H. Summers, Col. Thomas P. Archer, and George P. Lee, to wait on the committee and ascertain when they would report business to the meeting; who announced that the committee would report to the meeting in fifteen minutes.

The committee, through their chairman, Hon. Richard J. Bowie, made the following report: Profoundly sympathizing with our fellow-citizens of the South, in their views on the constitutional question, and in their determination to resist by force any attempt to deprive them of their rights of life, liberty and property, we have the honor to report to you that we have been unable to reach a unanimous conclusion on the subject of the proposed amendments to the Constitution of the United States, which would deprive a citizen of the right of service or labor in any State, without his consent, or of the right to sue in any court, or to hold any office, or to enjoy any franchise, or to exercise any other right, which he may lawfully acquire.

increased and become foremost among the nations of the earth. Their union has been justly secured, domestic tranquility secured, the common defense provided, the general welfare promoted, and the blessing of liberty secured, in a higher degree, than any other nation or people have ever enjoyed.

The Supreme Court is a common tribunal for determining all questions arising under the Constitution—the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority. Their jurisdiction extends to controversies between two or more States—between a State and the citizens of another State—between citizens of different States, &c., and their judgment and decrees are enforced by the Executive, with the whole power of the Government, if necessary.

A government thus constituted, provides for the peaceful solution of all difficulties arising within its territorial jurisdiction. Any provision or abuse of its authority, it will promptly dissolve—no willow bends from its grasp, and it will not be broken, until it is broken by its own weight, or by the force of a superior power, or by the force of a superior power, or by the force of a superior power.
