

hopery, were very real, that their objects had been notoriously combined with every war since the revolution, except that of seven years, that when Lord Bellingbroke and Ormond were abroad with the Pretender, and Sir W. Wyndham, with many others of note and property were engaged in the Stuart cause, then was real danger; besides actual rebellion in 1715. It was pretended that property was in danger now, but would not the Jacobites have confiscated the property of those who adhered to the house of Hanover? Then the Habeas Corpus might have been suspended; but the persons lately exposed to its operation were obscure people, without property, consideration, means, or even zeal. It was absurd to suppose that a revolution could be begun with such people. These Catalines from whom Mr. Pitt pretended to have saved the state, were not of the rank of the Romans, they had not arms actually in the field, nor any thing like their resources. All history, even that of the French Revolution at its commencement, showed that it was with men of property, influence, and reputation, that they must begin. To pick out obscure, nameless individuals, as dangerous, was a mockery, and could be done for nothing but wanton oppression, or to excite fanciful alarms.

As to the argument, that the disaffected now were more formidable from their want of property, he could not see that want of property conferred any superior ability or means for the execution of turbulent and destructive designs! Mr. Fox then demonstrated that all the great states of Europe had escaped the ravages of Jacobinism as well as us, and that the ministers of Prussia and Austria might equally claim the thanks of their respective countries; that it was only the small states, not the great ones, that had been subdued, and that too by arms. It was the spirit infused into France, the universal military ardour excited by unjust confederacy, that had enabled France thus to overrun so many states. He showed, that during the confusion of the civil wars in Charles the first's time, other nations had not attempted to make war against us on the pretext of the principles which then prevailed here. He reproached the impious and blasphemous pretence of fighting for religion, social order, &c. when, after various negotiations, mere terms only were discussed, and these venerable names were merely usurped to color the cause and to inflame the passions of men.

Mr. Fox then considered the superior advantages of our situation for negotiating with weight in 1800, and dwelt with much severity on the insolent insulting letter of Lord Grenville. Alluding to Egypt, of which Lord Hawkesbury mentioned the French being in possession in 1800 Mr. Fox paid high compliments to Sir Sidney Smith, both as an officer and negotiator. [Sir S. S. was under the gallery], and said, that if the French had Egypt it was because we compelled them to remain there. He afterwards ridiculed, with great success, the unexampled attempt to bolster up a vote of thanks—He said that in future times, people on finding a vote of thanks to Lord Chatham (who must be included) would certainly conceive it to be a mistake of the date, and set down 1763 for 1802. He likewise ridiculed the *quid pro quo's* that would arise, from commending William Pitt the son with William Pitt the father.

He next took a view of the late Minister's financial system, and strongly reprobated the income tax. Adverting to the encroachments on the Constitution, he admitted that occasions (to be carefully watched, however,) might justify temporary abridgments of Liberty, but if the Rights of the People were to be lightly taken away in every war and on flimsy pretext, not a shadow of Freedom would remain. He touched with great force on the state of Ireland, when insurrection, ready to burst forth, was subdued by such severities. He admitted that cruelties had disgraced both parties, so that it was difficult to say which inspired most horror. The atrocities in some cases of the insurgents or the cruelties with which they were suppressed. He showed the evils that had been from the recal of Lord Fitzwilliam, and asked if the late minister was to be thanked both for sending horror at the use of torture to extort confession, and his astonishment that in an age like this, torture should be justified by grave and learned characters. He said that the terms of peace were in themselves very alarming in many respects, but that he ascribed to the war. No man could view the aggrandizement of France without dismay and anxiety. The war too had destroyed that connection with the continent, and influence in Europe, which, well understood and applied, was of so much importance. As a Whig he could not but lament the change. The system of the advances in this reign had produced two great catastrophes: the separation of America, by straining power too close, and the dissolution of continental connections, by improperly directing it to the purposes of pillage and plunder. This was because the system never contemplated any thing but the extension of power, and totally overlooked or opposed the interests of Liberty. After many other observations, he concluded a speech that equally delighted the house by its weight, and enlightened by its argument, with saying that he could neither support the original motion nor the amendment.

The House divided on the original motion—For it 52—Against it 924.

NEW-YORK, JULY 13.

We are in receipt of the politeness of Captain S. S. S. of the ship Levant from St. Petersburg, for Hamburg papers to the 21st May, from which we have translated the three following letters.

Extract of a letter from Brussels, dated May 13.

Orders have been just received to procure for the First Consul and his suite, also for the deputies of the 9th departments of Belgium and the 4 departments of the Rhine, who are to assemble here in the course of next month. The First Consul will remain in this city 10 or 12 days, from whence he will afterwards set out for Antwerp.

Extract of a letter from the Hague, dated 15th May.

We have at length received, last evening, the Ratification from France, which was exchanged with ours in Paris on the 11th of this month. Peace will be proclaimed this day at the sound of the trumpet; and to-morrow the consul of state will make public the proclamation on that subject addressed to the Batavian people.

The long expected ordinance relative to the loan of 30 millions, has at last appeared the day before yesterday. Therein it is said that all the persons who have subscribed to it, but who have not paid any money, shall be erased from the subscription list. This measure appears so much more disagreeable to many persons, as they had procured considerable sums on very high interest for the purpose of placing it in that loan. Government has been obliged to raise it to 33 millions, on account of having received so much money that they cannot return the surplus to the subscribers without allowing some compensation for it.

The frigate Colon and a brig have sailed from Middlebourg, for Essequibo and Demerara.

Extract of a letter from Hanover, dated 15th May.

Baron de Rheden, envoy extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of his Majesty the Elector of Brunswick Lunenburg, near the court of Berlin, has again presented to the Prussian Minister a pressing note relative to the pretensions of his Britannic Majesty upon the bishoprics of Hildesheim and Osnaburg, as well as on the abbey of Corvey.—His excellency announces, at the same time, that the king, his master, was desirous that due regard should be paid to this note at the time of arranging the secularization and indemnities.

CHARLESTON, July 3.

Yesterday arrived the ship Shepherds, Prince, Philadelphia, 8 days; brig Mary, Hall, Bayonne, 44 days; brig Polly and Nancy, Brown, Baltimore, 11 days; ship Susannah, Forrester, Baltimore, 10 days; schr. active, Kelly, Kingston, 28 days, in distress bound to New-York; schr. Diana, Mead, Cape-Francois, 10 days; lugger Viper, Stilwell, Cape-Francois, 11 days.

By the arrival of the schooner Diana from the Cape, we learn, that Toussaint, with his wives, children, aids, &c. were all sent to France by general Ledere; they sailed about twenty days before capt. Mead left it. Ever since the arrest of Toussaint, every thing had been very tranquil in St. Domingo; a great number of planters were returning to their plantations, and the towns in the island were building up very fast. The yellow fever was very prevalent at the Cape amongst the troops and foreigners, and in my officers and soldiers fell victims to it.
