City of Baltimore. An ORDINANCE appropriating a sum of money for the alteration of the grades of Pitt-street, Wapping-street, and High-street.

WHEREAS it appears that by the present establishment of the grades of said streets, a nuisance, dangerous to the health of the city, is produced, therefore,

be it enacted and ordained by the mayor and city council of Baltimore, That the city commissioners be and they are hereby authorised and directed to alter the grades of Pitt and Wapping streets, in such manners as that they will receive and discharge the water of High-street, and so to alter and repave High-street as will discharge the water into those streets; provided, that the proprietors of each and every lot before which such alteration may be made, binding on such parts of those streets the grades of which were established by the special commissioners of Baltimore town, shall give their consent thereto, and that the said commissioners draw on the register of the city for a sum not exceeding six hundred dollars for the purpose aforesaid.

Notice is hereby given, that it has been deemed expedient to change the form of the Mediterranean Passport issued to vessels of the United States; that from the eighth day of July next; those of the new form will be issued at the custom houses to every vessel, for which application may be made on a compliance with the terms prescribed by law and surrendering the former passport of which she may be possessed, if any, in which latter case no fees will be required for the exchange; and that by an arrangement agreed upon by the Barbary powers, with whom we are at peace, either the old or the new form of passport will be sufficient to protect the vessels of the United States, from capture until the 1st of July 1805, after which the old form of passport will be unavailable and the new one alone in use.
