JUDGE BOWEN'S CHARGE.

As much agitation has been excited, from Georgia to Maine, by the very reprehensible nature of some sentiments contained in a charge delivered by Judge Bowen to the Grand Jury of Chatham County...

Gentlemen of the Grand Jury.

The period has at length arrived, when the citizens of Georgia shall hear from the bench sentiments which ought long since to have been promulgated in the legislature. Why is it that the silence of the grave has hitherto pervaded every description of men, on a subject so highly important as that on which I am about to address you?

Avarice! How dreadful may be thy consequences! Unnatural love! That exposes its objects to the justly irritated passions of an oppressed and abused people.

Long have your eyes been closed to the dangers that surround you; enough have you been misled and deceived; in vain will the laws of our country enact injustice, and authorize oppression...

But although I love my country much, very much, yet I love, I adore the principles of liberty, of justice and humanity; and I will no longer acknowledge that my country, where these sound principles are thus prostrated by such accursed avarice, such infamous conduct...

I have delivered these sentiments after the most mature and deliberate reflection, and I solemnly swear, in the presence of God, who created and who knows my heart, that if, stretched on the bed of death, I should be called upon to advise on the proper method to secure the safety and tranquility of this country, I should dictate what I have now expressed to you.

It is not on principles only that I will assail the detestable system; for principles of justice and humanity, when opposed to the dictates of avarice and the desire of lordly power, have ever had but little avail. Else why in a country which boasts of republican magnanimity, and loudly of the rights of man, whence is it that this discharge, this curse on our land, still exists?

LONDON, May 10. number of Frenchmen immolated by the brave sons of nature, in their own defence; enough to appal the stoutest heart? And who is there that does not justify them? From my very soul I have wished them success from the commencement of their career, and I glory that so numerous and so oppressed a portion of my fellow creatures have bravely asserted the rights which God and nature gave them...

Let our legislature enact, that every female slave, born after one year from the date of the law, shall be free at 18 years of age, and the male at 21—and let the master be obliged to bring them up in the practice of religious and moral duties, and teach them the common rudiments of education. What would be the consequence? At the expiration of 19 years perhaps one thousand females would have a right to demand their liberty, and three years afterwards one thousand males...

But what good would be derived from an union of talents, with an union of principles and sentiments? What cordially could there be in a Cabinet composed of Mr. Pitt, the Grenvilles, and the Foxes? What measure could they adopt? They might all be in one Administration, but would they not in sentiments and opinions be all running in different ways?

NEWBURYPORT, July 17. Captain Dagget, arrived yesterday from Marseilles, informs, that while he lay in that port, Captain Jackson arrived there from Massena, and acquainted him, that he had seen a letter from Mr. Gibbs of Palermo, which mentioned that the Tunisians had formally declared war against the United States on the 16th of March...

At letter from Petersburg of the 25th April, says, "Count Woronzow, our minister at the court of London, is recalled, to fill a place in our ministry. The next courier from England is expected to bring an answer, which will be immediately followed by a declaration of war against France. From St. Thomas, June 26. A correspondent who has lately arrived in this country, from St. Thomas, remarks, "That the markets at that place are dull for almost every article of American production, and little or no vent for Dry Goods, there being scarcely any trade with the Spanish Maine, or colonies, owing to the vigilance of the Spanish privateers in intercepting the contraband trade, which hitherto has been the chief support of the markets at St. Thomas. Articles of export are also scarce. The price of Coffee, 1st quality, is 24 cts. 2d do. 22, triage, 12 a 13; Sugars, 8 a 10 dills. Hides, 9 a 10 cts. pr. lb. Indigo, 1st quality, 2 dls. 2d do. 175 cents. Logwood, 65 a 70 dls. ton; Fustic, 37 a 40 dls. ton. Tortoise shell, 4 a 5 dls. per lb.

The Latest. Yesterday arrived at this port ship Aurora, Follansbe, 35 days from Liverpool; by her we have received a London paper of the 5th June, with two or three of previous dates; from a cursory perusal we find nothing of very great moment. On the subject of Bonaparte's assuming a royal title, the London Sun of the 1st ult. observes:— "On the 20th ult. Bonaparte was proclaimed emperor in Paris. Such is the end of what was called the Republican Constitution of France, which is now represented to have been only an experiment. This experiment, which cost so many hundred thousand lives, and produced scenes of horror unprecedented in the civilized world, has not been found to answer, and France ends exactly where she began—with an absolute monarchical government. It is rather singular that two of Bonaparte's brothers, Lucien and Jerome, do not share in the general elevation of their family; they remain simple citizens, and are excluded from the succession to the empire."

Philadelphia, July 20. Captain Clark, of the schooner Sukey and Polly, arrived at the Lazaretto, brings information of the defeat of the Haytian Army, near St. Domingo, by the French and Spaniards, with the loss of 3000 men. The ship Orion, in 54 days from London, was spoken, last Sunday afternoon, going into Portsmouth, N. H. By this arrival, news may be expected from Europe of several days later date than our former accounts. The events which have taken place, both in France and in England, are of bold and commanding a nature, not to excite the liveliest interests in the public mind, and to have rendered every transatlantic event, at this critical moment, of the highest importance.
