FROM AMSTERDAM.
Arrived at Boston on the 6th inst. the ship Tamerlane, captain Seward, in 60 days from Amsterdam. Captain Seward brings papers to the 5th of May; the news from France is such as we have already received, with the addition that the coronation of Bonaparte had taken place. (Incorrect) Great naval preparations were still going on for the invasion, but there were very few troops in that neighbourhood. Government has prepared 200 sail of large vessels, as transports, but they have no men to navigate them. Nine vessels of upwards of 600 tons burthen are lying at the Texel loaded with gunpowder. The well informed at Amsterdam are decidedly of opinion that the invasion will never be attempted. Thirteen English sail of the line blockaded the Texel.

The Dutch have built 200 flat bottom schooners for the expedition against England, carrying two large cannon in the bow, and one at the stern, besides swivels. They had at the Helder a quantity of wood and hay, ready to be put on board the transports.

MURDER!
It is a melancholy truth, and truly alarming, that murder, not only with the unenlightened, but with many in the most cultivated ranks of society, is of late scarcely considered as a crime; and the more frequent that dreadful transgression is committed, and the offenders pardoned, it becomes familiar to the minds of men, and in their estimation loses its magnitude.

On the 28th ult. Mr. James Harkness, of the High Hills of Santee, was asleep in his bed, his own negro, named Buck, deliberately, as appears by his confession, leveled a gun and shot his master through the body. In order, as he thought, to prevent suspicion, he made his way to the apartment of a gentleman, who lived in the same house with Mr. H. who expressed his surprise at seeing him, as he had been absent for three days, and enquired of him the cause of his coming; he told him that he heard the report of a gun in his master's bed room, and was afraid that somebody had shot him. The confusion, and symptoms of guilt in the whole behavior of the negro, warranted the suspicion of several people, who witnessed the horrid scene of Mr. Harkness, dead, and drenched in blood, as to put the negro to torture in order to extort confession, who in his agony declared himself the murderer!

This inhuman monster was justly made an awful example of, and on the 30th suffered in the flames the penalty of his guilt. Mr. Harkness was a mild man, a kind master and had reared his murderer from infancy, with equal care and tenderness, as if he had been his own legitimate offspring.

Charleston paper.
From the Hudson Bee.
Last week the supreme court of this state held a circuit at Coverack in this county. At this session Mess. Sampson and Crosswell were tried for publishing libels against Ambrose Spencer, Esq. in the Balance, of which they were then joint proprietors, &c. in the spring of last year. The prosecution of Mr. Sampson for publishing certain charges respecting Mr. Spencer's conduct in managing the suit of the people against Harry Crosswell for libelling the President, was first tried; when Mr. Sampson proved that the publication was made against his consent, and by Crosswell at his own risk, a fact which shewed the absence of malice and was urged in mitigation of damages. After the jury had been out several hours they were called in and dismissed, on the matter being compromised by the parties.

Harry Crosswell was next tried on the same libel, and failing to prove his charges, his inability to pay a fine was ascertained, and the jury directed to bring in low damages, which they assessed at 120 dollars, and costs. A suit against Mr. Sampson was to have been brought on for publishing among other allegations, the charge of Mr. Spencer's turning out of office an old man who had saved his father's life, for asserting which T. P. Grosvenor, esq. had been fined at Albany. In this cause governor Clinton, and the hon. De Witt Clinton, esq. and several other gentlemen attended as witnesses, but were not examined, as Mr. Spencer, who had not commenced these suits from pecuniary motives, withdrew the action upon Mr. Sampson's paying all the charges which had accrued and a sum to Mr. Spencer's counsel, and giving the following apology:

"Having published in the Balance three numbers under my signature, addressed to Ambrose Spencer, esq. wherein his character is materially impeached—and being now satisfied that the said charges, which are the subject of a suit now depending, are unfounded—express my sincere regret that those publications took place, the same having been made in heat and passion; and I have no hesitancy in declaring, that the moral character of the said Ambrose Spencer is fair and unimpeachable.
