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OFFICIAL.

Extract of an Arrete, dated General Headquarters, at St. Domingo, the 10th Ventose, 12th year.

General Ferrand, commander in chief at Hispaniola, acting as captain-general, decrees as follows:

1st. The port of St. Domingo is the only one open in the island of Hispaniola to domestic and foreign commerce. In consequence all vessels riding at anchor in the bays, harbors, landings or in any other place near the coast occupied by the rebels; those cleared out for the ports in their possession, or coming from said ports, with or without a cargo; and generally, all vessels sailing within the territorial jurisdiction of the island, except from Cape Raphael to Ocoa bay, or found at a nearer distance from the shore than 2 leagues, shall be detained by the ships of the state or by the privateers having our letters of marque, who will as much as possible, bring them in the port of St. Domingo, so that a regular condemnation may be had.

2d. In case that fear of enemy's cruisers, contrary winds or damage from the sea do prevent the captors from bringing their prizes in the port of St. Domingo, without running an eminent danger of losing them, they may carry them into a port of a neighboring & friendly island, where agents of the government of Hispaniola reside.

3d. In the cases foreseen by the preceding article, it shall be the duty of the prize-master, as soon as he is arrived, to make his declaration to the agent, who will inscribe the same on a register book, kept by him for that purpose.

4th. As soon as the above-mentioned declaration is made, the agent shall request the ordinary judge of the place to go on board of the prize in order to put his seal upon all the openings of the vessel, in presence of the prize-master and the captured captain. The said agent shall take all necessary precautions for the preservation of the prize until she is lawfully condemned or released.
