NEW-YORK, September 3. We learn by captain Stanton, from Cadiz, that general Morvan arrived in Spain about the middle of July, and was daily expected at Cadiz, from whence he was to take a passage to this country.

A Spanish brig from Leguira, was brought to by the British ships of war yesterday, and continued in their possession at a late hour in the evening.

A letter from captain Stewart, of the brig Syren, dated April 25, to his friend in Philadelphia, announces the capture by him of the brig Transfer, a Grecian vessel, from the Archipelago, laden with valuable merchandise, and nineteen Turkish soldiers, bound to Tripoli.

The following letter give an account of another capture by our vigilant and enterprising squadron. Extract of a letter from an officer on board the United States schr. Nautilus, dated SYRACUSE, April 21.

"We send you a brig we captured off Tripoli, standing in under English colors, in violation of the declaration of the blockade of that port. Being advised by commodore Preble, we sent her to America for adjudication. We had an engagement for an hour, with 11 gun boats off Tripoli, within half gun shot of the batteries. We drove them into port without any loss on our side.

From our Correspondent at Nassau. NASSAU, August 14. French Privateers—We have the pleasure of stating the capture of, and arrival at this port, of one of the enemy's cruizers, captured by that vigilant officer, J. A. Gordon, esq. commander of his majesty's sloop of war Raccoon.

"I have the pleasure of announcing the capture, by his majesty's sloop of war Raccoon, of the French schooner privateer, L'Alliance, of 6 six pounders, and 86 men, four days out from Porto Rico, and had taken nothing, which we captured on the first inst. between Turks Island and Great Henegaz, and hope to give a good account shortly of some others, which infest this neighborhood, who have already committed serious depredations on these islands, and on the British & American commerce."

August 5 Arrived, schooner Federal George, Field, 10 days from Boston. Gin, rum, wine, beef, teas, India goods, &c—sundry persons.

New-York, September 3.

Arrived since our last, Ship Nancy, Robinson, in 62 days from Bordeaux. Passengers, Monsieur J. Destouet, of Bordeaux, R. Bioche, of Marigalante, J. Liber, of Bordeaux, and Madam Roget and Son. Spoke in lat. 39 53. N. long. 31 15. W. a Spanish ship, the Nancy being then under close reef topsails, the Spanish ship came down before the wind, luff'd up under his lee quarter, with his sails shivering; through his bad manœuvring his ship fell off coming down upon the Nancy, with a heavy sea running, and carried away the Nancy's jib boom and bowsprit, getting clear she bore away, without giving Capt. Robinson any satisfaction for the loss of his bowsprit. Aug. 9th lat. 40 56, long 42 11, sch'r Antelope, Hill New York. 15 days out bound to Lisbon. August 21, lat. 41 36, long. 60 59, ship Yorick, of Newburyport, bound to Leith out 7 days from Norfolk. 28, lat. 46, long. 62 22, saw a ship with the loss of her masts, she had bright sides, no figure head, plain stern, having many passengers on board, a heavy sea running, and blowing a gale, captain Robinson could not get to her to give her any resistance. August 27, lat. 39, long. 67 33, ship Aurora, Bowles, of Portsmouth, N. H. out 7 days from Baltimore, for Amsterdam.

Sch'r Charming Mary, Potter, from Richmond, and 5 days from Norfolk. Brig Atlantic, Wilson, of Fairfield, in 24 days from Antigua. Left schooner Commerce, Butler, of Newport; brig Nancy, Woodbury, of Salem, cleared, and to sail in 3 days, and several others. August 27, in lat. 27 35, long. 63, the brig Comet, Mulberry, 3 days from Alexandria for Surinam. Captain W. was overhauled by the British off the Hook, and treated politely.

Sloop President, Osborn, in 8 days from Philadelphia. British schooner Nancy, Huxford, in 9 days from Halifax. The brig Jefferson, was still at Halifax untried; but it was supposed she would be condemned. Sloop Airea, Prior, in 12 days from Richmond.

Schooner Polly & Nancy, Gray, in 10 days from Edenton. At quarantine, the ship Neptune, Stanton, 10 40 days from Cadiz. Left the brig Neutrality, Wadsworth, (sailed the same day for Salem) schooner Miles Sandwich, Davis, of Salem for Lisbon, the same time; brig Mary, Young, for Providence in 10 days; brig Eliza and Mary, Crane, for New York in 20 days; brig Prudence, James, for Ireland; brig Rose, Tompkins, for New York in 15 or 20 days; brig Sea Nymph, McMullen, of New York at quarantine; brig Alert, of Alexandria, at do; brig Olive, Pel-

ham, of Wilmington, N. C. for Liverpool and London, schooner Pease, Coes, from Amsterdam, at quarantine. Spoke August 21, in long. 59, the sloop John, 56 days from Bordeaux for New York. 29, in lat. 39, long. 65 the ship Montezuma, from Baltimore for Rotterdam—same day saw the Jamaica homeward bound fleet of the east, and was boarded by the British of 74 guns. Nothing new at Cadiz, except that flour was 20 dollars a barrel.

Brig Joseph H. Zane, Dyckman, (late Hazard) from New Orleans via New Providence, she has been ashore, and the cargo sent. Captain Hazard died on board a week, on his passage from the brig to the town. Left sch'r Ann, Newson to sail for New York in 6 days; schooner Sally, Dickinson, in 6 days from Bridgeport; and sloop Venus, Rubel, to sail in 2 days for Exuma and New York. August 28, off Cape Hatteras, spoke the schooner Republican, Russell, 6 days from Baltimore for Charleston. The French privateer Alliance, of 6 guns and 86 men, was lately sent into New Providence by the British sloop of war Raccoon, commanded by Captain Gordon. Passengers, the Rev. Mr. Richards and lady.

W. by W. 16 leagues, spoke the ship Selina, Alton, 55 days from Bordeaux, for Philadelphia. Passengers, Messrs. Bussillot, Wade, Wheatly, Stewart and Smith.

Came up from Woodbridge, New Jersey, the brig Dean, where she has been overhauled.
