

"Second; That the article relating to Prizes, carried into Spanish ports by French cruizers be totally expunged, and all claims upon the Spanish Government, on that account, be forever relinquished.

"Third; That the act of the United States, authorizing the President to establish one or more Ports on the river Mobile be immediately repealed. After a proper remonstrance by the American Minister on this subject, he demanded his passports, and will actually depart from hence in the course of the ensuing week.

"It is expected too that all the Americans will be obliged to leave this place in a few days.

"Nothing of course but war is spoken of. Nevertheless Mr. Yrujo, is intrusted with full powers, and it may happen that what could not be obtained here, will be granted at Washington.

"The people of this country affect to treat with contemptary opposition on the part of the United States, as they have (from your side) such information as leads them to believe that America is only a great merchant who calculates upon the probable loss or gain by a war or peace, & will determine as the balance of interest may preponderate without regard to national honor.

"Nevertheless if we except the French, there is no other nation that they so much apprehend mischief from. Your vicinity to their colonies, and the mild principles of your republican government is a constant source of anxiety to them and occasions both fear and hatred to you.

"General Moresou, is now at Barcelona, on his way to America, where he means to pass the remainder of his life, by permission of the Emperor.

"Even this circumstance has given some alarm here."

On Friday last, says the Oregon Herald of August 23, was executed at the village of Aurora, in the county of Cayuga, JOHN DELAWARE, an Indian of the Delaware tribe, for the murder of a farmer of Cayuga county, in October last. The concourse of people who attended this execution was very great.

Delaware is said to have thus expressed himself on the morning of his execution—"I shall live to kill great many white men yet." These are the only words he is said to have uttered the whole day.

Extract of a letter from an officer in the American squadron, dated

"MADONA, prize to the Syren, Syracuse, April 16th, 1804.

"We have been cruising off Tripoli for some time past, in company with the Nautilus; we have detained a brig and a ship, which we caught coming out of Tripoli; in the latter I arrived here a few days ago, but obliged to perform quarantine; we had on board 300 sheep and 60 cows, and for 3 days out of 5 they had neither to eat or to drink, and about 20 dying per day; the British consul & suite, from Tripoli were on board."

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Stenton to his friend in Norfolk, dated the 17th of August, 1804.

"On my way up I called at Monticello—I cannot describe my admiration of Mr. Jefferson, or my amusement with the numberless curiosities interspersed about the house, among which, that itself, is not the least striking. This situation is so grand and beautiful, that it appears to have been formed by nature for its present possessor. His elevation above his neighbors is in proportion to the excellence of his virtues and the splendor of his genius. It is not the proud emittance of ambition, of vanity, or of ostentation. When he looks down on his fellow men, it is not to count the number of his inferiors, but to seek out such as may be rendered useful to their country, and be incited by his example to virtuous exertions. When he looks down it is not with the contemptuous sneer of arrogance, but with a serene benignity that evinces the benevolence of his heart, and the immensity of his mind.

"I was astonished that a man who had received so many honours and attentions, from nations as well as individuals, from his own as well as foreign countries—who was the acknowledged idol of a majority of a people, should be so modest, so affable and so unassuming.

"His life is the most able advocate that human nature has found in any climate, and the best answer that has ever been made to such as would abuse and impeach its perfection."

BRITISH INSOLENCE.

From the N. J. MORNING CHRONICLE.

The insolence of the officers commanding the British vessels of war blockading our harbor, annoying our commerce, and insulting our flag, continues undiminished by the general expression of indignation their conduct has excited. Whether these outrages are warranted by the instructions they have received from their government, or originate in the wantonness of individual malice, they equally call for redress, and require that we should be put in a situation to protect ourselves from similar aggressions. The following statement, respecting the ship John, is furnished us by authority which we consider entitled to full confidence.

On Sunday, at one o'clock, P. M. the ship John, captain Patterson, from Bordeaux, for this port, took a pilot on board, at which time the Leander, of 50 guns, and the Cambrian frigate of 44, were lying to with their heads to the eastward, with a Spanish brig from Lagaira, bound into New York, which they have sent to Halifax. At three quarters past one o'clock, they fired a gun at the John; captain Patterson immediately hoisted his colors, but did not heave to, and kept his course. The Cambrian being the leeward ship, only fired a few guns, the shot of which went over the John and did no damage. The Leander then commenced a heavy fire at the ship and several of her grape shot came on board. She frequently double shotted her guns; and discharged ONE HUNDRED AND SIX times at the John. The only damage done was the cutting away the main-topgallant-brace. It is presumed she fired high, with a view to disable the ship, that they might come up with her. They chased her within half a mile of the land (four fathoms water) and when they hove about, assembled the marines and poured a whole volley of fire arms into her which fortunately did no damage.

In addition to the foregoing the American Citizen says, "The grape shot fell on board the John so thick, that the men were driven below for shelter. Tomorrow I shall lay authenticated facts before the public on this subject."

PORT OF BALTIMORE.

From Dryden's Marine List.
