Mediterranean Passports.
Notice is hereby given, that it has been deemed expedient to change the form of the Mediterranean Passport is sued to vessels of the United States; that from the eighth day of July next; those of the new form will be issued at the custom houses to every vessel, for which application may be made on a compliance with the terms prescribed by law, and surrendering the former passport, which she may be possessed, if any, in which latter case no fees will be required for the exchange; and that by an arrangement agreed upon by the Barbary powers, with whom we are at peace, either the old or the new form of passport will be sufficient to protect the vessels of the United States, from capture until the 1st of July, 1865, after which the old form of passport will be unavailable, and the new one alone in use.

From the N. Y. AMERICAN CITIZEN.
The following affidavits refer to the disgraceful affair which we mentioned yesterday. The wounded honor of this country calls aloud for reparation.
City of New York, ss.
JOHN WHITE, a deputy pilot of the port of New York, deposes—that on yesterday about one o'clock, he took charge, in his official capacity, of the American ship John of New York, from Bordeaux, about sixteen miles from the Hook; that near two o'clock, and about eight miles from the Hook, the Leander fired a shot at the said ship, and that the Captain immediately hoisted the American flag and proceeded on his course to the said port; that the Leander then pursued and fired at the ship, and to the best of this deponent's recollection, one hundred and six guns, some of which were double shotted, and several of which struck the said ship; that the pursuit and firing continued within about half a mile of the land, and in four fathoms water; and that the Carnabrian also fired at the said ship, and pursued her to leeward.

JOHN PATTERSON, master of the above named ship John, deposes, that the contents of the above deposition of John White are true; that the Leander approached the ship within pistol shot, and about half a mile from the land, and that in that situation several rounds of musquetry were fired from the Leander at the hull of the ship, apparently with a view to kill the people on board.

From the MISSISSIPPI HERALD.
NATCHEZ, August 10.
Extract of a letter, dated August 7.
"Returning this morning from the vicinity of Little Bayou Sara, I met not far from the line, 21 armed men; on passing a house within my view they sounded a French horn, and unfurled a flag composed of four white and three blue stripes, a yellow field and two red stars; they were mounted, armed with rifles and pistols and wore a deep blue and yellow cockade. Among the party, I recogniz'd some of the planters of Feliciana, and one man whom I know, on passing me, declared he was in possession of Baton Rouge Fort in 24 hours; I have since learned, that their plan is to take the different alcaldes or commandants as they go along; so that we may naturally suppose our neighbour O'Connor is in strings e'er this. As I get more of the particulars you shall have them.

BOSTON, September 3,
LATEST FROM EUROPE.
By the arrival of the **JOHN ADAMS,** captain Woods, from Liverpool, we have been enabled to complete our files of London papers to the 14th of July. Their contents not yielding any *Intelligence* of particular moment, we shall instead of a brief abstract and chronicle of the times, present to our readers, from time to time, the variety of general matter, which the continent. The *hypothesis* of able and intelligent writers are certainly interesting, and in the present unsettled state of European politics, forms the principal part of newspaper discussions.
On the subject of Invasion, which appears to have been revived, with considerable spirit in England, and to be the leading topic of speculation, a paper of the latest date contains the following remarks.
"The cry of invasion is again revived after a suspension of several months; whether with as much reason as formerly it is difficult to say; but to judge from facts and appearances, the probability is much the same, our state of security the same, and the preparations of the enemy the same.
"Indeed there is a general and dishonorable sameness in the contest itself, which whilst it fills us with all the paroxysms and uneasiness of war, confers upon us nothing of its dignity, and gives us nothing of that safety which is only to be purchased by victory.
"Whilst at war with England singly, and whilst our diplomatic dexterity is so miserably thwarted on the Continent, that Nations, though involved in a general interest with us, and groaning under a tenfold weight of insult and oppression, refuse to become our Allies against the common enemy, invasion must always be the stalking-horse of the French Government. It is a measure easily made, though difficult perhaps to execute, to carry into execution; it is the sword suspended over the head by a single thread, which fills us with momentary apprehension though it is mathematically demonstrated to us that it cannot fall.
"In short, the alarm it excites in England, exceeds in a vast degree, the trouble which it costs the enemy to produce it; the machinery is easily worked; it is simple, and cheap, but the effect is astonishing and incalculable; like some of the more simple mechanical powers which the experimental philosopher puts in motion, they are seen to operate in a manner and with an effect which astonishes himself, and he is filled with amazement that such wonders should be wrought with materials so mean and scanty and by a process so simple and natural.
"It is thus with France; she is struck dumb by the powers of her own strategy, and, reasoning herself into intrepidity by its effects, begins to mean something where she formerly meant nothing;—she finds it a speculation which is turning to account, and prospers in defiance even of her own calculations.
"If the arguments on this subject were not almost too trite to repeat, we should say, that the revenues of the enemy are not likely to be consumed by building gun-boats at Boulogne, and navigating them, under the convoy of artillery, from Ostend to Brest; that it is no bad way of training sailors, and even soldiers too, in these expeditions which never venture out of sight of land, and which, by only exposing them to those engagements in which they are seldom worsted, familiarize them with English sloops and frigates, and abate, in some measure the novelty of fear.
"It was an expression of the great lord Chatham, "that England was no longer an island, that she was to be fought for on the continent."
"To be successful, therefore, in any war, she must seek her enemy on the continent; if she retreats, and shrinks back upon herself, she relinquishes glory without acquiring safety. It is not by concentration, but diffusion, that her power will be felt, she must, as it were, dissipate and extend herself wherever the enemy is found, in order to become formidable and secure.
"If it be granted that the effects of the mode of warfare now pursued are not irrationally pointed out, we shall be asked how it is possible that England can engage in a continental war without a single ally to her back? This question we propose to investigate in our next essay, and as we have considered it with much attention, we hope to be able to lay before our readers something at once novel and just.
