Philadelphia, Nov. 13, 1864.

Whereas for the convenience of merchants and others, the Bank of the United States and its different offices of discount and deposit have hitherto received and negotiated notes, bills and draughts, which have been payable at any place where the bank has an office of discount and deposit, free from any charge, or emolument whatever to be thereby derived to the banks: Be it therefore hereby Resolved, and it is expressly declared, as the terms on which such business will hereafter be done, That this bank and its different offices of discount and deposit will continue the said facility to all persons and bodies corporate following notes, bills or draughts to be collected at distant places whenever the president and cashier of this bank, or its offices, shall think the situation of the banks will admit of it, in manner aforesaid; and this board will also order and direct the attention and care

of its different offices and officers to be exercised for the punctual receipt of the same: on condition that neither this bank nor any of its offices, shall be held or considered as liable to any expense, or be in any wise responsible for casual errors or negligencies either of their officers in the said business, except in cases of fraud or corruption, or after the money due on such note, bill or draught, shall have been received at the office to which it has been transmitted, or by either of its officers,
