**NEW-YORK, March 16.**  
**COMMERCIAL AGENCY.**  
**JOHN G. BOGERT** having been appointed Vice commercial Agent of the Batavian Republic for the state of New-York, hereby gives notice, that he will furnish all the Certificates made requisite by that Government, to show that merchandise exported to any of the ports of that Republic is not of the growth or manufacture of the Kingdom of Great Britain or its Colonies, and other necessary Certificates, in conformity and agreeable to those at present used by the French Consul.—Office No. 142, Water street.

**BY AUTHORITY.**  
**The Council of State of the Batavian Republic Orders,**  
 1. That from this date no goods, either direct or indirect, from the kingdom of Great Britain or its Colonies, shall be admitted into the ports of this Republic, but all such as may be imported after the last of July contrary to this prohibition into said ports, shall be detained under the following particulars, viz. The place of landing, the owner's names shall be given to the council of state, which shall dispose of the goods according to circumstances.  
 2. That to commence as before, all neutral vessels bound to the ports of this Republic, shall be provided with a certificate from the commercial agent or commissary of the Republic, residing at the place of landing; or in case no such agent residing there, from the government of the place, containing the name of the vessel and captain; stating the contents of the cargo, the number of ships crew, and their names and the destination of such vessel.  
 3. That no captain, either through neglect or alteration of destination not being provided with the aforementioned certificates, be admitted into the said

ports of the Republic except it be with their produce of the territory of the Republic, or the property of its citizens, and they engage to export the same value of goods by them imported.

 The brig Shannon, Osburn, was advertised in a Liverpool paper of the 31st January, to fail for this port, in a few days.  
 The following paragraph from the *New-York Commercial Advertiser*, of the 12th inst. has just fallen under our notice. We have also observed it published in the *Philadelphia True American*. As it contains reflections highly dishonorable to ANY community, more particularly that of Baltimore, we deem it incumbent on us to state that the account is a malicious falsehood, only worthy of being propagated by the clerical editor (Z. Lewis) of the *Commercial Advertiser*.

**"Johnny Randolph Burnt in Effigy."**  
 It is well known, that by far the greater proportion of the citizens of Baltimore are democrats—it is also well known that Judge Chase, on account of his federalism, has been extremely obnoxious to all the democrats of that city. These facts, notwithstanding the conduct of Randolph respecting the impeachment of the judge, his introducing the vindictive amendment to the constitution, his opposing the bill for defraying the expenses of the witnesses for Judge Chase, and his attempt to violate the constitution at the close of the session, have roused the indignation of the populace. Accordingly, a concourse of the democratic citizens of Baltimore assembled, formed an image of Randolph, carried it in procession to one of the wharfs, suspended it over the water, and set it on fire—at length, the cord with which it was suspended being consumed, the effigy fell into the water & floated down the stream, until a number of dogs plunged in, dragged it to the shore and tore it into pieces.
