Notice is hereby given,

Separate proposals will be received at the office of the Secretary for the Department of War, until 12 o'clock on the first Wednesday in June next, for the supply of all rations that may be required for the use of the United States, from the 1st day of October 1865, until the 30th day of September 1866, both days inclusive, at the following places, viz:

First, At Niagara, Detroit, Michilimackinac, Fort Wayne, Chippewa, Swan Creek, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited within the state of Ohio, and territory of Michigan, and at any place or places within the Indiana territory north of the 41st degree of north latitude.

Second, At South West Point, Tellis, Knoxville, Nashville, and within the Cherokee nation between Tennessee and Georgia, and on the Tennessee river, and on the road between said river and Nashville, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited within the states of Kentucky and Tennessee.

Third, At the garrison near Vincennes on the river Wabash, at Fort Massac, New Madrid, Chickasaw Bluffs, Arkansas, Natchez and Fort Adams, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited within the territory of Louisiana north of New Madrid, and at any place or places in the Indiana territory within fifty miles east of the Mississippi river and fifty miles east of the Mississippi river.

Fourth, At St. Louis, St. Charles, Kaskaskia, Cahokia, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited within the territory of Louisiana north of New Madrid, and at any place or places in the Indiana territory within fifty miles east of the Mississippi river and south of the 41st degree of north latitude, Fort Massac excepted.

Fifth, At New Orleans, Plaquemines, Point Cadeau, Gacheta, Natchitoches, Apple-wood, Attakapas, East Stoddard, Fort St. Stephens, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited within the territory of Orleans, or in the county of Washington in the Mississippi Territory, and at any place or places on the west side of the Mississippi river below Arkansas.

Separate proposals will also be received as aforesaid for the supply of all rations, which may be required for the use of the United States, from the 1st day of January 1866, to the 31st day of December of the same year, both days inclusive, within the several states herein after mentioned, viz:

Sixth, At Fort Wilkinson, Cockspur Island, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited, within the state of Georgia, and on the Indian boundary between Georgia and the Creek nation.

Seventh, At Charleston, Rocky Mount, on the head waters of the Santee, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited, within the states of North and South Carolina.

Eighth, At Norfolk, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited, within the state of Virginia.

Ninth, At Fort Mifflin, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited, within the state of Maryland and the district of Columbia.

Tenth, At Fort Mifflin, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited, within the state of Pennsylvania, east of the river Susquehanna, and within the states of New Jersey, and Delaware.

Eleventh, At Pittsburg, Carlisle, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited, within the state of Pennsylvania, west of the river Susquehanna.

Twelfth, At Fort Jay, West Point, Albany, Shenandoah, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited within the state of New York, Niagara and its dependencies excepted.

Thirteenth, At Fort Trumbull, Fort W. Scott, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited, within the states of Connecticut, Rhode Island and Vermont.

Fourteenth, At Fort Independence, (Boston harbor) and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited within the state of Massachusetts, the town of Springfield, and the district of Maine excepted.

Fifteenth, At Portsmouth, Portland, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched or recruited within the state of New Hampshire and the district of Maine.

Sixteenth, Proposals will also be received as aforesaid, for the supply of all rations, which may be required by the U. States, for the troops which are or may be stationed, marched or recruited within the town of Springfield in the state of Massachusetts, and for the armurers & other persons employed in the United States' army at that place, from the 1st day of January 1866 to the 31st day of December in the same year, both days inclusive.

Ration to consist of one pound and one quarter of beef, or three quarters of a pound of pork, eighteen ounces of bread or flour, one gill of rum, whiskey or brandy, and at the rate of two quarts of salt, four quarts of vinegar, four pounds of soap, and one pound and a half of candles, to every hundred rations. The prices of the several component parts of the ration shall be specified, but the United States reserve the right of making such alterations in the price of the component parts of the ration as shall make the price of each part thereof bear a just proportion to the proposed price of the whole ration. The rations are to be furnished in such quantities, that there shall be at all times, during the term of the proposed contract, be sufficient for the consumption of the troops at Michilimackinac, Detroit and Chicago, for six months in advance, and at each of the other posts on the western waters, for at least three months in advance of good and wholesome provisions, if the same shall be required. It is also to be permitted to all and every of the commandants of fortified places or posts, to call for, at seasons when the same can be transported, or at any time in case of urgency, such supplies of like provisions in advance, as in the discretion of the commandant shall be deemed proper.

It is understood that the contractor is to be responsible and liable for insuring the supplies to the troops, and that all losses sustained by the transportation of the supplies, shall be paid by the United States at the price of the articles captured or destroyed as aforesaid, on the condition of two or more persons of credible character, and the certificate of a commissioned officer, stating the circumstances of the loss, and the amount of the articles for which compensation shall be claimed.

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The privilege of underwriting to be reserved to the United States of requiring that none of the supplies, which may be furnished under any of the proposed contracts, shall be issued until the supplies, which have been or may be furnished under contracts now in force, have been consumed; and that a supply in advance may be always required at any of the fixed posts on the seaboard, or Indian frontiers not exceeding three months.
