

or provisions whatsoever (butcher's meat excepted) within the limits of the markets (Fell's Point market excepted) upon any day after sunset, he, she or they shall forfeit and pay five dollars for each and every offence.

Sec. 31. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That no person or persons shall, at any time, sell or expose for sale, within the limits of either of the markets any hot soup, boiled corn, or dress any meat or other victuals within said limits, or sell, or expose for sale, within the said limits, any wine, beer or spirituous liquors of any kind, under the penalty of forfeiting, for every offence, two dollars.

Sec. 22. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That all persons using the trade of butchers, shall have right, and they are hereby permitted to carry all kinds of meat on wheel barrows, to their respective stalls or shambles, in the market-houses, of this city, in the morning, at any time before sunrise on the day which the same shall be so carried, and shall and may convey and carry on wheel barrows, all kinds of meat from their respective stalls in the market-houses aforesaid, at any time after the hour of nine o'clock in the morning, between the first of April and the first of October, and at any time after the hour of ten o'clock in the morning, between the first of October and the first of April—provided, that said wheel-barrows, when not in use, as hereby permitted, shall forthwith be removed from the limits of the market.

Sec. 23. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That no butcher or butchers shall erect, or cause to be erected under his or their respective shambles, any box or closet, unless the same be raised four inches above the pavement, under the penalty of forfeiting and paying five dollars for each and every such box or closet may remain under said shambles.

Sec. 24. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That the division line between the butchers and the occupiers of the benches, behind the shambles, shall be drawn six inches from the inner edge of one pillar, to six inches from the inner edge of another, and no butcher shall hang any meat or other thing, or place any fixture on the outside of said line, nor shall any occupier of any of said benches hang any meat or other thing, or place any fixture on the inside of said line; & any person offending herein, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding five dollars for each and every offence.

Sec. 25. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That the avenues or footways for the passing of all persons from the shed parts of the market-houses to the place assigned for the station of the waggon, shall be kept open, so that the same be severally opposite to the several avenues of the brick building; the said avenues and all other avenues or foot ways of said market-houses, shall be kept free and clear of and from all obstructions whatsoever, under the penalty of one dollar for each and every offence.

Sec. 26. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That all blocks, benches, tubs or other things used in the markets for the accommodation of butchers whilst occupying the shambles, shall be placed and kept within the limits of the shambles by them severally occupied, and in such manner as not to extend into the market-house further than four feet beyond the inner edge of their respective shambles; and every butcher who shall use or occupy any of said shambles, shall on market days and on all other days, before he leaves the market, place or cause to be placed all blocks and benches used by him in the market under the plank of his shamble, so that said blocks or benches shall not extend in any way beyond the edge of said plank, and to prevent nuisances shall collect, secure, and carry away, or cause to be removed from the limits of the market, all heads, feet, pluck, or other offal that are, or may be within the limits of his shamble or bench, under the penalty of five dollars for each offence; and all meat, roots, herbs and vegetable provisions offered for sale under the extended sheds of the said market; and all tubs, baskets and other things used in the market for the accommodation of the sellers thereof, shall be placed by the several and respective owners thereof, so as not to extend beyond the edge of the benches on the one side, nor within the range of posts on the other side, to the interruption of the purchasers passing and repassing under the said extended sheds; and if any owner or occupier of any tub, bench, meat, roots, herbs, or vegetable provisions, or other thing used as aforesaid, shall cause or suffer the same to be placed or remain otherwise than is herein before mentioned and directed, every such person so offending shall forfeit and pay for every offence two dollars.

Sec. 27. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That if any butcher, or person usually employed in vending, meal or vegetable provisions, shall bring or cause to be brought on market days within the limits of said market, any cart or other carriage after sunrise, and within market hours, every person so offending, shall forfeit and pay a fine not exceeding two dollars.

Sec. 28. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That from and after the first day of June next, all horses and cattle brought to the Centre market for sale, shall be conducted to the market space between the south line of Water street, and the north line of Pratt street, which is hereby appropriated for a horse and cattle market—and at which place horses and cattle shall

be publicly exposed for sale by auction, or otherwise from sun-rise until 9 o'clock in the afternoon of the days appointed for market days in Centre market-space.

Sec. 29. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That the mayor be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to cause to be set up, a suitable number of posts, connected by strong bars, with rings or hooks thereinto driven, unto which the cattle exposed to sale shall be securely fastened by ropes or chains, and a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars be appropriated for the purpose aforesaid.

Sec. 30. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That the mayor be, and he is hereby authorized to contract with and employ some suitable person, under such security and upon such terms as he may think proper, to take charge of the public scales, weights, and moveable stales, who shall receive for the use of the corporation, for every draught weighed by him from the persons applying therefor, such sum as the mayor shall fix, and pay over the same to the register once in every week.

Sec. 31. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That the clerks of the several markets shall have full power and authority to detain and sell any meat or provisions upon any stall rented by him, if the person renting the same or in the occupation thereof, shall not pay the rent due thereon.

Sec. 32. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That the mayor is hereby empowered to contract with and employ a suitable person, upon such terms as he may think proper, to aid and assist the clerk of the Centre market to carry into effect the regulations contained in this or any other ordinance respecting the said market.

Sec. 33. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That all fines and forfeitures by this ordinance imposed and recovered, shall be appropriated as follows, to wit: one half to the informer, and the other half for the use of the city; and if any servant or slave shall offend contrary to the directions or meaning of this ordinance, and may be unable to pay the fine or fines thereby incurred, such servant or slave shall be punished by whipping on the bare back at the discretion of any justice of the peace for Baltimore county, provided such whipping shall not exceed ten lashes for every offence.

Sec. 34. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That nothing in this ordinance shall in any respect affect the rights and privileges, which any person or persons may at this time possess, in virtue of any contract that may have been heretofore made with the approbation of the mayor.

Sec. 35. *And be it enacted and ordained,* That this ordinance shall be in full force and operation on and after the first day of April next, and that the ordinance entitled "An ordinance to regulate the several markets within the city of Baltimore," and each and every supplement thereto, be repealed on and after the said first day of April next.

PARIS, January 20.
Letters from Vienna, dated January 5, mention, that a report was current that the Grand Seigneur, who was perfectly ignorant of the passage of the Perfians to the Mediterranean, required an account of that occurrence, with every particular; which being communicated to him, he flew into such a violent passion, that he had the Grand Vizier's head struck off, changed a part of his ministry, and gave complete satisfaction to general Brune, the French ambassador to his highness.—It is evident, however, that news of such importance requires the strongest confirmation.

Another report is also related in our papers; it is contained in an article, dated Vienna, January 2, viz. "The English minister, Mr. Paget, on being with Count Cobenzel last night, testified to the Count his astonishment that, in the audience given by the Count in the morning, the foreign ministers were not received in the emperor's cabinet, whilst the privy councillors enjoyed that distinction. He complained bitterly. The vice-chancellor replied, that custom did not permit it, and he wondered Mr. Paget should make such observations at that time, when the same etiquette had been constantly observed by the Count, ever since he had been at Vienna. Mr. Paget got warm, he stamped with his foot, and told Count Cobenzel, that if he (the Count) did not know his duty, he would know how to teach him; and presently quitted the assembly, with every appearance of madness. This occurrence, which was witnessed by many members of the corps diplomatique, and other courtiers, is become the talk of all Vienna, and every body is surprized at the tone assumed by the British envoy on the occasion."
Every thing concurs to render it probable, that we shall soon be able to announce the accession of his imperial highness, Prince Joseph, to the throne of Lombardy. The emperor's journey to Italy will we are informed be connected with that new monarchy. It is added that the arrangements necessarily required by that event, will undoubtedly delay, for a while, the settlement which remains to be completed relative to the political situation of another neighboring state. It is said, that his holiness will, on his return to Rome, perform the coronation of the new king of Lombardy.
