SINGULAR LETTER OF RESIGNATION.

Nashville, 1804.

SIR—The general Assembly of the State of Tennessee, at September session, 1803, in their wisdom thought proper, to nominate and appoint their unworthy servant to the high and important office of Conservator of the peace for the County of Davidson. In obedience to the sovereign will of the people, assembling through that enlightened body, I accepted the appointment, under the impression, that as a legal character I could render service to my country in the judiciary. But that wife body did, before, at, and since the time of my appointment appoint others to the same dignified and high office who were men wanting in legal talents & many of them common sense; and there is now a majority of the Justices in this county of the last description. Hence few decisions in our county court are made in conformity with the found principles of law, or equity. By reason whereof, and because from my native erascible disposition, I cannot keep the peace myself, but frequently fall pugnis et calcibus upon many of the good people of the state. I have thought proper to resign the high power delegated to me by that honorable body, into the power of those who gave them, I mean the sovereign, free and enlightened people of Tennessee. You will therefore do me the honor to communicate the contents of this letter to his Excellency the Governor who will consider my official functions as a justice of the peace for Davidson county as ceasing from the day of the date hereof.

FROM GIBRALTAR.

Yesterday arrived here, the brig Maria, capt. Saunders, from the Mediterranean.—He informs, that a fleet of 30 sail of merchantmen, from Malta, for England, under convoy of the Arrow sloop of war, of 18 guns, capt. Vincent, and a bomb brig, about the 1st February, near the island of Ivica, was fallen in with by two French frigates, and after an engagement of one hour the English sloop of war blew up, the bomb was captured, and a considerable part of the convoy. About nine sail of the latter had arrived at Gibraltar previous to his leaving that fortress.

It is probable, from the weakness of the convoy, and the fleet being bound from Malta to England, that they consisted principally of empty, homeward bound transports.—Though the Arrow rates as an 18 gun sloop of war, she mounted 30 guns.
