DIRECTIONS FOR SINGING.

LINES


Occasioned by overhearing an answer of one of the Turkish Captives in New York to some question respecting his wife. The words were: "She look for me every day: but I no come."

AN ACT

To authorise the Secretary of War to issue military land warrants, and for other purposes

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of War, be, and he hereby is authorized, from and after the passing of this act, to issue warrants for military bounty lands, to the sixty-three persons who have exhibited their claims, and produced satisfactory evidence, to substantiate the same to the Secretary of War, and also to such persons as shall, before the first day of April next, produce to him satisfactory evidence of the validity of their claims, in pursuance of the act of the twenty-sixth of April eighteen hundred and two, intitled "An act, in addition to an act, intitled "An act, in addition to an act, regulating the grants of land appropriated for military services, and for the society of the United Brethren, for propagating the gospel among the Heathen;"

Sec 2. And be it further enacted, That the holders or proprietors of the land warrants, issued by virtue of the preceding section, shall and may locate their respective warrants, only on any unlocated parts of the fifty quarter townships, and the fractional quarter townships, which had been reserved for original holders, by virtue of the fifth section of an act, intitled "An act in addition to an act, intitled "An act regulating the grants of land appropriated for military services, and for the society of the United Brethren, for propagating the gospel among the Heathen;" approved the 26th day of April, 1802, be and the same is hereby continued in force until the 1st day of March 1805.

AN ORDINANCE

Making appropriations for the year 1805.

BE it enacted and ordained by the mayor and city council of Baltimore, That there be appropriated to the deepening & preferring the harbor of Baltimore, to be paid out of any money arising from the duty on tonnage of vessels and auctioneers of the city, the sum of six thousand dollars, to be laid out and expended in such manner as the mayor shall direct;

To the cleaning the streets of the city, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars;

To the removing nuisances, a sum not exceeding twelve hundred dollars;

To the health officer, for the ensuing twelve months, commencing from his appointment, one thousand dollars;

To the health department, a sum not exceeding two thousand dollars;

For the expence of elections, printing and incidental expences, a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars;

For repairing the paved streets, lanes and alleys, a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars;

For paving cross-streets, lanes & alleys, a sum not exceeding two thousand dollars;

For watching and lighting the city, a sum not exceeding twelve thousand dollars;

For the superintendent of the powder magazine, for the ensuing twelve months, including one hundred dollars for house rent, the sum of five hundred dollars;

For altering and widening the footways, in the manner directed by an ordinance, entitled, "An ordinance to improve the footways in the city of Baltimore," passed the twenty second day of March eighteen hundred and four, a sum not exceeding two thousand dollars;

To John Eager Howard the sum of five hundred and fifty dollars, to be paid him upon his releasing this corporation from all claim he may have thereon, for the filling up and wharfing a part of Barre street, and upon his dismising his suit in chancery and paying the costs thereof; and further that he will agree to make and wharf on his ground adjoining Barre street at the same time the corporation shall fill up said street;

To Christopher Hughes the sum of one hundred dollars, to be paid him upon his releasing this corporation from all claim he may have thereon for the filling up and wharfing a part of Barre street;

For filling up Camden street, under the direction of the former commissioners, the sum of one hundred dollars;

For filling up Queen street in the seventh ward, sufficiently high to admit of its being paved, a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars, to be expended under the direction of Ludwick Hering and Robert Stewart;

For fixing step-stones, under the direction of the city commissioners, at the interfections of Fayette and Liberty streets, Baltimore and Liberty streets, a sum not exceeding sixty dollars;

For enclosing the land belonging to the city, and adjoining the city hospital, for the cultivation of the same, and for making necessary repairs to said hospital a sum not exceeding three hundred and forty dollars, to be expended under the direction of Joseph Allender and John Hillen;

For the payment of a balance due for a lot of ground, purchased at the west end of the city for a Potters Field, the sum of two hundred and six dollars and twenty five cents;

To enable the Register to employ a clerk, to assist him in the discharge of the duties of his office, the sum of two hundred dollars;

For erecting a foot way a cross the hollow in Harford-street, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, in addition to the sum of 150 dollars heretofore appropriated, the same to be expended under the direction of the commissioners appointed for that purpose;

For erecting an abutment at the west end of Pitt-street, in the sixth ward, a sum not exceeding 200 dollars, to be expended under the direction of Michael Dissencler and David Wilson; provided the persons owning the adjoining lots shall extend & wharf the same at the time of erecting said abutment;

As an additional salary to the commissioners of the watch the sum of one hundred dollars;

For cutting down, filling up and making passible, for carriages of all descriptions, that part of Albermarle street which lies between Prince and Wilkes-streets, and that part of Wilkes street which lies between Albermarle and Harford-street; a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars;

For filling up and completing the public wharf at the east end of Camden-street, a sum not exceeding 600 dollars, to be expended by Geo. Warner and William Waterhouse under the direction of the city commissioners including the sum unexpended of the former appropriation for the same purpose;

To reimburse the commissioners of the market, in the precincts, for the like sum by them expended in paving part of the intersection of Lexington and Euaw-streets, the sum of 200 dollars.

For procuring, under the direction of the mayor, two hundred and ten fire buckets, to be marked with the word "PUB-

LIC," and the name of the fire engine to which they shall be attached, a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars; said buckets to be equally divided among each of the fire companies within the city as shall require the same to be kept with the respective engines to which they may be allotted;

For reimbursing John Hopkins, jr: money paid by him in anticipation of the collection of paving tax, which he has been unable to collect, the sum of one hundred and thirty three dollars and fifty cents;

The sum to be awarded by Joseph Biays, William Jackson and James Biays, referees between Thomas Tenan and John Snyder, two of the commissioners appointed under an ordinance of this corporation, for the extending of the public wharf, at the fourth end of market street in the eighth ward, and Archibald Shaw, the undertaker of the work;

The sum of one hundred dollars, to enable the mayor to purchase, of John Boulden, so much of his land, if any he may have, adjoining the hospital lot, lying between the old post road and the said lot;

The sum of six hundred dollars for removing the wooden kerbs in the eighth ward and for replacing the same with stone;

The sum of five hundred and thirty nine dollars and twenty cents, to discharge a balance due Stephen Colver for the like sum by him paid to the register, on account of mud fold on account of the corporation to Cumberland Dugan and Thomas McElderry, and not paid for by them.

Sec 2. And be it enacted and ordained, That the mayor may from time to time, draw on the register of the city to the amount of the aforesaid several appropriations, for their respective purposes, who is hereby directed to lay before the city council a full and particular account of the expenditures of said money with the vouchers therefor.
