From the FREEMAN'S JOURNAL.

The following original papers will prove how far the spirit of the American revolution and of justice has governed one of the citizens, who was a candidate for the office of president of the United States. They will also prove the great power that Mr. King exercised as a minister of this country in England in regard to emigration, interposing, and withdrawing a kind of prohibition. The constitution is expressed, that the legislature shall not exercise that power till 1808. The Irish characters in question were situated, as were George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, Samuel Adams, John Dickinson, John Adams, Patrick Henry, William Livingston, John Jay, Thomas Johnson, &c. &c. in 1775, when the address was circulating through Ireland. The republican party will readily consider themselves as the malcontents. We first offer extracts from the invitation to the people of Ireland given by congress in 1775. Mr. Adams the president in 1799, was on the committee that drew the address, and was a member of the body of the congress of 1775. Mr. King was his minister in 1799.

"To the people of Ireland—From the delegates appointed by the United colonies of New Hampshire, Massachusetts Bay, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, the Lower Counties on Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina, in General Congress, at Philadelphia, the 10th of May, 1775.

"Friends and Fellow Subjects,  
"As the important contest into which we have been driven, is now becoming interesting to every European state, and particularly effects the members of the British empire, we think it our duty to address you on the subject. We are desirous, as is natural to injured innocence, of possessing the good opinion of the virtuous and humane. We are peculiarly desirous of furnishing you with a true state of our motives and objects; and the better to enable you to judge of our conduct with accuracy, and determine the merits of the controversy with impartiality and precision.

"Permit us to assure you, that it was with the utmost reluctance we could prevail upon ourselves to cease our commercial connections with your Island. Your Parliament had done us no wrong. You had ever been friendly to the rights of mankind; and we acknowledge, with pleasure and gratitude, that your nation has produced patriots who have nobly distinguished themselves in the cause of humanity and America. On the other hand, we were not ignorant, that the labors and manufactures of Ireland, like those of the silk worm, were of little moment to themselves, but served only to give luxury to those who neither toil nor spin.—We perceived, that if we continued our commerce with you, our agreement not to import from Great Britain would be fruitless, and were, therefore, compelled to adopt a measure to which nothing but absolute necessity would have reconciled us. It gave us, however, some consolation to reflect, that should it occasion much distress, the fertile regions of America would afford you a safe asylum from poverty and in time, from oppression also; an asylum in which many thousands of your countrymen have found hospitality, peace and affluence, and become united to us by all the ties of consanguinity, mutual interest and affection. The ministry, bent on pulling down the pillars of the constitution endeavoured to erect the standard of despotism in America, and if successful, Britain and Ireland may shudder at the consequences.

Accept our most grateful acknowledgments for the friendly disposition you have always shown towards us. We know that you are not without your grievances. We sympathize with you in your distresses and are pleased to find that the design of subjugating us, has persuaded administration to dispense to Ireland some vagrant rays of ministerial sunshine. Even the tender mercies of government have long been cruel towards us.—In the rich pastures of Ireland, many hungry paricides have fed, and grown strong to labour in its destruction. We hope the patient abiding of the meek may not always be forgotten; and God grant that the iniquitous schemes of extirpating liberty from the British empire may be soon defeated. But we should be wanting to ourselves—we should be perfidious to posterity—we should be unworthy, that ancestry from which we derive our descent, should we submit with folded arms, to military butchery and deprecation, to gratify the lordly ambition, or satiate the avarice of a British ministry. In defence of our persons and properties under actual violation, we have taken up arms; when that violence shall be removed, and hostilities cease on the part of the aggressors, they shall cease on our part. For the achievement of this happy event, we confide in the good offices of our fellow subjects beyond the Atlantic. Of their friendly disposition, we do not yet depend; aware as they must be, that they have nothing more to expect from the same common enemy, than the humble favor of being last devoured."

After an attentive perusal of the above address, written in the hour of American distress and Irish tranquility, let the following letter be read and candidly considered. It will appear to every ingenious mind, that the friends of the principles of the American revolution and constitutions in this country are thrown together by Mr. King, as malcontents and abettors of malcontents.

COPY

Of a letter from the American Minister at London, to ———, Esq. one of the Irish state prisoners.

DATED BRIGHTON, Aug. 28, 1799.

SIR,  
I ought to inform you that I really have no authority to refuse permission to you or any other foreigner, to go to the United States; the admission and residence of strangers in that country being a matter that by a late law exclusively belongs to the President. It is true that the government of this country in the course of the last year, in consequence of my interference, gave me an assurance that a particular description of persons in Ireland, who it was understood were going to the United States, should not be allowed to proceed without our consent: this restraint would doubtless be withdrawn in favor of individuals against whose emigration I should not object; and I conclude that it is upon this supposition that you have taken the trouble to communicate to me your desire to go and reside in the United States. Without pretending to form an opinion on the subject of the late disturbances in Ireland, I entertain a distinct one in relation to the political situation of my own country. In common with others we have felt the influence of the changes that have successively taken place in France, and unfortunately a portion of our inhabitants has erroneously supposed our civil and political institutions, as well as our national policy, might be moved by a close imitation of the models of France. This opinion, the propagation of which was made the duty and became the chief employment of the French agents resident among us created a more considerable division among our people, and required a greater watchfulness and activity from the government than could before have been apprehended. I am sorry to make one remark, and shall stand in need of your candor in doing so, that a large proportion of the emigrants from Ireland, and especially in our middle states, has upon this occasion arranged themselves on the side of the malcontents. I ought to except from this remark most of the enlightened and well educated Irishmen, who reside among us, and, with a few exceptions, I might confine it to the indigent and illiterate, who entertaining an attachment to freedom, are unable justly to appreciate those salutary restraints without which it degenerates into anarchy. It would be unjust to say that the Irish emigrants are more national than those of other countries, yet being a numerous, though very minor portion of our population, they are capable from causes it is needless here to explain, of being generally brought to act in concert, and under artful chiefs may be, as they have been, enlisted in most of the combinations against government. This now leads me to state, you without reserve or hesitation that I have felt in your case; on the other hand we cannot object to the increase of inhabitants from abroad, possessing capital and skill in a branch of business that with due caution, may without risk or difficulty, and with public as well as private advantage be established among us; but on the other hand if the opinions of such inhabitants are to turn them into the class of malcontents, their fortune, skill and consequent influence would make them ten fold more dangerous and they might become a disadvantage instead of a benefit to our country.

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What Mr. Wilson has written, so far as it goes, is satisfactory; and on the whole I have concluded, after this unreserved communication which I hope will be received with the same candor as it is made, to inform you, authorizing you to make use of the information, that I withdraw every objection that may be supposed to stand in the way of your being permitted to go to the United States, adding only my earnest wish, that you may carry with you an unbiased mind, may find the state of the country, as I believe you will, favourable to your views of business and its government deserving your attachment.

I must beg your excuse for the great delay that has occurred in sending you this answer, which I assure you has arisen from other causes than the want of due respect to your letter.
