By captain Harraden, who arrived yesterday, in 12 days from the Havana, we learn, that the American Consul, Mr. Gray, who had been imprisoned, was released.—The report is, that the cause of his imprisonment was, that he had been accessory to the smuggling of contraband goods into the Havana.

JAMAICA (said to be) taken by the French.
Captain Harraden has also informed us, that 2 or 3 days previous to his leaving the Havana, it was reported, and the report was credited by the first merchants there, that a French fleet, of eleven sail of the line and eight frigates, had landed troops at the North side of the Island of Jamaica—that they had taken 2 or 3 of the ports, [or points] and were on their march to Kingdon. On the 6th instant captain H. spoke an English fleet of war, one day out, from New Providence, the commander of which informed him, that Jamaica had been taken by the French. BOSTON, May 16.
LATEST FROM FRANCE.
By several late arrivals from Europe, Paris dates to the 27th March, and London to the 8th of April, have been received at this office. Beyond the recital of those rapid and extraordinary measures, which are daily taking place on the continent of Europe, through the single influence of France, and which appear to be directed by the genius of a single individual, and to the aggrandizement of a single family; they contain little intelligence of interest or importance. With respect to the aid which England has long been endeavoring to obtain on the continent for the prosecution of offensive warfare against France, opinion, which is all we are furnished with, is extremely various and contradictory; we have, however, copied every article which related to this important subject, and must leave the reader to draw his conclusions from them. [Gazette]

By an arrival in 35 days from Moulain, in France, accounts have been received from Paris to the 30th of March. Agreeably to this information, we find that the long pending business about Italy is at length determined; and that preparations were in train for the coronation of Bonaparte as king of that country; Cardinal Felschi, and the grand master of ceremonies, had departed for Milan and the Cardinal Caprara, as Archbishop of Milan, was to crown this extraordinary man with a new diadem!

Thus new dignities crowd upon this gallant captain even to an encumbrance! Where are we to look for his parallel in ancient or modern times? He has been as successful as Alexander, but has had forty times his discretion in securing by policy what he had gained by vigour and spirit. He is as brave and enterprising as Caesar, with an understanding similarly endowed and cultivated, but his delinies have a more confident and sweeter aspect. He comprehends a greater scope of authority in Europe, than Charles the fifth, and as what he has gained has been the result of his achievements, no man can aver how much more powerful he will be! Who has formed the political ladder of his dreaded greatness? Wm. Pitt, whose immeasurable impolicy and corruption has brought his own native land to the very threshold of want and humiliation; whose opposition forms the glory of his enemy, and who is only pernicious in his attachments?—When the present Emperor of France was asked (as madame Bonaparte) some years since, if her husband was not the son of a Corsican Nobleman, she replied with promptitude, "that his father was Mars, and his mother was Fortune."—In justification of this bold idea, we shall not be amazed (if Mr. Pitt is permitted to rule England for two years more) to find Bonaparte enthroned as the imperial matter of the European world!

Mr Pitt has promulgated his plan for the augmentation of the disposable force, and the reduction of the militia of Great Britain. He calculates upon gaining 17,000 men by this measure. They are to be gained as volunteers if possible, but they are to be gained at all events.

The affairs of the English, in the East-Indies, look very squally: all the India ships, outward bound, have been detained, by order of government, to take on board 5000 troops.—Providence may interfere to avenge the wrongs of the innocent Gentoos.

LONDON, APRIL 4, 1865.
CONTINENTAL ALLIANCES.
A considerable number of letters were on Saturday received from Holland by a vessel which on Friday arrived at Gravesend. One from Rotterdam, dated on Tuesday, announces, that [previous to the departure of the Russian General Wingerode from Berlin, the King presented him his picture on a snuff box, set in diamonds. His Majesty likewise delivered to him, with his own hands, a letter which he had himself written to the Emperor Alexander, containing the ultimatum of the Prussian Cabinet on the subjects which have lately been in discussion between the two Courts. Prussia, it is said, persists in her determination to oppose the military projects of Sweden, while Sweden has demanded the assistance of Russia by virtue of the first and third articles of treaty of 1799, to vindicate her independence against the menaces of Prussia. These letters, in opposition to previous and more probable accounts, say, that Lubec continued on the 29th ult. to refuse the contributions demanded by France, and had applied to the Courts of Petersburg, Berlin, and Vienna, for redress.
This morning a mail from Gottenburgh and Lisbon arrived. By the former, Government has received dispatches from Petersburg, which are said to contain positive assurances on the part of the Emperor Alexander, of an immediate & powerful co-operation against France. Orders are stated to have been issued from the Russian war department to prepare for equal service a force little short of 180,000 men.
APRIL 6, 1865.
Dispatches received yesterday from Petersburg, are confidentially stated to contain intelligence which is the subject of much uneasiness to government, and extremely different from that understood to have arrived by the Gottenburgh Mail. They were brought by Mr. Parsons, the Messenger, who was also charged with interesting communications from the Court of Stockholm. A very considerable alteration with respect to his becoming a zealous and vigorous co-operator in the prosecution of hostilities against France, is said to have taken place in the sentiments of the Emperor Alexander, who, it is now asserted, declines all decisive or active interference in the war, and contents himself with offering his assistance for effecting the restoration of general tranquility. No inconsiderable degree of credit is given to this statement by persons of very high political connections, and we understand that the sensation excited by it, is to be attributed to the depression felt yesterday by the funds. Private accounts from Petersburg, which reach to the 12th ult. do not scruple to say, that any powerful co-operation on the part of Russia cannot be expected.

LONDON, APRIL 8, 1865.
By the arrival of the Hamburg Mail, we have received the following intelligence from our Correspondent:—
HAMBURG, APRIL 2.
The closest harmony now subsists between the Courts of Prussia & France, and the former is very actively employed in adjusting differences between the latter and Russia. Letters from Petersburg of the 16th ult. even mention that Monsieur de Novosilow will shortly be sent on an extraordinary mission to Paris. Bonaparte has, it is said, as the price of a reconciliation, offered to evacuate the Electorate of Hanover. The number of the French troops in the Electorate has already been considerably diminished. The great changes, however, in the fate of Upper Italy, and the critical state of the kingdom of Naples will probably prevent this intended approximation.
The various regiments lately drawn from the French coast of the Channel have received orders to re-occupy their former positions. Every officer and private absent on furlough have been ordered to join their respective regiments, even though the leave of absence should not have expired. All the Generals are also to repair to their respective stations on the coast. Massena is to have the chief command of the Army of England Augereau that of Ireland, and Marmont that of Scotland.
Berlin letters of the 30th ult. mention, that the Russian Ambassador Extraordinary will quit that city with the answer of his Prussian Majesty on the 3d or 4th inst. Both he and his Secretary received as presents snuff boxes, worth five thousand crowns each. Gen. Zastrow is to go as Minister Plenipotentiary and Extraordinary to the Court of Petersburg.
The Brest fleet, consisting of 21 sail of the line and frigates, came out of Brest, and anchored in Carmaret Bay, where they remained 24 hours, and then returned to their old station. They appear to have an Expedition in view, some of them having hay bags on their quarters.
PHILADELPHIA, May 20.
Extract of a letter received by the ship Hannah, captain Yardsley, from Leghorn, dated February 26th, 1865.
"You will doubtless have heard that the Yellow Fever had extended itself to this country, and the unfortunate consequences it brought upon our trade; and although, for more than two months, perfect health has been happily restored to us, yet we still continue to be surrounded with Cordons on the part of our neighbouring governments, which subjects goods to a very long quarantine, and prevents our trade resuming much activity. The current rumours of peace which are lately become so very prevalent, have added, if possible, to throw colonial produce into a greater calm, and there is absolutely nothing going forward but for daily consume, so that no prices can be noted with certainty, more particularly those of sugars, of which article our deposit is considerable. I enclose you a price current, but which for reasons just observed, must be regarded simply as nominal quotations. Coffee is most in repute, and there is a greater demand for it than any other article, as it seems to be generally scarce; no lower prices can, we think, be expected for some time.
"Our stock of Pepper is immense, and more supplies are expected; prices are already materially declined, and it is probable will still go lower—with ready money at 12 dollars per cw."
