BOSTON, May 23.
Extract of a letter from Bordeaux, to a
respectable mercantile house in this
town dated April 4, 1865.
"A new law has appeared under the
date of the 3rd Ventose, (21st March)
authorizing the seizure and confiscation of
all colonial produce imported in foreign
ships, which shall not be accompanied
with certificates of the French commercial
agents, certifying that it is not the product
of any colony or country, under the dominion
of Great Britain. It will be rigorously en-
forced, even against vessels coming from
ports where no such agent resides. This
law is supplementary to one of the same
nature, of the 11 Messidor, 11th year,
(20th June, 1803,) but more severe in its
provisions, as there was a modification in
the latter by which an exportation of an
equal value in French manufactured goods,
within three months following the im-
portation, was to be considered as an exemp-
tion from all penalties, seizures, or con-
fiscations; but this privilege is no longer
allowed. Although this regulation is of
little consequence to your port, where you
are in habits of accompanying every
shipment with the document here exacted,
yet a knowledge of its existence may be
necessary to the neighboring ports, where
no commercial agent resides."

PHILADELPHIA, May 27.
Our correspondent at New York, under
date of Saturday noon, writes to us as
follows:

Extract of a letter from England.
"In the house of commons, on Mon-
day the 8th of April, a strong vote of
censure was passed against Lord Melville,
for his conduct while treasurer of the navy
—216 were in favor of this, and 216
against it; but the motion of censure was
carried by the speaker's vote.
"The motion, or rather a string of
them was founded on the 10th report of
the commissioners of inquiry into naval
abuses which is extremely interesting,
and has been published in the London
papers."

Address to the members of the three Month-
ly Meetings of FRIENDS in the city of
Philadelphia
"Our minds have been sorrowfully affec-
ted under the consideration of many failures
and bankruptcies which latter time have
taken place among us, to the wounding
the testimony of truth, the reproach of our
Christian profession, and the ruin and dis-
tress of individuals and families. Of the
causes which have led thereto we do very
fully disapprove, and declare our disun-
ity with; and as we seriously wish that more
instances of this kind may be avoided, we
think it right to warn and caution all
against improperly grasping after the things
of this world, and engaging in hazardous
undertaking out of the counsel and wildom
of truth, whereby they may be rendered
incapable of being punctual to their prom-
ises, and just in the payment of their
debts.
Repeated and salutary advices have been
given, both publicly and in private, which
if attended to would have preserved many
who have fallen into great straits and dif-
ficulties.
Many causes which might be enumer-
ated have contributed to produce these sor-
rowful effects; but there is one that has
particularly engaged our attention, to wit,
the practice of giving and taking promiss-
ory notes, called accommodation paper, &
thus improperly becoming sureties some-
times even to a greater amount than such
parties are capable of paying. How much
better would it be, to be contented with
such trade and business as is within the
reach of our capitals; and never to enter
into any engagements or promise without
providing funds of our own to comply
with them punctually?
We are also engaged to caution every
individual against imprudently entering in-
to joint securities with others; for by
these practices, many innocent wives and
children have been inevitably and unex-
pectedly involved in ruins and deplorable
circumstances. We, therefore, earnestly
desire friends to keep strictly on their
guard, that none through any specious
pretences of rendering acts of friendship
to others with safety to themselves, may
risk their own peace and reputation, and
the security of their families; in order
hereunto, we recommend the salutary ad-
vice of the wife man to their special no-
tice and regard "Be not thou one of them
that strike hands, or one of them that
are sureties for debts: If thou hast
nothing to pay, why should he take away
thy bed from under thee?"
Finally, dear friends, we recommend all
to attend carefully to the principle of
grace and truth in their own minds, which
is sufficient to preferve and keep us from
falling, and leads to do jully, love mercy,
and walk humbly.
