

Ship John and James, Langford, leaving for Barracoa, on her passage from Baltimore, has been liberated and arrived at St. Jago de Cuba.

Henry H. L. jun. Esq. of New York, has been appointed Consul for the United States, at the port of Havana.

The Russian flag was hoisted in the capital of the Seven Islands on the 24th of December, the emperor's birth day; the force in Corfu is stated at ten thousand. There were in the roads two sail of the line, and 4 large ships with troops, six sail of the line with troops, under the command of Admiral Crouse (an Englishman) were hourly expected.

A letter from a gentleman in London under date of the 9th April, to his friend in Philadelphia (says the United States Gazette) mentions that American premiums had risen in consequence of the capture of American vessels by the Spaniards.

We have received a Liverpool Price Current of the 11th April, but not in time to appear in this day's Gazette. The following remarks are contained in the letter which accompanies it:—

"From the annexed price current, you will see that our cotton market is dull; in fact so little is doing, that it is scarcely possible to quote a selling price, and many of those now stated are nominal. The reports here have been heavy; and there are arrivals almost daily; but this port appears to be drawing the bulk of the cotton to us, and the quantities in other places are very light. The manufacturers must be badly stocked; but their trade is dull in the extreme, and the continental are still backward. Fair New Orleans has been sold at 2s and 2s 1d and Upland 2 1/2 and 2 1/4. In fact the state of the trade is such, that no sales can be effected without giving way a little in price, and there is an alarm amongst many of the holders.

"The accounts of the arrival of the French fleet in the West Indies has caused considerable alarm; this, with statements of the capture of some American vessels, and a rumor that the Spaniards and French will capture all neutrals to land from this kingdom, has rendered the underwriters so timid, that we cannot get them to name a premium to New Orleans on goods in a vessel which they a few days ago underwrote at 2 1/2 per cent. and it is the fate to the Atlantic states. We hope something certain will be known ere long.

"From some recent statements, there is little probability of assistance from the continental powers against France at present."

By a gentleman from the Missouri, intelligence has been received, that war-belts have been sent, probably from the Sac nation of Indians, to the southern and northern tribes on this side of the Mississippi, and to various tribes on the western side of the river. The object of this mission is, to engage those nations in a common cause against the Ofages, who are represented as the enemies of all the other nations of Indians. It is likewise their intention to cut the whole

of the Ofages off, being deemed extremely perfidious and vindictive to the other tribes, and from their force capable of robbing and destroying those who are compelled to resort to their neighbors in pursuit of game. The gentleman who brings this intelligence, says, it is expected that the Ofages in case of attack, will apply for assistance to the government of Upper Louisiana, by which means it is there feared, that the United States will be induced to take up arms in their defence.

The following is the reply of the minister of Portugal to Mr. Fitzgerald's letter on the subject of the manifesto published by the Prince of Peace at Madrid, and copied into the Official Gazette at Lisbon.

SIR, I have received your note of the 25th January, having relation to an article in the supplement of the Gazette of Lisbon, containing a faithful translation of an article extracted from the Gazette of Madrid of the 20th December. I confess, sir, that after having had the honor to express verbally the reasons authorizing insertion I had hoped you would be fully convinced that there existed no valid ground for exciting suppression. I am confident that the said article has been transcribed into all the Gazettes of Europe, and I am persuaded that none of the ministers of England will have demanded from the governments near which they reside, a similar exclusion of that official paper. If acts of such a description should be omitted in political Gazettes, what would they be permitted to republish?

I must also inform you, sir, to terminate the doubts you express on the subject, that the insertion of the said official paper in the Portuguese Gazette has been made with the knowledge of the government, because it does not think itself compromised in the transcription of any official act published in the other Gazettes of Europe and under the head of foreign countries. Such articles, faithfully copied and unaccompanied with remarks, are never a proof of either approbation or disapprobation on the part of the government permitting the republication.

I confess, sir, that I cannot perceive how any person can find in this the least cause of offence. The same article, a little later might have been copied from the English Gazettes, in which without doubt they have been published. Besides, you know, sir, at the close of discussions on a similar subject, which have taken place before my ministry, his Royal Highness the Prince Regent has already declared to you that official publications on the part of the English government might be equally translated into the Gazette of Lisbon. I proffer of this occasion to renew the assurance of my consideration, &c.

From French Papers. A variety of Decrees has been issued by the Consulta to the people of Italy, on the subject of their new Government; all of which are replete with fulsome adulation on the genius and character of Bonaparte. One of these proclamations, after an explanation of the new measures about to be adopted adds the following apostrophe:—People of Italy, expand your hearts to hope and to exertion! From this moment commence the course of your brilliant destinies! To what glory and prosperity ought you not to aspire? Your King will soon be amongst you; he will go less to ornament his august head with the crown than to witness your wants, and to provide a definitive organization to secure your tranquillity.

On Tuesday the Registers are to be opened in every city throughout the Bavarian Republic, for inserting the names of the voters in favour of or against the intended Constitution. It is declared that all persons who may not wish to vote, are to be considered as having given their suffrages in favour of the new proposition.
