

fire hundred dollars, or imprisonment for a time not exceeding six months: nor shall any beef or pork be sold at auctions within the same period, under the penalty of 25 dollars.

Boarding houses shall be kept neat and clean, and no more lodgers shall be admitted than the city inspector shall think proper, under a penalty of 25 dollars for each person exceeding such number. The city inspector or his agent shall, likewise, examine them at least once a week, during the summer. Persons taken sick in boarding houses, between the first day of June and the first November, must be reported to the health office, within twelve hours after they are so taken, under the penalty of one hundred dollars or six months imprisonment.

Butchers shall bring no gut fat into the market, nor the head or trotters of any sheep or lamb, nor any hides or skins, (calves skins excepted) under penalty of two dollars.—They shall, likewise, immediately after killing any animal, destroy the offals, or convey the same into the river, under penalty of twenty five dollars. They shall not expose to sale any stale or unwholesome provisions, under the penalty of ten dollars.

All dirt and filth shall be brought out from houses, cellars, yards and lots on sweeping days before 10 o'clock in the morning, under the penalty of two dollars.

Garbage, shells and offal shall daily be delivered to Bell carts, under one dollar for each neglect; nor shall they at any time be cast into the street, except on the morning of sweeping days, before ten o'clock, under the penalty of two dollars.

No sexton shall inter any person who may die of pestilential or malignant fever, in any place to the southward of Pump and Nicholas streets, under the penalty of one hundred dollars; nor shall they inter any corpse within the above limits, except in graves or vaults at least six feet deep and without removing any other dead body or coffin, under the same penalty.

No privy shall be emptied, during the summer except between the hours of 11 o'clock at night and three in morning, under the penalty of five dollars; nor shall any human excrements be thrown in any street, lane, alley, dock, &c. under the penalty of ten dollars.

No new made ground shall be turned up, during the summer under the penalty of 25 dollars.

Gutters shall be thoroughly scraped out and cleaned on sweeping days, under penalty of two dollars.

Noisome or offensive substances shall not be deposited in any place to the southward of Grand street, nor shall any pit for tanners and skimmers, or pool of stagnant water be allowed except in Beekman's swamp, under penalty of five dollars.

Manufactories which emit offensive smells may likewise, be suspended by the Board of Health.

No oysters shall be brought into or sold in the city, between the 1st day of June and 13th September, under the penalty of two dollars for every hundred.

Undressed skins, hides, blubber, &c. shall not be kept to the southward and westward of Catharine-street and the fresh water pond, under five dollars for every twenty four neglects.

Putrid and unsound provisions shall be destroyed by starting them into the river, and no salted or pickled fish, except smoked, shall be kept to the southward of Grand street, between 1st May and 1st October, under the penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars or imprisonment not exceeding six months.

Nuisances of every other description must be removed or remedied, agreeably to the mode prescribed by the City Inspector under the penalty of five dollars for every 24 hours neglect. And in addition to the penalties prescribed in cases of nuisances by the statutes of the states and ordinances of the city, the remedies by common law may likewise be enforced.

Any Physician having a patient labouring under a pestilential or infectious disease, shall forthwith report in writing to one of the Commissioners of the Health Office, under the penalty of fifty dollars.

The Board of Health being conscientiously impressed with the opinion that these laws, if duly observed, are well calculated, under the blessings of Divine Providence, to avert pestilential diseases from our city, conceive it to be their duty to inform the public that they are determined rigorously to enforce their observance, by exacting the several penalties therein contained for neglect or violation; and as they are persuaded that the thinking part of the community will see the necessity of paying a strict attention to those laws, they earnestly request that when any violation shall take place, information may be lodged at the office of the city-inspector, in order that a prompt and adequate remedy may be applied.

The board will conclude this address by commending their fellow citizens on the state of Health which we now enjoy, and which in so populous a city, is almost unparalleled at this season of the year, and they think it proper further to inform the public that they may at all times ascertain with precision the state of health by recurring to the weekly bills of mortality, published by the city inspector, which being collected with the greatest care and speed forth to the world without reserve or disguise, may always be relied on as cor-

By Deagle's Norfolk Packet, which arrived yesterday afternoon in 27 hours from Norfolk, the editors received, from their correspondent, the *Norfolk Gazette* of the 25th inst. from which they extract the following articles:

NORFOLK, JULY 25.

By Charleston papers to the 9th inst. we observe, that the ship *Two Friends*, captured off that harbor by a French privateer, has been retaken and carried into one of the B.umas.

Arrived, schr. New York, Jefferson, 5 days from N. York. On Friday morning off Chingoteague saw a frigate standing to the northward, hoisted our colors, she immediately shewed the American flag; supposed her to be one of our frigates from the Mediterranean.

Extract of a letter from Liverpool, dated May 28.

"I must observe the general situation of trade here at present is far from holding out a flattering prospect, being almost unprecedently dull and languid, arising as you will readily imagine out of the state of uncertainty and apprehension which prevails, concerning the French & Spanish combined fleets which sailed from Cadiz.

Messrs. PRINTERS,
THE books of Hamilton Moore, by Blount and others, on the subject of navigation now in general use, lay down the island of Carvo and Flores (Azores) the first in longitude 31, and the latter in 29, 54, a distance of sixty-six miles east and west from each other—I have lately had occasion to see those islands, they being in the track of our commerce to the south of Europe, and I find that they lay parallel to each other, in nearly a north and south direction. Admitting that Fayal and the other islands are laid down correct, which I believe to be the case—both Carvo and Flores are in long. 31, or nearly so.—This error has doubtless been the occasion of serious inconvenience to many of our ships, and that it should have remained unnoticed and uncorrected to the present day, must excite astonishment to the mind of any man the least acquainted with nautical affairs.

An extraordinary Phenomenon.
A correspondent writes from Fairfax, in this state, nearly as follows:—On the 16th ult. as I was at Mr. Theophilus Morrill's, in St. Albans, in company with several others, towards the close of the day, our attention was suddenly roused by the appearance of large quantities of a small bird called the Chimney-swallow, which continued to increase with the greatest rapidity for some minutes, the main body of which appeared to be hovering round the top of an old basswood tree: we advanced a little nigher and perceived they were gradually making their flight into the hollow of a tree about 20 rods distant, which, I conclude, must have been their winter habitation. When it was found that nearly all of them had retired within the cavity of this tree, it was very soon determined to fell the same, and in doing which, the tree was not broken; but such a fluttering of the little inhabitants from each end of the trunk was almost beyond conception. After viewing this scene for some time with astonishment, a hole was cut about six inches square near the middle of the tree, from whence I took 5 or 6 at a time with my hand. About twenty minutes elapsed after the tree fell before they had all quit it. The hollow of the tree has since been measured, and found to be about 50 feet long, and, on average, was 28 inches in diameter. The investigation of this singular occurrence we leave to the philosopher, and the curious enquirer.
