We could, if we were so disposed, humble the pride of Mr. Brown, and level him in the dust of humiliation: for this purpose, we did intend to have cruelly torn to atoms, his loose and natty tatty production of yesterday; but want of leisure, from other, more important avocations, aided by the intervention of sweet smiling pity, prevents us from plying the lash of severity at this time. We would here observe, "we wish to live in peace with all mankind;" and, in the present campaign, we have the sweet reflection, that we did not strike the first blow!

By the President, Dixon, from Nassau, (New Providence), we have received papers to the 16th ult. but they are barren of intelligence.

By Capt. Gould's packet (arrived yesterday) we have received the *Norfolk Ledger*, of the 2d instant, from which we have selected the following articles:—

The ship *Martha*, of this port was spoken July 28th, 3 days out from Norfolk.

The *Fame*, Hart, from this port for N. Orleans was spoken July 25, in lat. 29, long. 70, out 12 days.

The ships *Ann*, Bradford, of Alexandria, bound to Teneriffe and Baltimore, and *Venus*, Cunningham, from Amsterdam for do. were left at Cadiz, June 17, the former to sail the 18th and the latter the 20th June.

**NORFOLK, August 2.**  
Captain Hunley, of the schooner *Jason*, from Madeira, arrived here yesterday—in lat. 34, 49, long. 42, 08, on the 29th of June, fell in with Admiral Nelson's fleet of 13 sail of the line in pursuit of the combined fleet; the morning before, the *Spencer*, one of the fleet, had picked up a French made bucket, which trifling circumstance induced a lively hope, that the French and Spanish fleets were not far off, and that they were upon the track of them. If captain H. is correct in the number of ships of the line, admiral Nelson must have been joined by one ship since he left Antigua.

It appears from the information given to captain Ferris, of the brig *Jesse*, that lord Nelson has steered to the southward and eastward; being on the 21st July in the lat. 31, 20, long. 64, 10—comparing this account with the preceding article, we find it difficult to hazard a conjecture, as to his lordship's destination; nor can we imagine where he could have been from the 29th of June to the 21st of July, the time when he was spoken by captain Hunley—in 22 days he had got little more than three degrees to the southward, and about two degrees to the eastward.

To the Streghts of Gibraltar we cannot suppose admiral Nelson is bound, as he was too far to the southward. To the West-Indies he cannot be bound, as in that case he never would have been 22 days in getting three degrees to the southward. The only probable conjecture which we dare hazard is, that between the 29th of June and the 21st of July, admiral Nelson gave up the pursuit towards Europe, perhaps about the 10th July. And when he was spoken by the *Regulator*, he might have been on his return to the West Indies. In this way, and in this way only can we account for his situation on the 21st July.

**General Moreau.**—By captain Ferris we learn that this distinguished and persecuted man, had taken his passage in the ship *New York*, captain George, and was to sail on the 27th June for Philadelphia.

On Monday last the United States frigate *Adams*, capt. Murray, dropped down from the Navy Yard, and on the same evening she reached Alexandria, where it was expected she would only remain part of next day. From the well known bravery of our seamen, we may expect much, should they fall in with any of those picarons which so lately infested our coast.

We are informed that a new arrete of the Haytian government is received in this city, [Philadelphia.] It enacts that all vessels coming into their ports shall have their cargoes consigned to a resident (Black we presume) merchant, who previous to being permitted to an entry, shall give bonds to double the amount of the duties accruing on such cargoes.—This decree has been issued for the purpose of securing to the administration the punctual payment of its duties.

A gentleman, who was for some time a prisoner in Barracoa (Cuba) lately arrived in this city from that place, and handed us the following account of the privateers fitting out at that port, with a request that it might be published for the information of those concerned in the West India trade.

*La Constance*—Captain Furis, two 9's—45 men and 26 sweeps—(painted black.)

*Voltaire*—Captain Jaca, two 9's—40 men and 20 sweeps—(painted black.)

*Marblanc*—Captain —; two 9's—43 men, 20 sweeps—(painted black, with yellow bottom.)

*Defiance*—Captain —; two 9's—49 men, 20 sweeps—(painted black, with yellow bottom.)

*La Dologne*—Captain —; two 9's—45 men, 20 sweeps; (painted black.)

*Beauty*—Captain —; two 6's—40 men, 20 sweeps.

Two feluccas, one 4 pounder each and 22 men—and two schooners, to carry 2 guns each and 40 men.

Capt. Culver, of the brig *Eliza*, Hamilton, arrived yesterday, obligingly furnished us with a St. Croix paper of the 12th of July, from which we extract the following

**PUBLICATION.**

The following regulations, which have this day been communicated to both Custom-houses of this island, are hereby made known to the trading part of the community, viz.

1. All sorts of goods, without exception, may be imported to St. Croix, from all foreign places, provided said goods be imported either in Danish, European, American, or vessels belonging to our Danish West-India Islands.
2. No foreign goods are contraband, except those imported in foreign European vessels, which goods remain henceforth, as they hitherto have been prohibited.

3 The duties to be paid on such foreign goods from all foreign places are as follows: *When imported in Danish European vessels:*  
Articles denominated necessary, 5 per ct.  
Do. less necessary, 7 per ct.  
Do. of luxuries, 10 per ct.  
*When imported in American vessels:*  
Articles denominated necessary, 5 per ct.  
Do. less necessary, 10 per ct.  
Do. of luxuries, 15 per ct.  
When imported in our own vessels belonging to our islands, in the same manner as when imported in Danish European vessels:  
Which above mentioned regulations commence from the 1st July.
