

he proposes, whenever "he can call the land his own," to erect a prospect house, commanding the interesting distant objects of Madras and Calcutta, and the whole Hindostan country. Spain and Portugal, and Etruria and Naples, are merely his surrounding tenantry. He wants Sweden very much for an ice-house. He has not as yet, turned his imperial mind to the erection of a Mausoleum. When he comes to England, he will, most probably, find there his Tomb, in which he may repose gloriously, in the midst of his gallant companions in arms.

The Donkeys at Brighton are alternately employed by *belles* and *smugglers*. They carry *angels* by day and *spirits* by night.

Austria is said to have demanded an explicit explanation of Bonaparte, respecting his further designs on Italy. A letter from Milan mentions that the seat of the Italian government will shortly be removed to Rome, "the ancient metropolis of the world," and that fears are entertained that Naples will next fall under Napoleon.

NEW-YORK, August 14.

By captain Sterling from Amsterdam we have received several files of Dutch papers to the 26th of June, but they afford very little intelligence of an interesting nature. In the *Mercury* of the 22d of June, we find a letter from captain Almes, of the French privateer *Hirondelle*, from Dunkirk, enumerating the captures he had made, the last of which was the British Packet *Queen Charlotte*, captain Mudge, from New-York; which vessel, he says, he immediately fitted out as a privateer.

Captain S. informs us that eight sail of the line, and about 100 transports full of troops, were lying in the roads; and that a British squadron was off the Texel, which suffered American vessels to pass without molestation.

It was the opinion of well informed men in Amsterdam that the terms offered by France would be acceded to by the English ministry, and that a general pacification was an event not very remote.

The ship *Alexander*, Vosc, of and from this port, arrived at London in 29 days. A letter from a passenger on board mentions that the ship *Thomas*, Macaulay, from New York, for Hull, had been fallen in with at sea, having five feet water in her hold, and it was feared would not be able to make a port. She had received injury from some bodies of ice.

On Thursday were examined and committed to gaol in Boston by Judge Bourne, John H. Nichols and William Tucker, old notorious offenders, for forging and uttering two checks or orders, purporting to be signed by William Gray, esq. of Salem.

[We believe Nichols, mentioned above, is the same who stood in the pillory at Boston on the 2d of May last, for counterfeiting.]

The store of Mr. William Lait, jun. was broken into on Sunday by some person who entered it the back way, and broke open the panel of the door. Nothing of value, however, was taken away. A black man, who was seen jumping over the fence, is supposed to be the perpetrator of this burglary.

From Dutch papers to June 26th.

LOWER ELBE, June 11.

It has been reported at Hamburg and other places, that the Swedish army assembling at Schoonen, and to consist of 10,000 men, was to be conveyed to England; this report is however flatly contradicted in letters from Copenhagen, and other northern places.

A great scarcity of grain at present prevails in Bohemia. Supplies are sending thither from the Prussian countries.

The celebrated Ismael-Bassa of Jean d'Acre, who had converted to his own use the treasures of Djeddar, Bassa, arrived at Constantinople on the 27th of April, and, after a summary trial, was beheaded. On the 28th in the morning, his head was exhibited on a silver dish on one of the outer gates of the Seraglio.

The Grand Segnior has destined a squadron for the Mediterranean this summer, perfectly equipped, armed and manned; a division of which, consisting of 2 ships of the line, 3 frigates, 4 corvettes, and other small vessels, lately sailed for the Ionian Sea.

SCHEDAM, June 18.

It seems a report has been circulated, that Hanover would be evacuated by the French troops, and occupied by those of another power; this, however, is contradicted in a letter from Berlin; as well as the assertion, that Sweden had ceded Pomerania to the emperor of Russia.

June 31—Their high mightinesses, representing, the Batavian Republic assembled on the 18th; and on the 19th, they still continued their deliberations.

Several companies of French and Batavian troops have marched this week for the camp near Zeist, from Amsterdam, Leyden and Delft.

Letters from Constantinople mention, that two grand councils of the ministers of the Porte have been lately held, on the subject of a triple alliance between England, the Porte, and another power. It is said by some that this treaty is already signed; and by others, that the Turkish ministry continued to manifest no inconsiderable portion of irresolution.

LISBON, May 15.

The Court Gazette of to-day contains the following article: "At this moment, there is an American at Gibraltar, who cherishes the base

Capt Lockwood informs, that the port of La- gaira was opened on the 25th of May for the introduction of flour, oil and butter, and on the 14th June it was shut, and opened again on the 16th June for twenty days for the above articles. On the 16th of July it was finally shut, and, it is said, will remain so during the war. The vessels in the port on the 14th June, were permitted to dispose of their cargoes, of what- ever articles they might consist. Those which entered on the 16th, or between that and the 6th July, were confined strictly to the dispos- al of the articles above mentioned. Many of these vessels have been waiting for three or four weeks in expectation of obtaining permission to discharge generally, but without success. It is probable they will eventually be obliged to seek

another market, their cargoes consisting prin- cipally of dry goods. (N. E. Paper.)

Yesterday morning, about one o'clock, the city was alarmed with the cry of Fire, which originated in Mr. Evans' bake-house, Franklin-lane, and for some time threatened very serious injury to the lower part of South-street and its vicinity.—The bake-house was totally destroyed, with a large quantity of bread, flour, &c.—Mr. Denmead, cabinet-maker, also suffered considerably from a large pile of wood being burnt, and otherwise so much injured as to be use- less.—On the part of the sufferers, we are requested to express their unfeigned obligations for the exertions of their fellow-citizens in repressing the devas- tations of the flames, and their activity in removing those articles most easily damaged.—Their alacrity and energy in stopping the progress of the fire, cannot be too strongly praised. [Evening Post.]

Some time during the last spring, it was announced that a combination of the Indi- an tribes east of the Mississippi, had been formed against the Osages, or Washasah, up the Missouri. Since that period, the account of this expedition has been doubt- ed. We have now to inform our readers that the intelligence has recently been confirmed by a Chickasaw Indian, who, with his companion, was in Lexington a few weeks past. He says that not only his own nation have actually sent forward their warriors, but that the Cherokee, Chactaw, and all the other tribes to the north had started on the expedition. FROM A LATE LIVERPOOL PAPER.

Shipping Intelligence Extraordinary.

The Henry Dundas and William Pitt were under orders to sail for Botany Bay, but on stripping off some of the copper sheathing, their boards are found to be un- serviceable, and their underworks so bad that they are to be immediately sent into the dock and it is thought they will be con- demned. They are shewy vessels, and have run a long while, but they have al- most ruined the owners, and it is high time they should be broken up.

The Lord Eldon is still at sea. She is a very slow sailer; and what with the quantity of rubbish and heavy lumber she has on board, and her bad rigging, it is difficult to know when she may come to an anchor. Many persons are reduced to great distress in consequence of her tedious voyages.

The Admiral Nelson was misled by false lights, and it is feared, has lost her voyage.

The Orde turns out to be a very nimble sailer. Nothing can keep up with her.

The Hawkesbury is not yet an old ship, but being built in the merchant's yard, she looks more like a trader than a man of war, and her materials are very flimsy and ill put together. She was found un- fit for a foreign station, and therefore brought into the home service. After all, it is supposed she must be cut down into a lower rate.

When the Canning was first taken into the service she was intended for a 64; but she makes a contemptible figure in the water, rolling and shifting her bal- last at such a rate that she appears fit for nothing but to repeat signals or crack pa- tereroes.

The Castlereagh tacks quicker than any ship in the service, excepting the Per- cival. Yet they are mere craft, and fit only for five-ships.

The Doctor Henry is waterlogged, but she still keeps the royal flag displayed.— If she goes down there will be no raising her again.

The Old Hibernia is still a noble vessel—but she has received so much damage from the Castlereagh, the Union, Test, and other scurvy craft, that in case of an engagement, it is supposed by some she would not answer the helm.

The Britannia has had the misfortune to get amongst rocks and quicksands, by the incapacity and misconduct of the pilot. If she remains long in her present situation she must inevitably go to pieces. There are people of skill and experience on board who pointed out the errors of the pilot, and are capable of still restoring the ship; but the chief officers will take no advice, the petty officers (like their masters) are plundering the stores and the crew are carelessly looking on and amus- ing themselves.
