

15 a 16, but we do not advise purchases of Sea Islands.

The quality of cotton from the Mississippi is complained of this year very much, being generally very soft and deficient in staple.

Premiums continue very uncertain, and it is with difficulty, even at exorbitant rates, that the underwriters can be prevailed upon to cover vessels from New Orleans which are in the smallest degree out of time.

We have accounts of the arrival of the combined fleets at Martinique, but as they had remained there for some days, and there is no account of their sailing, it has given rise to various conjectures.

The prices of sugar, coffee, and produce, may be generally considered as uncertain, till something decisive be known—but cotton cannot be improved, as the islands take off many of our goods, and the depression the capture of them would occasion, would counteract any effect from the detention of a part of the supplies; and we much doubt whether this would not eventually be the case in other articles of produce.

Extract of a letter from a mercantile house at Bordeaux, to a merchant in this city, dated June 26, 1805.

"We had the pleasure of addressing you on the 12th March; since which, our market has experienced a considerable depression, owing principally to the season of the year, and the late movements of the French fleets.

"Our supply of tobacco is very great; for which, at present there is not the least demand. Muscovado sugar, coffee, cotton, cocoa, roucou and indigo, are safe articles, and towards fall will doubtless meet a current sale at advantageous prices.

"A commission is appointed for the liquidation of the St. Domingo bills; we fear, however, it will be a long time before a final adjustment takes place."

KINGSTON, July 29. His honor the lieut.
