

Yesterday the editor received, from his correspondent at Nassau, his file of the Royal Gazette up to the 13th ult. Their contents are uninteresting and only afford a few articles of ship news.

FOR THE AMERICAN.

Mr. PECHIN, YOUR paper having a general circulation thro' the country, I would think it very appropos, if you would notice, under the editorial department, the arrival of two ships, with the fall trade—The Independence and Ceres; by which vessels most of the Dry Goods Merchants have received a portion of their assortments. It answers a better purpose than circular letters, as 'tis more talked of, by the country merchants. The ship Four Sisters from Hull is daily looked for, a ship having arrived that sailed in company with her; and the Diana & Fame, regular ships, and a ship from London may likewise be daily looked for: and from this it would appear that the Fall Trade will open unusually early this season. It would not be amiss, to notice the favourable state of the health of the city, and the great security of country merchants in visiting us—thus attentions are not only flattering, but beneficial to our townsmen.

Let such notices be continued a few days, and repeated when other Fall ships arrive.

[The last request of "a subscriber," we hope will be satisfactorily obviated, as the season progresses, by the advertisements of our various mercantile friends.]

Captain Taylor, of the brig Eliza, arrived yesterday from Malaga and Gibraltar, 30 days from the latter place, has politely furnished us with the following important remarks, made during his passage:—

July 20—This day I sailed from Malaga, in company with the brig Diana, of Rhode Island, captain Simmons; and the Washington, of Marblehead, captain Adams. The latter was from Leghorn, bound to Boston; he was captured by a Spanish gun boat, brought to Malaga, and treated with great impoliteness. The keys of his trunk were detained from him, and his vessel kept three weeks; for what reason, the American consul could not tell. Capt. Adams had to pay twelve hundred and ten dollars before he was released. Captain Simmons had been carried into Algiers, and his cargo of flour was condemned, for want of a certificate from a Spanish consul.

In the Bay of Gibraltar, captain Taylor saw Lord Nelson's fleet at anchor, and was boarded by an officer from one of his ships, who stated that the British fleet left Barbadoes on the 14th June, and had followed, as they supposed, in the wake of the combined fleets, until they arrived off the coast of France; when, having every reason to suppose that the French and Spaniards had got safely into Brest, Lord Nelson stood away for Gibraltar, where he arrived on the 19th July.

The same day, I spoke a Portuguese seventy-four gun ship; by which I was informed, that the Tripolitans had made peace with the Americans.

On the same day, spoke the brig Clio, of Philadelphia, captain Gamble from Trieste, bound to Philadelphia, out thirty days.

On the 22d of June, sir Richard Bickerton passed the Rock of Gibraltar with five sail of the line, and took thirty sail of transports, with 6000 troops, and proceeded on to Egypt, there being a report that the French had got out with two seventy-fours, with 6000 troops, and had been joined by five Spanish frigates, and gone up the Mediterranean; but their destination was not known.

The Spaniards take all American vessels, without distinction.

Captain Taylor farther informs, that some days before he left Malaga, Mr. Kirkpatrick, the American consul there, mentioned to him that it had been his opinion for some time that hostilities would positively take place between Spain and the United States, but that latterly the aspect of affairs was of a more pacific appearance, as Mr. Pinckney, the American minister, who had proceeded as far as Lisbon on his way home, had returned, or was returning to Madrid: Captain Taylor did not learn whether his return was owing to an invitation from the Spaniards' ministry; however, it is reasonable to suppose, that if he has returned, the proposal must have come from them.

[Charleston steamer.

By a list of the Post offices in the United States, just published, there appears to be fifteen hundred and seventy-seven offices. Nothing can be more characteristic of the policy of our government than the rapid extension of this department; by which so many channels of information are opened, and so many checks opposed to public imposition. It

is unquestionably a sound principle that all the receipts of this department should go to its improvement and extension. Otherwise a tax is imposed upon an object which might even justify a bounty. Indeed it could not fail to afford much satisfaction to the people, were Congress permanently to appropriate the whole sum received by this department, from the postage of letters and newspapers, to facilitating and ameliorating its arrangements. On Thursday, the 1st ultimo as the wife of Mr. Presbury Devol, of Waterford, was attempting to strike fire by means of a musket, which unknown to her had been loaded with five rifle balls, it unfortunately went off and sent its contents through the thigh of her daughter, a child about two years old, which fractured it in a shocking manner that no hopes are entertained for its recovery. Mr. Devol had used the musket for the purpose of striking fire after it was loaded, but had taken care to prevent the fire from communicating to the charge, which his wife (not knowing it to be loaded) had not done. The anguish of the parents is better conceived than described and those only who know the ties which unite a child to a mother's heart, and who have felt the pains of separation under the most trying circumstances can judge of what must be felt by the unhappy mother. From the Merchants' Coffee-House Books.

September 4—Arrived,

Schooner Greyhound, Gardner, 15 days from Havanna—Sugars—A. Usher. Left there 19th ult. brig S. W. Boyle, for Baltimore in 8 days; Alliance, Cortel, of do. for Mariel; sch'r. Fanny, Hancock, for Baltimore in 4 days; Prudence, Fingon, do. 3 days; and Eliza, do. uncertain; brig Hibernia, do. do. and 140 others belonging to the different ports. The brig William, of Newburyport for Baltimore, sailed 2 days before. The schrs. Eliza Vickery, Vickery, and President, Jones for do. the day before.

On the 7th August captain G. saw a sailor at Havanna that belonged to a sch'r

taken with the bri Jane of this port, he informed him that the brig had been carried into Barracoa—that on the approach of the privateer to people all deserted their quarters and ran below, except 12 men; that all these who stood the deck were killed. Mr Fanning of this place, (a passenger) was killed in attempting to set fire to the magazine, as previously concerted between him and the captain, to "blow her up rather than be taken." The captain before killed shot his mate and one man for deserting their quarters. He had given the helm to the mate while the privateer was leaning down to board, with orders to keep the brig too, waiting for her to get well up to his quarters to give her a full broadside, with an intention to sink her; but when the privateer got nearly up, the mate left the helm, and the brig flew up in the wind, which caused such confusion, that she ran alongside, boarded and carried her. The captain received three mortal wounds, of which he died.

Also, arrived schr. Plato, Fleetwood, 21 days from Cape-Francois, coffee and sugar, John Yeiser, jun. Sailed 14th ult. Left schrs. Hyland, Luckett, Providence; & Wallace, of Alexandria, just arrived; Mary Ann, Barsden, of New-York, do; brig George, Lampler, of Alexandria, for Baltimore, in 20 days. The schr. Satellite, Hull, for Baltimore, sailed 10 days before.

Heard that the ship Mary, and three schrs. from Baltimore, had arrived at Aux Cayes.

Also, Bremen ship Martha Margaretto, Deisacks, 5 days from Lisbon—salt—the master. August 9, lat. 36, long. 62, spoke a British 50 gun ship which had in tow a French 74, taken while she was dismantled, an accident that happened to her shortly before in a gale of wind. August 27, spoke ship Atalanta, from Liverpool, for Norfolk.

His Majesty's sloop of war Stork, capt. Le Ceyt and schooner Fidget, (as tender) sailed on Sunday on a cruise. Also, the cutter British Tar, captain Feast, for Guernsey, and a cruise.

The schooner San Francisco, tender to his Majesty's ship Echo, has been sunk after an action of some hours with two Spanish privateers. The crew of the tender were saved, and have been taken and carried prisoners into Pensacola.

The Spanish armed brig lately mentioned in this Gazette, taken by the sloop of war Bachante, Charles Dashwood, esq. commander, on her way to this port, has been retaken and carried into Pensacola.

The schr. Olive Branch, (formerly of New York) with fustic and brazilletto, sent in by the Alexandrine, arrived here on Sunday.
