No. 1.—Quarantine Declaration.—As to the growth, produce, or manufacture of the following goods, that is to say, Apparel of all kinds, Artificial Flowers, Bast, or any article made thereof, Berds, Bracelets, or Necklaces in strings; Beds, Bed Ticks, Books, Brooms of all sorts, Brushes of all sorts, Burdets, Camblets, Canvas, Carmina Wool, Carpets, Cordage not tarred, Cotton Wool, Cotton Yarn, Cotton Thread; All Articles wholly made of or mixed with Cotton, Silk, Wool, Thread, or Yarn; Down, Feathers, Flax, Furriers Waste, Goats Hair, Gold or Silver on Thread, Cotton, Hair, Wool, or Silk, or any other Substance hereinbefore enumerated; Grogram, Hats, Caps, or Bonnets of Straw, Chip, Cane, or any other Material; Hemp, Hoofs, Horn and Horn Tips, Hair of all Sorts, Leather, Linen, Liquor of any Kind in Bottles or Flasks; Lutestrings, Catlings, or Harpstrings; Maps, Mattresses, Mats and Matting, Mohair Yarn, Nets, new or old, Paper, Packthread, Parchment, Pelts, Plating of Bast, Chip, Cane, Straw, or Horse Hair; Quills, Rags, Sails and Sail Cloth; Silk, viz. Crapes and Tiffanies, Husk and Knubs, Raw Silk, Thrown & Organzine Silk; Waste Silk Wrought do, Skins, Hides, & Furs, & Parts of Pieces of Skins, Hides, and Furs, whether undressed or in Part, or wholly tanned, tawed, or dressed; Sponges, Straw, or any Article made of, or mixed with Straw; Stockings of all Sorts, Thread, Tow, Vellum, Whisks, Wool, whether raw or anywise wrought; Yarn of all Sorts.

Extract of a letter from capt. Bainbridge, on board the Constitution frigate,

MALTA, June 8, 1805.
I am here with all the officers of the late frigate Philadelphia in good health, having been liberated in consequence of a

treaty, honorable to our country, made with the Bashaw of Tripoli, on the 3d instant.

I have solicited a Court of Enquiry, which I expect will be held in about 8 days."

An obliging commercial friend, yesterday, favored the editor with a file of *The (Schedam, Holland) Mercury*, to the 29th June.—The press of matter of more importance, has confined us to the following selection, which embraces the most interesting articles.—Should nothing occur of more importance, further extracts from their contents, will be given in our next.

SCHEDAM, June 21.
According to the French papers of the 17th inst. a privateer arrived at Nantes, has brought intelligence that the Combined Fleets had accomplished the first object of their destination; and these papers add, that the Merchants of Liverpool will shortly be sensible of their further operations. Motives of prudence, however, they say, impel them to observe a strict silence.

The Chevalier de Bouigny, who has resided in the Hague, as Minister Plenipotentiary from his Catholic Majesty, and who is now going, in the same quality, to the Court of Stockholm, departed from thence on the 18th inst. with his family for Hamburg, from whence he will proceed for the place of his destination.

Count von Lewenhielm, the Swedish Ambassador, having obtained leave from his Court to travel, on the 18th presented M. Tersmeden to his Excellency the Pensionary of this Republic, that gentleman being to reside here in the mean time as Swedish Charge d'Affaires.

We hear, that A. B. G. van Dedem tot de Gelder, will resume his post at the Court of Berlin, and that he will leave the Hague for that capital in the course of a few days.

Their High Mightinesses, representing the Batavian Republic assembled on the 18th; and on the 12th, they still continued their deliberations.

Several Companies of French and Batavian troops have marched this week for the Camp near Zeist, from Amsterdam, Leyden and Delft.

Letters from Constantinople mention, that two grand Councils of the Ministers of the Porte have been lately held, on the subject of a triple alliance between England, the Porte, and another Power. It is said by some that this treaty is already signed; and by others, that the Turkish Ministry continued to manifest no considerable portion of irresolution.

June 25.
We hear that the present deliberations of their High Mightinesses in the Hague, are confined to the new plan of general taxation, proposed by his Excellency the Pensionary.

In the course of a fortnight it is supposed that the barracks for the troops at Zeist, will be in a complete state of readiness.

June 28.
According to the instructions received by the Minister of War of this Republic, the Batavian Army is to be directed in its movements by the Pensionary, when he shall judge such movements necessary.

The plan of a voyage to Madagascar has been unavoidably omitted till our next publication.

September 11.

Arrived, sch'r. Connort, Drummond, 11 days from Charleston; and Francis, Merrill, from Portland.

Philadelphia, September 9.
Arrived, brig Clio, Gamble, 93 days from Trieste, via Malta and Gibraltar.—The Clio sailed from Trieste, June 3; left there brig American, Houston, of Baltimore. Spoke June 4; the U. S. schr. Enterprize, from Ancon's bound to Trieste. June 8, spoke brig Charles, Russel, of Boston, from Naples to Trieste.

Left at Malta, schr. Jane, late captain Allen. The Jane was of and from Boston, bound to Barcelona, being close on the Spanish coast and near her port of destination, they fell in with a Maltese privateer, which from her built, it is supposed, captain Allen mistook for a Tripolitan cruiser, and without waiting till she came up, got his boats out, and rowed ashore, with all his hands.—The Maltese, on coming up and finding the vessel entirely deserted, took possession of her and

brought her into Malta, where she was libelled for salvage.

Alexandria, September 10.
Arrived, brig Sparrow, captain Coleman, 20 days from St. Pierre, Martinique. Was boarded by a French privateer, robbed of most of our provisions.
In lat. 28, 58, long. 71, fell in with the brig Ruby, captain Small from Portland bound to Havana, had broached to in a gale of wind, on the 21st of August, and lost his mainmast and all his spars, sails & rigging; supplied her with a spar, had lost all her deck load and had water in the cabin, nothing but her foremast standing; a few days after fell in with and picked up a quantity of Spars, rigging, &c. supposed to be long to the above vessel.

Norfolk, September 3.
Arrived, schooner Catharine, Shepherd, Webb, from Antigua, via St. Bartholomews, in 20 days. Emily, Welch, was taken and carried into Antigua the 14th of August—she was from this port, and last from Guadaloupe bound to Antigua. August 14, arrived ship —, captain —, last from Guadaloupe, sent in for adjudication, James Rody, supercargo.—Sailed on the 9th August schooner Lavater, captain Lavring, of Alexandria, for St. Thomas's, cargo not sold—August 31, lat. 32, 42, N. long. 71, 30, fell in with the Jamaica fleet, bound for England, out five weeks, amounting to 70 sail of merchantmen, under convoy of the Vanguard of 74 guns, commanded by captain G. Newman; at the same time spoke the brig Rebecca, of Alexandria captain —, from Martinico, bound for Baltimore, out 16 days, and kept company with the said brig up to the Cape of Virginia.

The supercargo of the ship Serpent handed captain Webb the following, with a request to have it published on his arrival at this place:

That the ship Serpent, captain Hayes, and the schooner Suwarrow, captain Frost, both from Baltimore, bound to Martinique and Guadaloupe, were captured on the 27th ult. on their way to Guadaloupe, by the British sloop of war Hippomone, E. Woodcomb, commander, under the lee of Dominico, and off the town of Rosseau, and after putting a prize master and marines on board, ordered them for St. John's, (Antigua) where they arrived, on the 30th ult.—Their trial came on the 11th of August, the schooner and cargo were condemned, only Mr. Bacon's part of the ship's cargo was condemned, the remainder together with the ship, was liberated; the plea for condemnation is, that no British subject at length he may have lived 30 years in America, and be entitled to all the privileges of an American citizen, if he be found trading and supplying the enemies of the British crown with provisions, &c. his property in that case is considered as a good and lawful prize, for they say that no British born subject is allowed to throw off his allegiance to the Crown of Great Britain; and all British subjects, though American citizens, that are found trading with the enemies of England, their property will be condemned to all intents and purposes.
