

By the Union, captain Besse, arrived last evening in 16 days from Nassau, we received from our correspondent, our copy of the Royal Gazette to the 6th inst. and a proof sheet, dated the 10th, which mentions the loss of the brigs Henry and Ann, captain Devoll, from the Havana, bound to New York, and Minerva, captain Brookings, from Havana, bound to Charleston, on Florida, on the 30th ult. The former vessel was lost, and all the cargo, except 37 boxes of sugar--cables, rigging, and sails saved--with the crew. The latter was soon after the accident, fell in with the wreckers and got off, and was hourly expected to arrive at Nassau--crew and cargo saved. The sloop Polly, captain Freeman (belonging to John Hall and William Whiteback, of New York) from thence to Cuba, put into Nassau, in distress, having experienced a hurricane on the 20th of August, in lat. 29, long. 83, which upset the vessel, and obliged them to cut away the mast to fight her.

The sch'r Adeline, captain N. Strong, of and bound from Cavanias to Norfolk, with sugar, on the 29th August, was chased and boarded by his Britannic majesty's ship Bork, and sent into Nassau. It is stated that she had sold her cargo at the Havana, and proceeded to Cavanias for this sugar, and that the captain had gone by land to the Havana to clear out, as coming from the Havana.

AT this stage of the discussion of the bill for the trial of facts in the several counties, it may not be improper, to designate some of the immediate conveniences which will result to Baltimore and of course to Baltimore county, and the other counties in the state, from the adoption of the bill. It will not be contended but that the governor and council, in the organization of the proposed plan, will have an opportunity of selecting characters for the court in the Baltimore district, as ably qualified as the judges of the general court; and having a large range to make such a selection, there is no reason to distrust the executive, but that they will appoint such characters; a court will then be erected and held in Baltimore, at least equal in every respect to the now general court; this will be an immense convenience to the citizens of Baltimore and to Baltimore county. The farmers and tradesmen of Baltimore county and the mechanics, merchants, governors and directors of banks, presidents and directors of insurance companies, and, in fact, every class of industrious citizens, may have the facts in the cases in which they are interested, tried within the city; nor will they, their witnesses, and the jurors, be compelled to be dragged to Annapolis and there continue for days each term, at a great expence, and an immense sacrifice of time. Besides, by the bill, the court of appeals erected under it, is to be held at such times and at such places as the legislature will direct; there can be little doubt that if the bill shall be passed at the next session, but in the detailed bill containing the provisions necessary to carry into effect the constitutional alteration, the place of holding the appellate court, for the Western Shore, will be fixed at Baltimore. It requires no strong powers of reasoning to demonstrate the great convenience the holding this court at Baltimore will be to that city and to Baltimore county, and as a constant intercourse is kept up, between Baltimore and several counties on the Western Shore, it will be a much greater convenience to those counties that this court should be held in Baltimore, than where the now court of Baltimore will then have the great advantage of a court equal to the general court, the court of appeals, the courts of the general government, all held within their limits, and will no longer be compelled, as heretofore, to submit to the inconvenience of being dragged abroad for justice.

PHILO-COUNTRYMAN. The Board of Health of Philadelphia report for 24 hours, ending on Tuesday at 12 o'clock--eighteen cases in Southwark--nine in the city--twelve admissions into the hospital--two deaths--two discharged, cured--fifty-nine patients in the house--twenty convalescents--and twenty-three adults and four children interred. The New-York Board of Health report for Sunday--sixteen cases of fever, and no deaths--In Bellevue hospital for Monday--three admissions--ten convalescents--four discharged, cured--and thirty-one remaining in the house. Deaths in New-York last week--thirty-six men, ten women, eight boys, and twelve girls--total 66. The degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred on his Excellency JOHN LANGDON, governor of New-Hampshire; on the Honorable William Patterson, associate judge of the Supreme Court of the United States; also on the Honorable Stephen R. Bradley, by the University at Dartmouth College.

A HINT. For three days past we have had a moderate gale from the north-west, which has rendered our atmosphere cool and agreeable, and carried off, we trust, much of the noxious effluvia that had rendered our city unhealthy. There can be no doubt that a short period of such weather would operate much towards the restoration of a pure and healthy atmosphere, and by consequence towards the destruction of the prevalent disease. At the last session of the supreme court of the state of New-Jersey, held at Newark, on Friday last, Henry Lawrence, a negro man, was brought to trial for the murder of his wife, by infusing arsenic; latter, which he spread on a slice of bread and gave to her to eat. During his imprisonment he had the hardihood to assert, that he was sorry he could not live long enough to be the death by the same wicked means, to two other persons. The jury, after an impartial hearing of the witnesses, and an excellent charge from the judge, on Saturday brought in a verdict of guilty. He is ordered for execution on the 4th of October next.

A mine has been discovered in Livingston county, on the north-east side of Cumberland river, within fifteen miles of its confluence with the Ohio. The ore seems to abound, as it appears in several places on the surface of the earth, and when opened, projects itself in different directions, in masses of more than three feet diameter--its matrix is a silicious earth, with which the most beautiful lead ore adheres, chiefly composed of pure ore, which it is believed will yield not less than seventy-five per cent. of metal, a part of which is conceived to be silver, as it has a much harder and whiter appearance than simple lead when taken from the ore; the quantity however of lead, simply proportioned to that of the ore, or the proportion of the admixture of the metal, for want of skill and judgment has not been ascertained. The above information has been communicated to us by the proprietor of the mine (Mr. Brown) who resides at Livingston county house, and who wishes to engage a person skilled in the art of assaying and working ore. We have the pleasure of announcing that COLMAN, the German, who broke open the trunk of Gysbert Newkirk and absconded with the whole of the property which he had preserved for his orphan child (as mentioned in this paper yesterday) is apprehended and lodged in Bridewell. The credit of bringing this inhuman miscreant to justice is due to the Board of Health, who very properly interested themselves in the business with the feelings of men and the activity of magistrates. The Theatre has lately received a thorough repair;--regulations are making to preserve order, and render convenient every part of the house. On Tuesday evening last arrived in this town, Captain Bainbridge. The Spotsylvania Troop Cavalry, under the command of Captain Crutchfield, accompanied by the Mayor and a number of citizens and other civil and military officers, met him a few miles from the town; and upon being congratulated on his safe return to his country, and requested in the name of the citizens of Fredericksburg, to partake of a public dinner the next day; he left the stage and proceeded on horseback, with the escort to town, which he reached about 9 o'clock. His arrival was announced by the discharge of 17 guns, under the direction of Captain Parke, and was welcomed by the repeated acclamations of his friends and countrymen. Never have we witnessed on any former occasion such general joy; the streets were crowded and the houses handsomely illuminated. [Fredericksburg paper.]

Extract of a letter from a master of a vessel, to his owners in Portland, dated August 12, 1865. "Grey, residing at Cornua, who has made interest to be appointed deputy American consul there, from many corroborating circumstances, it appears, has entered into an association with the fishermen, to bring all the vessels they can that way, which causes an enormous expence, part of which it is evident he shares. In addition to which he makes unjust charges in his accounts. I therefore wish those who are bound to Antwerp, and are strangers, to be informed not only of the above, but by all means to avoid the east side of Walchun Island, because the channel is difficult and dangerous, and vessels going that way, are subject to several day's quarantine, after which they must proceed to Flushing to enter and obtain a pilot. The Flushing pilots are seldom out, and fishermen are not permitted to board vessels under a heavy penalty, so that should a stranger fall in with any of them, he must either follow them to Cornua, or keep the sea until a proper pilot offers."

Among the numerous victims who have fallen before the power of all subduing death, we recollect none, whose dissolution is more generally and deservedly lamented, than that of Mr. WILLIAM COALE, of the late firm (of Smith and Coale, of this city) who died, after an illness of four days, at Point Petre, in Guadeloupe, on the 3d instant. Whether we consider him as a son, a brother, or a man, we find him entitled to high praise and sincere respect. His memory will be long cherished by those who had the pleasure of his acquaintance, and his irreparable loss to his bereaved family can never be erased from their minds: Yet will they not grieve, as those without hope; but recollecting his strict principles of morality and religion, and the innocent and amiable tenor of his life, look forward, with a mournful pleasure, to their reunion to him in that blessed world, where the pains of separation shall not be felt, or sorrow of any description invade the soul.
