PHILADELPHIA, October 17.
Copy of a letter from capt. Edward Yard,
of schooner Ariadne, of this port, dated
At Sea, in lat. 20, long. 62.
SEPTEMBER 22.
It is with pain I have to inform you,
that on the 17th, we met with the most
tremendous hurricane I ever saw, or any
on board, which blew with such violence
as to leave us on our beam ends, without
an inch of sail, all our top gallant yards
down, top gallant masts launch'd, and the
vessel well prepared to meet a gale.—We
were under the necessity of cutting away
the main mast, and with it went the fore-
top-mast. She then righted, with her
lee gunwale in the water, where she lay
6 or 8 hours. We lost almost every
thing off deck, with all our sails, except
top-gallant and steering sails, and fore-
sail. I have, with much labour and diffi-
culty, got up jury-masts, with all the sail
we could muster on them.—I hope we
shall now be able to reach our intended
port, I write by an Alexandria sch'r capt.
Gilpin, who was so good as to spare us a
small mast to assist us in making sail.

HAMBURGH.
EXTRACTS FROM LETTERS.
"I am enabled to state, on the author-
ity of an officer of high rank, that all
the Danish troops in the territories of
Holstein and Schleswig, have received or-
ders to hold themselves in readiness to
march. A Russian courier having brought
very important dispatches to Copenha-
gen, an express was immediately sent off
by the prince minister to the prince royal,
who was with the princess in the German
part of the Danish dominions, requesting
his immediate return to Copenhagen. Great
movements have been of late ob-
served among the French troops in Han-
over; and it is strongly suspected to be
the Emperor's intention to march an ar-
my into Holstein, and occupy Gluckstadt,
Husum, and Tondern, so as to shut
up every communication with Great Brit-
ain, and even to blockade the Sound from
land side.—This plan of operations, which
is said to have been offered to Bonaparte
by General Schauenburg, has received his
full approbation; but the Court of St. Pe-
tersburgh having been informed of it, the
most positive orders were sent to the Danes
to defend the neutrality and independence
of their territory. The politics of the
Court of Berlin are still undecided, but a
categorical answer has been demanded of
Frederick William, by Alexander I.
"I have just seen a letter from Paris,
received by the last mail, which states that
the greater part of Bonaparte's Council of
State continue to be hostile to the project-
ed expedition against England. Bonaparte
assembled that body previous to his de-
parture for Boulogne, and upon their en-
deavouring to dissuade him from the
attempt he was seized with one of his
usual paroxysms of rage, approaching al-
most to phrensy. He lavished upon his
unfortunate Counsellors a torrent of the
most abusive epithets, and then announced
to them his determination to set off in-
stantly for Boulogne to superintend the
embarkation. The letter describes the
scene which occurred on this occasion, as
exceeding, in point of extravagance, every
previous display of the irascible temper
of the Corsican. He gnashed his teeth,
foamed at the mouth, and actually tore
the cover off the chair on which he was
seated.—The troops in the vicinity of
Boulogne are now stated to exceed 150,000
men. They are formed in three divisions,
which respectively assume the titles of
Army of England, Army of Scotland,
and Army of Ireland.
"Our letters from Holland state, that
couriers arrive almost daily from Bou-
logne at the Helder, with dispatches re-
lative to the expedition fitting out there.
The troops were to be reviewed on the
15th, for the last time previous to their
embarkation. The Grand Pensionary was
expected to attend upon this occa-
sion.
"Intelligence has been received here,
that a Russian fleet of 13 sail of the line
is actually cruising in the Baltic. There
were lately launched at Cronstadt, one 74
gun ship, one 60, and one frigate.—The
military preparations throughout the Rus-
sian dominions continue with unabated
activity. Generals Buxhowden, Kutu-
sow, and Lascy, were lately summoned
to attend a council of war at St. Peters-
burg, at the breaking up of which they
repaired to the frontiers, to superintend
the assembling of the different armies
put under their command.
"According to advices from Vienna of
the 7th inst. the Emperor of Germany, on
the 3d, granted a private audience to the
French ambassador at the town of Baden,
about 15 miles from Vienna. Immediately
after this interview with his imperi-
al majesty, a courier was dispatched to
Paris. He is supposed to be bearer of the
ultimatum of his imperial majesty, on the
subject of his differences with France. It is
rumoured, that Bonaparte has offered to
make some important concessions on the
side of Italy. Austria, however, does not
appear to place much confidence in this
pacific overture. Her troops on the Ital-
ian frontier are receiving daily reinforce-
ments. The garrison of Venice by the
latest accounts, had been increased to
13,000 men, consisting principally of
Hungarians; and the fortifications of St.
Georgio Maggiore were rapidly repairing.
General Strauch has been appointed se-
cond in command in the Tyrol. But,
upon inspecting these warlike appear-
ances on the part of Austria, the French
papers in Germany circulate a report,
that Francis II. is dissatisfied with the

abrupt return of Novoziltzoff, and has
communicated to the Emperor Alexan-
der his wish that some further effort
should be made to mediate a peace be-
tween England and France."
August 29. We are happy to an-
nounce that the French frigate Didon, of
44 guns, and 300 men, has been captured
by the Phoenix frigate, of 36 guns, after a
very gallant action, which lasted for three
hours. The vessels met on the 10th inst.
a little to the westward of the spot where
the action of the 22d ult. between sir Ro-
ber Calder and the combined fleets was
fought.
The greatest praise is due to captain
Baker, and the gallant officers and crew
of the Phoenix, for the very spirited and
gallant manner in which they began and
continued the action, and finally, captured
a vessel superior in weight of metal and
in number of men. The Didon was to-
tally dismantled in the action: she is one
of the largest and finest frigates of her
class in the French service. She sailed
from L'Orient to Martinique in 26 days,
with the intelligence of Lord Nelson hav-
ing passed the straits. After her re-
turn she was dispatched from Ferrol, on
the day the Combined Fleets arrived
there, in search of intelligence respecting
the movement of our fleets.—The follow-
ing official notice of this event was yester-
day transmitted from the Admiralty
to the Master of Lloyd's Coffee house:

Admiralty-office, Aug. 23.
His Majesty's ship Dragon, which
joined the fleet under Admiral Cornwallis
on the 23d inst. reports, that on the 13th
off Cape Ortegal she had fallen in with
his Majesty's ship Phoenix, captain Ba-
ker, having in tow the French frigate Di-
don, of 44 guns, and 300 men, which she
had captured on the 10th, after a severe
action of three hours, in lat. 43, 16, long.
15, 14.
On the 14th, a large fleet of the enemy
was seen in the N. E. having their heads
to the northward and westward; a frigate
from which came near enough to the
Dragon to make out what the Dragon was,
and after speaking with a Danish ship, &
making several signals, returned to her
own fleet, which hauled its wind, and was
not in sight the next morning.
Lloyd's, one o'clock.
The Didon was totally dismantled, and
had about 150 men killed and wounded.
The enemy seen by the Dragon, was,
no doubt, the Combined Fleet. The
prevailing opinion of its being gone to
the Mediterranean, is much shaken by the
above account. The release of the Brest
and Texel fleet, or perhaps Ireland is prob-
ably its object.

Extract of a letter from Bordeaux, dated
Aug. 20, 1805.
"The action is here considered as a
matter of little moment; it appears Cal-
der avoided coming to a second engage-
ment, being too weak. Of the invasion
of England, I believe they are more seri-
ous about it than ever; the news here
two days since was that orders had passed
by the Telegraph for the troops to em-
bark. Bonaparte, Murat, and all these
great folks are now at Boulogne.—Murat
has been appointed I think it is second in
command of the army of England. Per-
sons who are not residents of the depart-
ment, have no permission from the pre-
fects to pass to any parts of the coast
where the expedition is preparing, which
are granted only by the minister of ma-
rine.—The Irish legion is at Brest and
expected to embark every day.
"The news of the hour, on change is,
that Bonaparte is about appointing a re-
gent, and intends commanding the army
which is to invade England in person.
His brother Joseph is supposed to be the
person whom he will appoint regent."
