In Carey's American Museum may be found an elegant communication from the celebrated Doctor Rush, of Philadelphia, wherein that learned and scientific gentleman endeavors to account for the Physical cause of such phenomena, is the only instance, except the present one, that ever occurred in the United States, which was that of a man in Virginia.
