"The Journal of Commerce, of 20th January, (a Paris paper) after giving the heads of the President's Message, makes the following remarks:

"The Message of the president is much longer, but we have given a faithful sketch of it. By its perusal, it must be seen that at the moment when our own fears are dissipated, when the motives for war are gradually disappearing from the continent of Europe, that of North America appears threatened with new convulsions. It is but too certain that ere long, both the interests and policy of the United States, will be in direct opposition to those of the principal powers in Europe."

IMPORTANT.

A letter received in this city from Bordeaux, dated the 17th February, states that the English were liberating all American vessels. [Phil. paper.]

We have seen several letters from London, by the Packet. They mention that no condemnations of American property had been made for many weeks previous. Mr. Munroe was to have had an audience with Mr. Fox on American affairs, the 9th Feb. It was expected, that no further detentions would take place. The New-York and other memorials, on the subject of neutral commerce, had been published there. Much attention had been paid to American reasonings and arguments on the subject: but the rapid blustering which some of the members of congress have indulged themselves in, were only laughed at. City of Baltimore. (BY AUTHORITY.) [No. XVI.] AN ORDINANCE, Giving further time for the City Collector to complete his collections. BE it enacted and ordained, by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That the further time of six months from the first day of January last, be given and allowed the present City Collector for the purpose of completing the collections of all monies due this corporation which should have been collected previously to the first day of February, eighteen hundred & sixty-two. [No. XVII.] AN ORDINANCE, To impose a tax on the real and personal property within the City of Baltimore, and to provide for the collection of the same, for the year eighteen hundred and sixty-three. BE it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That a tax of fifteen mills on the current money of Maryland, shall be and is hereby laid, and imposed upon every hundred pounds worth of property within the City of Baltimore, and in proportion for every greater or less sum at the said property
