March 31.

Arrived, brig Hero, Thompson, 22 days from Port de Paix—coffee—John & James Thompson. Sailed in co. with ship John and James, Langford, for Baltimore, parted with her the 22d inst. in lat. 42, 40, long. 74, all well. Off Hatteras experienced a heavy gale, which obliged her to throw 8 of her guns overboard. Left schooner Conquest, to sail same day for Philadelphia. The schooner Mary Ann, Haynes, from Baltimore, had arrived at Cape Francois.

The Hero was bound to New-York, but springing a leak, stood for this port. The brig Isabella, Craig, 25 days from Jeremie—coffee—Robert & John Oliver. The schooners Nonpareil, Jane, Fanny, and Dolphin, of Baltimore, were at Corraile and expected at Jeremie to take in their cargoes.

Arrived, ship Fair American, Davis, 23 days from New Orleans—sugar and logwood—Wm. Taylor. Left the ship George Washington, Martin, of New-Port, for Liverpool, in 4 days; Palmyra, of Providence, for Nantz, uncertain; brig Vesta, Remington, of Providence, for Liverpool, do; ship Boreal, Bennet, for Tonningen, in 2 days. Off the Florida shore, spoke brig Carmelite, McConnell, of Baltimore, from New Orleans, for Havana.

Also, schooner Linnet, Roberts, 36 days from Montego Bay, (Jam.)—rum and fruit—Fouk & Patrick. Spoke nothing of consequence.

Also, schooner Sampson, Smith, 13 days from Havana—sugars. Sailed in co. with schooner Messenger, for Baltimore, (arrived,) and the ship Alert, for Boston, parted with her off Augustine. In lat. 29, spoke a yellow-sided schooner with a head, from St. Jago for Baltimore.

Also, schooners Enterprise, Crowell, from New-York; Hazard, Garland, from Salem, and two or three coastways.

*New-York, March 29.*

Arrived, ship Eolus, Mather, from Canton, via St. Helena, in 56 days, (where she was embargoed five weeks.) The Eolus sailed from Canton the 13th of July; on the next day experienced a violent gale of wind, and was obliged to put into Bocca Tigris to repair the damage she sustained. Sailed from thence the 11th August in co. with the brig Two Friends, Coffin, for New York. Lost sight of the Two Friends the 16th. The Lardons had become more numerous and bold this session. They took a Portuguese ship on the coast of China, and massacred the crew. Arrived at Malacca Roads the 2d of October, and left there the ship Lancaster, Fothergill, of 64 guns, and three of the company's ships, bound to China, waiting the arrival of Admiral Troubridge, with several ships under his convoy from Pulo Penang. On the 7th passed several large ships, supposed to be the convoy from Pulo Penang. The 12th, was bearded by the British ship Russell, of 74 guns. On account of experiencing bad weather, and being in want of provisions, put into St. Helena the 30th of December, and was embargoed there till the 31st of January. Sailed from thence in co. with ship Montezuma, Ainsly for Philadelphia; Adventure, Morris; Triumphant, Ashton; and bark Two Brothers, Rich, all for Salem; Mary Ann, Folger, for Nantucket, from a whaling voyage, and full cargo of oil; brig Eliza, Chase, Cape of Good Hope. The ship Hope, Sheffield, of N. York. Left the Cape of Good Hope in search of the Crozette Islands, but raised them twice—bound for China—Left the supercargo on an island, and a number of sick. Left at St. Helena, schooner Favorite, Miller, of Boston, for Baltimore the next day; schooner Roger Williams, Stewart, for Providence in 10 days. The English Whaling ship Caledonia, arrived at St. Helena the 16th of January, and informed, that on the 26th May, in lat. 33, 10, S. long. 75, W. she spoke the ship Hiron, of New Haven, bound to Canton, nearly full of skins; and on the 22d October, in lat. 37, 15, S. long. 3, E. ship Endeavor, Page, of Salem. February 28, in lat. 22, 12, long. 58, 4, captain Mather spoke brig Aurora, Ripley, from N. York, for Martinique. March 3, in lat. 24, 7, long. 65, 49, was brought to and examined by the British sloop of war Indian, of 18 guns, captain Austin, 15 days from Bermuda—treated politely. The boarding officer informed, that the day before they boarded the brig Alabaster, 10 days from New York for Jamaica—and that two days before they chased a three masted schooner, which they had been informed was from New York, but could not come up with her, 18th in

lat. 34, long. 71, brig Weltha Ann, Perkins, from New York, for Hispaniola. Captain P. furnished them with some provisions. 16th, in lat. 33, 20, long. 70, schooner Hunter, 38 days from Trinidad for Boston. 20th, in lat. 36, long. 72, 20; brig —, Bradford, 4 days from Rhode Island for Havana. Capt. Samuel B. Edes, late of the ship Myers, of Boston, came passenger in the Echo—Captain E. lost his ship on one of the Crozette Islands, and proceeded to Canton in the Two Friends, captain Coffin.

The ship Draper, of New-Haven, in 31 days from Point Petre, (Guad.) Left, brig Mark & Mary, of New-York, late Robins, who died at Jamaica, brig condemned. Sailed in co. ship —, Cannon, for Wilmington, and a schooner for do. brig Experiment, Backhouse, for Philadelphia, to touch at Havana. The British squadron with the prizes had arrived at Kingston—they were fitting out the Brave and Jupiter and pressing men for them.—Passengers, Captain Smith, late of the schooner Sukey, of Philadelphia, and captain Hillman, late of the schooner Echo, of Baltimore, condemned.

The brig Two Brothers, Clough, in 48 days from St. Pierre's, and 32 days from Antigua. The Two Brothers was detained 6 days at Antigua, where she left the ship Phoenix, of Philadelphia; brig Ann Maria, and schooner Fair Trader, both of New-York, all waiting trial, together with others not recollected. At St. Pierre's, the schooner Prince, Herring, for Salem the 18th February; brig Astrea, of New London, just arrived; brig Reward, Hopkins, of Portsmouth, to sail in 6 days; brig Fair Manhattan, Thompson, of New-York, in 4 days; brig Adventure, Hilliard, of New-York, in 2 months; schooner Dash, of do. uncertain; brig Actress, Tinker, do. do; schooner Martha Washington, Avery, in 10 days; and brig Fair American, Bingle of Norwich, in 10 days for New-York; brig Elizabeth, Bossett, for Newburyport, in 7 days; ship Volunteer, for Philadelphia, in 20 days. March 6, in lat. 22, 10, long. 66, 6, spoke the schooner Friendship, Burton, from Barbadoes, for Norfolk.—March 7, in lat. 33, 12, long. 77, 41, spoke the schooner Venus, of Sag-Harbor, blowing a gale. March 17, in lat. 33, 50, long. 74, 43, spoke the brig Spanish Lady, 16 days from Havana, for Philadelphia.—March 20, in lat. 37, 9, long. 73, the brig Mount Vernon, from Belfast for Norfolk. March 27, off the Hook, spoke the schooner Hiram, Nixon, from Havana for New York.

The ship Louisiana, Peltor, in 8 days from Savannah. The ship Fair American, and brig Hope, sailed the day before for New York. The ships Magistrate, Folgar, and Phoenix, brigs Thomas, Eliza & Mary, Mount Vernon, Ceres, Dean, and Sally, schooners Huldah and Anna, and Lydia, had all arrived from New-York—also, the ship Susan, Gladding, from Providence.

The brig Midas, Pryam, in 35 days from Havana. Came passenger, Kinball, Howes, late master of the brig Linal, which vessel was captured on her passage from Montego Bay, Jamaica, by a French Feluche of one gun and 35 men, off Cape Antonia, in lat. 21, 38, long. 84, 50, and carried into Sesal, near Campeachy, where the vessel was plundered of all her cargo and drove on shore and wrecked. The captain states that two of the men, of the said privateer, were native citizens of the United States, viz. George Chaburn, a native of New-Hampshire, and Adam Grov, of Baltimore. The captain and other officers of the brig were plundered of all their property & wearing apparel, except what they had on, and the men detained on board of the privateer.

The schooner Mary, Gage, in 17 days from Havana. Left, March 11, the ships Aurora, Fairchild, for New-York in 15 days; brigs Eliza, Burger, for do. in 10 or 15 days; schooners Greyhound, Holmes, for Baltimore, in 4 days; Messenger, White, of do. just arrived; sch'r Susan, White, of Baltimore, for New-York, in 10 days; Caty, of New-York, just arrived; Sampson, Smith, for Baltimore, in 10; brigs Orlando, Minns, for Boston, in 3; William King, McDonald, of do. discharging; ship Augusta, Endicott, of and for Salem, loading; brig Rajah, Smith, for New-York, in 10, and about 20 sail, names not recollected.—March 6, in lat. 24, long. 89, spoke the brig Bounty, Small, 24 days from Portland for Havana.

The schooner Seaman, Cropsey, in 40 days from Point Petre. Spoke, February 28th, in lat. 34, 15, long. 73, 41, brig Unanimous, of Kila, 2 days from Wilmington, for Jamaica. March 11, lat. 36, 16, long. 71, 30, schooner General Pinckney, Gracie, 37 days from Saint Jago, for Philadelphia.—21st, spoke sloop Plato, Brooks, who generously supplied us with provisions, for which captain Cropsey returns his most grateful thanks, as well as to other masters who relieved him.—Same day, in lat. 35, 52, long. 76, spoke ship Amphion, Trowbridge, 5 days from Boston, for Charleston. Next day, schooner Greyhound, Holmes, 12 days from Havana for Baltimore.

The schooner Venus, King, in 35 days from New Orleans. Feb. 24, under the lee of Cuba, was boarded by the French privateer Superb, and put on board the Venus, the crew of the brig Comet, Demon, which vessel they had captured on the 14th, on her passage from Lagdra for Baltimore.

The sloop Plato, Brooks, in days from Newbern, March 20, off Hatteras, spoke the schooner Seaman, 33 ds from Guadalupe for New York, in gny distress for provisions—supplied it with beef, bread and peas—her sails blown in pieces, and intended to make to first port.

AN ORDINANCE  
To raise and extend the roof of the Lower Centre-Market

BE it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That Michael Dissenferrer, Baltzer Schaeffer and Joseph Townsend, be, and they are hereby authorized with the approbation of the mayor, to raise the roof of the lower centre-market sufficiently high, or to renew said roof and extend the same over the brick pavements, and finish it in the same manner as that of the upper market—and to negotiate and borrow on loan, a sum not exceeding two thousand five hundred dollars for the said purpose; and that the mayor be, and he is hereby authorized, from time to time, and as often as he may deem it expedient, to pay out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, the whole or any part of the sum borrowed in virtue of this ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE  
Fixing the salary of the Mayor for the ensuing two years.

BE it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That the Mayor be allowed for his services for the ensuing two years for which he shall be appointed, the following annual compensation, to wit: for the first twelve months, the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars, and for the ensuing twelve months thereafter, the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars.
