It is stated in a letter from Washington, addressed to a gentleman of this city, and received by the last night's mail, that a late arrival at Baltimore with London dates down to the 1st March, brings the agreeable intelligence, that the English courts of Admiralty had discontinued the condemnation of our vessels, and that Mr. Moore was in a fair way of adjusting all our differences with G. Britain.

From the SALEM REGISTER.

We have information that the British have taken possession of the Cape of Good Hope. The contest was warm, but the naval strength of Great Britain is irresistible, as the distant colonies of the Dutch have again found, and this colony is again in British power. This colony is of increasing importance, not only on account of the increasing trade of Asia, but in regard to the extending settlements in its neighborhood, and the interest which European take in all the discoveries made in the African Quarter of the Globe. The time was not very distant when all Africa, except upon its shores was unknown to Europeans. The discoveries of Bruce on its north eastern parts, and the many communications from intelligent travellers in its southern regions have extended our knowledge, and leave but the smaller part of this vast continent yet undefined in the geography of our world. We may soon expect to see European settlements in every part of it, and the charitable dispositions towards its natives may encourage the diffusion of that knowledge which will contribute to prevent the great distance between them and European nations. The English who have possession of the richest and best European colony in Africa, have not been inattentive to the more southern parts of Africa. The Bombay Gazette of June last, from Mocha announces the success of Lord Valentia in his navigation of the Red Sea. By our many arrivals from Mocha, we have information of the diligence with which that intelligent nobleman has pursued his enquiries into the navigation of the African side of the Red Sea. By direct information we learn that his lordship's Secretary was on his way to Gondar, and had arrived at Dixon, and was to return, and in the course of the past year to visit with his Lordship Jeddah and Suez. Captain Couch who commands the Panther Cruiser, has furnished a map of the Red Sea, which is said to be entitled to the highest praise.

An interesting memorial and petition has been offered by the President and directors of the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal company. They expatiate upon the known advantages of water conveyance. A ton of Goods, or 40 cubic feet, may be brought 3000 miles from Europe for 9 dollars. But would not be conveyed on good roads more than thirty miles at the same price. The Canal of Trenton to New York in 29 miles by a canal, would prevent a circumnavigation of 300 miles, & the passage is sure in 24 hours. They discover that this is but a part of a general plan. The Dismal Swamp Canal, now in execution, will open a communication with S. Carolina and Georgia. From Albany to Lake Ontario, a communication is nearly open. Another from the Hudson to Lake Champlain, is contemplated which will extend the intended navigation to Quebec. A pass can be opened from Buzzard's Bay to Boston. And thus by a few short passes a communication may be opened free from the danger of the Ocean. In their first report they say that they had fixed the route of the Canal from Welch point on the Elk River, to Christianna Creek, near Mendenhall's Landing. In their second report of June 1865 they say, of the whole extent of the T—, whole length from its commencement at Elk Forge to its junction with the main Canal is above 5 miles, nearly 4 miles have been completed. Their petition represents, that the main canal will not exceed in expense 25,000 dollars, a mile, that at the commencement, the private subscriptions amounted nearly to 400,000 dollars; of which one fourth had been received and expended. Still that a work of such utility should not rest upon private, but public patronage. The subject has evident claims to national attention, which the report says, it is not expedient to grant at this time.

Died, the 9th inst. at his dwelling, at Elk-Ridge, JOSEPH PIERREPOINT, aged 86 years—for many years a preacher amongst the society of Friends.

Died at Shawan, his seat in Baltimore county, on the 5th inst. in the 34th year of his age, James Winchester, Esq. late judge of the Maryland district.

Few pens are competent to portray the character of this distinguished man. As a judge, he was honest and independent, his capacious mind comprehended the whole ground of legal science; he relied not on the trappings of office for respect, but commanded it, by the extent of his knowledge, the correctness of his principles and the urbanity of his manners. His perception was intuitive, his reasoning distinctive and profound, his eloquence animated and irresistible, his imagination brilliant yet chaste, and his memory stored with all the beauties of polite literature. In private life his deportment was unexceptionable, his heart was ever open to the impressions of friendship, and his conduct adorned the whole circle of domestic virtues.

Such, in a few words, was the character of James Winchester, whose death will be deeply deplored by a discerning community; and over whose tomb friendship will mourn with increasing regret.

Her two lower rudder hinges are copper, as are the spikes at her head ends; all her butt bolts and iron spikes are composition covered, so that she is ready for coppering.

The Achilles has been one voyage to the W. Indies, and is, by the captain and mate who sailed in her, supposed to be not only the fastest sailing vessel they ever met with, but one of the best of sea boats, carrying her spars and canvas at least equal, if not superior to any other vessel they have ever seen. When going out, although very deeply laden, she made ten miles an hour close haul on the wind; and returning, although her bottom was very foul, in 23 hours from opposite Cape Charles light-house, directly E. she ran so, as to bring the light house at Sandy Hook, directly W. a distance very considerably beyond 300 miles; including the traxis she made in her course, the average run was between 13 and 14 knots an hour.—Enquire of JOHN BRAZIER, 67, Washington-street, New-York.
