FOREIGN NEWS.
Received by arrivals from England at Bos-
ton and New York.
LONDON, March 10.

The fleet for the West Indies, consisting of
about 150 sail, under convoy of six frigates,
sailed from the Cove of Cork, on the 3d in-
stant.

There was a report, on Saturday evening,
that a new proposition had been made to the
Transport Board, for the Exchange of Prison-
ers. It is obvious, that the Emperor of the
French earnestly desires to obtain the 9,000
seamen, detained in this country. He has no
fewer than twenty seven ships of war, all above
fifty guns, on the stocks, which will be launched
before Midsummer; and it would be a great
thing for him to obtain a corresponding ex-
change for his own ships, which is the exact pro-
portion, as we have about 18,000 French pris-
oners in England, and there are only 7,000
English in France.

Several conferences have taken place be-
tween Mr. Munro, the American Ambassa-
dor, and his Majesty's Ministers, relative to
the matters in dispute between Great Britain
and the United States; and there is every pros-
pect of a speedy and amicable adjustment of
all differences. Twenty five American seamen
were discharged on Friday, at Portsmouth,
from La Ville de Milan frigate, Sir R. Laurie,
lately returned from the Halifax station. An
order, we understand, has been received, to
discharge all American subjects from our ships.

The French and German papers contain sev-
eral vague reports of a negotiation for peace
between England and France, to be opened at
Berlin; but no credit is attached to them.
Count Woronzow arrived in town yesterday.
He is said to be the bearer of important dis-
patches from the Emperor Alexander.

CONQUEST OF NAPLES.
Paris papers to the 26th ult. are only so
far interesting, as they detail the subjugation
of the Neapolitan kingdom, and serve to
develop the ulterior views of Bonaparte,
with regard to that unhappy country.

On the evening of February the 25th,
during the performance of Racine's
tragedy of Athalia, at the Theatre
Francois, which was honored by the pres-
ence of the Emperor, his Majesty re-
ceived dispatches from Italy. At the
conclusion of the act, one of the perform-
ers came forward by order of his majesty,
and announced to the audience that the
French army had entered Naples, and
occupied all the forts of that city, as well
as all the principal fortresses in the king-
dom, and that the Neapolitan army were
prisoners of war.

This communication was received with
an enthusiasm impossible to describe.
The presence of the Emperor, we are told,
excited the shouts of applause to be
incessant, so applicable to his Majesty's
reign was a passage which had just be-
fore been repeated—"Ah quel tems fut
jamais plus fertile en miracles?—What
age was ever more fertile in miracles?
"The French army," says the Moniteur,
"had only to appear and begin the attack,
when the whole country submitted to its
new fate, which will cause it to pass under
the domination of one of the branches of
the Imperial family, who will succeed
the dynasty of the two Sicilies."

Prince Joseph Napoleon's dispatches
to his Majesty, are from the head-quarters
at Capua, and dated the 14th of February,
they announce that his orders have been
fulfilled. He states, that he divided his
army into three bodies, and marched with
the centre division under the command of
Marshal Massena, through San Germano
and Capua, while the right, under Gen-
eral Rognier, went by Terracina and
Gaeta; and the left, consisting of a corps
of Italians, under Gen. Lecchi, proceeded
by way of Itri.

Gen. Rognier, on arriving at Gaeta,
sent to the Prince of Hesse, who com-
manded that place, the following SUM-
MON:
GENERAL—Before I begin the opera-
tions that will put me in possession of
the place you command, I invite you to
reflect on your situation, and the impossi-
bility of your preventing the surrender of
Gaeta to my army. You have but little
means of defence, and no hope of assist-
ance—in a few days I shall reduce you
to extremities. You know that nothing
can oppose the victorious armies of
France, and that in a short time the
kingdom will be conquered, and change
its Masters. To-day I'll grant you a
capitulation with the honors of war. In
the evening I will not accept it: but
will no longer retard the consequences of
my operations. I have the honor to sal-
ute you, &c.
