

credly preserved and firmly strengthened by all civilized nations.

Resolved, That this meeting sympathize warmly with the relatives of the unfortunate John Pierce, murdered, while in the peaceable execution of his duty as seaman, by a shot from the British ship of war Leander, commanded by Henry Whittly; and, as a token of respect to the memory of the deceased, and our detestation of his murderers, it is requested that the American masters of vessels in port do wear their colors half mast, from sun rise to sun set, on Saturday next.

Resolved, That as, from our peculiar situation, and the walk of life in which we are destined to tread, we are more exposed to similar injuries than any other class of our fellow-citizens, we feel that we have a right to the particular attention of our country to defend and protect us: The aegis should be placed before the assailable: That government, notwithstanding our just claims to protection, has beheld us exposed to the alternate buffeting of contending Europe, has beheld our property destroyed, our persons insulted, and our lives jeopardized by foreign and lawless force, without resorting to effectual means to redress our wrongs and ensure our future safety.

Resolved, That the same suffering of injustice or insult is utterly unworthy of an independent nation, and invites to a repetition of such acts, to the entire annihilation of the spirit of patriotism, which should glow with fervor in the breast of every American; that it is derogatory to the glory of our ancestors, who fought and bled for the independence of this our country, and that we shall merit the execration of posterity unless we transmit to them the splendid fame which we have inherited unsullied and without one corroding stain.

Resolved, That the timid councils of a morbid prudence and the treasonable fears of pusillanimous moderation, are in direct opposition to the indignation which every American should feel in his bosom upon the occasion of the late insult offered to the national honor; and that it becomes all parties, and all Americans, to join in one common call for the most ample reparation from offending nations, for wantonly sporting with the lives of our citizens, and for their encroachment upon the sovereignty of the American government.

Resolved, That the American people cherish the people of Great Britain with a becoming and friendly zeal, when rules of justice, propriety, political and civil harmony are preserved by the said people of Great Britain; but that we hold all nations to be Enemies in war—in peace, Friends; and that it behoves the people of the U. States to take high and commanding ground as a great and growing nation, full of resources, and confident in her virtue, generosity and greatness; and, that national honor and private reputation, respectability abroad, and peace and happiness at home, are inseparable, and must ever remain so.

Resolved, That the people of the United States expect from their rulers, protection against the aggressions of any power, whatever be its name, whatever be its force; and, that the confidence of the American people will depend upon the wisdom and integrity, and firm and manly conduct, which the present administration of the union may exert to preserve our country from future aggression.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be published.

We are authorized to state, that Thomas Worrell, Esq. has accepted the appointment of associate judge of the second judicial district of Maryland, having resigned the appointment of clerk of Kent county court.

Affair of Honor.—The Austrian General Nopsitz, has sent a challenge to the Russian Prince Dolgorouky, in consequence of the latter, in his bulletin of the battle of Austerlitz, having asserted that that general did not do his duty. The terms of the challenge are, that the duel shall and only by the death of one of them, and on these conditions, the prince has accepted it.

The Russian forces on the frontiers of Moldavia and Wallachia, have been considerably reinforced by Cossacks from the shores of the Black Sea.

From an Antwerp article current of the 17th March.

By French vessels—sugar, coffee and cocoa direct from the colonies, pay one third less duty of consumption, when re-exported from the Antwerp, are subject to a duty of entry of about 3 1/2 per cent on their value. Pepper pay 67 1/2 francs.

All goods imported in France, must be accompanied by a certificate of the French commercial agent, stating they are the growth of the country from whence they are shipped, or that they do not proceed

from any colonies belonging to Great-Britain.

Duties on tea are levied at 1 50 francs per lb. for such quantities as are not worth above 5 francs per lb, 1 50 francs for all other sorts, and an additional duty of ten per cent above.

Tobacco is sold in entrepot and the buyer pays the duties, which are 100 francs per cwt. when imported in foreign vessels, 90 francs in French vessels with an addition of 10 per cent. It is sold in proportion to the duty which is liable: the duty of fabrication which is 20 francs per cwt. is also paid by the buyer.

Entrepots for tobacco are established in the ports of Ostend, Dunkirk, Havre, Dieppe, Morlaix, Lorient, Nantes, Bordeaux, Cette and Marseilles; to which places its importation is restricted, and from whence it may be re-exported during 18 months after arrival.

All other produce and merchandize in foreign bottoms, not coming under the denomination of prohibited goods, have entrepots for 12 months after arrival, in the ports of Marseilles, Cette, Bayonne, Bordeaux, Rochell., Nantes, Lorient, St. Malo, Cherbourg, Havre, Dunkirk, Ostend, and Antwerp.

All the duties are paid in francs—100 lb. Custom-weight is equal to 112 America.

[FROM AN ENGLISH PAPER]

An inscription for the proposed Monument to Mr Pitt, respectfully dedicated to the Subscribers to his Statue. This Mausoleum entombs, William Pitt, who died January 23, 1806, aged only 47 years. With unprecedented influence, for 22 Years, he was Prime minister of the British Empire. He possessed great Talents and transcendent Eloquence; but his worth may be best estimated by experience and the evidence of facts. He was the Advocate for reform, which did not succeed, the opposer of the slave trade, which increased: the patron of the Irish Catholics who were not emancipated: to England a professed protector, and the avowed Enemy of France.

During his Government the Bulwarks of British Freedom were subverted, the ancient Nobility degraded, the poor additionally depressed and the middling classes of Society annihilated; popular Associations prohibited, and the sources of corruption enlarged. Paper was substituted for Gold, and real opulence transmuted into imaginary wealth—He doubled the prices of provisions, tripled the amount of the poor's rates and taxes, added three hundred millions to the national debt, and sacrificed two hundred thousand Britons in 'Just and necessary wars.' He assisted in the subversion of the balance of power, witnessed the destruction of every ally he obtained—and survived the overthrow of Flanders, Holland, Portugal, Switzerland, Spain, Austria, Italy, and the Germanic Empire. Let nations glory in such friendship! France, during his administration, has risen from "the verge and very gulf of bankruptcy," to wealth; has annihilated her national debt, doubled her population quadrupled her Revenue, and obtained the Empire of the world.

Let nations deprecate such Enmity!—Britons, would you appreciate his character, reflect upon the past, observe the present, and anticipate the future? the committee of Lloyd's Coffee House, the collectors of taxes, the purchasers of Loans, and contractors for the army, &c. the modern nobility, Lord Melville, and Napoleon, Emperor of France enriched, ennobled, protected, and aggrandized, by this friend of the people! this Saviour of Britain! this protector of Europe! this Heaven Born Minister! and this pilot, who weather'd the Storm! erect this memorial indicative of his unequalled merit, of their eternal gratitude and inconsolable Regret.

MOTION OF THE WORLD.

M. BENZENBERG, professor of physics and astronomy at Dusseldorf, has given an account of twenty-eight experiments made with balls well turned and polished, which were caused to fall from a height of 262 French feet. At a medium, they produced five lines deviation towards the east according to the determination of the plumb line, and the theory gives four lines and six-tenths. These experiments were made in the coal-mines of Scheubush and are an additional proof of the rotatory movement of the earth.

The Iron Manufactory at Carron, in Scotland, is the greatest perhaps of the kind in the world. The weekly consumption of coals amounts to 11,000 tons at 4 shillings per ton, and the consumption of each day is equal to that of the city of Edinburgh for a week. As many coals, therefore, are consumed in the Carron Foundry, as would suffice to supply a city of 700,000 inhabitants. One thousand workmen are daily employed in the manufactory, whose wages amount to 7000 a week, and 36,400 per annum.

After having perused these, the evening being far advanced, he impressed the cook named Nathan Wampe, an Indian; [an apprentice to Michael Winslow of Rochester, Massachusetts,] and then suffered Capt. W. to proceed.
