June 24, in lat. 36, 24, long. 71, was boarded by an officer from a small armed ship, with a head and yellow sides, two armed schooners then in company, under British colors. The officer did not ask for the papers of the Fox, nor did he make any enquiries about the cargo, but was very particular in his queries respecting General MIRANDA. When the officer was leaving the Fox, he desired captain Tatem to report that he had been boarded by his majesty's ship Cowpen. From the description of this ship, and other circumstances, captain Tatem believes it was the Leander, with Miranda on board.

Came up from quarantine, the ship Richard, Rogers, from St. Croix. Captain Handford, of the sch'r Citizen, whose arrival was mentioned in our last, in 13 days from St. Thomas, left there, schooner Mariner, Jenny, to sail for New-York in 4 days; sloop Factor, Stow, in 4 days for Philadelphia; brig —, Hutchins, for Portland; schooner —, Bird, for Belfast, in 4 days, and 2 or 3 others. The schooner Robin, Davis, of Baltimore, sailed the 12th of June for the leeward.

A letter from a gentleman at Halifax, dated June 12, to the owners of the ship Herkimer, lately captured off the Hook by the British frigate Leander, says, "the Herkimer arrived here yesterday and lies safely moored under the guns of the captors.—The captain and supercargo have both been examined on the standing interrogatories, and I presume that the ship will be libelled in the course of three or four days.

CHARLESTON, June 21.

Cleared, brig Three Sisters, Neville, Madira and Cape de Verdes; schooner Franklin, Merchant, Barbadoes; sloop Love and Unity, Hi B. Africa.

The French privateer was close in with the bar, yesterday at noon. She boarded every outward bound vessel. The privateers men formed captain Mad-dock of the brig William, that they were waiting for the British Guineaman, now in port, and would wait for them for 9 months! Their crew originally consisted of 120 men, but at present there are not more on board than 60, the rest having been detached on board of prizes.

Captain, Sandre, left at Trinidad, sch'r. Martha Crawley, Tate, to sail for this port in 14 days; schooner Nancy, Hill, for Baltimore on the 8th inst. a brig for Philadelphia in 6 days; schooner Two Sisters, for New Orleans, on the 11th. A brig from Philadelphia had just arrived. The captain of one of the Philadelphia brigs, and the supercargo of the Nancy, had been much burnt by the accidental explosion of some gun powder. Captain S. was boarded 5 leagues off Havana, by the British king's brig Port Mahon, capt. Chambers, who detained him three hours, and broke open all his letters. He was ordered on board the French privateer, off the bar, and in going along side, had the ends of two of his fingers torn off. Several schooners bound in, were to the eastward of the bar yesterday.
