M. by the Iris frigate at 8 by a sloop of war, and at 1 the next morning was boarded by the Indefatigable 40 gun ship. The British line of battle ships were at anchor about five leagues from Oberon light-house, waiting for the Rochefort Squadron to come out. The Rochefort Squadron lay at the Isle of Aix, ready for sea. It consists of the admiral's ship called the Magistrate, 120 guns, 4 line of battle ships, 6 frigates, a sloop of war, and 6 brigs.

**Extract from the brig Mollie's Log book, captain Lee, from St. Pierre's, Martinique, towards Philadelphia.**  
June 7th, ready for sea; an embargo took place on account of the arrival of the French ship Veteran, of 74 guns, captain Jerome Bonaparte, from Cayenne, who had parted from a fleet of six sail of the line, which were hourly expected to arrive at Fort Royal.  
Monday, June 9th—Got under way and stood to sea.  
Thursday, 12th—In Sail Rock Passage Sail Rock in sight, was captured by the British frigate Jason, of 32 guns, captain Cochrane, who took the supercargo, passengers and crew out, and took us in tow and carried us into Tortola, where we arrived on the 15th and anchored on a dangerous reef, where we, after lying a few hours, parted a new 10 inch cable, when I was suffered to go on shore, & had all my letters and papers broken open, and was then permitted to proceed. Also was taken by the aforesaid frigate, a Danish schooner, and the ship Harriet, of Philadelphia, captain Powers, bound to St. Thomas, and within 5 miles of the harbor, was strictly examined, and liberated.

Arrived at New-Castle, bound to Baltimore, the schr. Jane, Odlin, from Cape-Francois.—Left at Port de Paix, schr. John, Wharton, Cox, to sail in 2 days for Philadelphia; schr. Financier, of and for Baltimore, in 10 days; in lat. 23, the Jane was boarded by a British sloop of war, and treated politely.
