

EXPEDITION against SOUTH AMERICA.

Extract of a letter from an officer at St. Helena, dated the 3d of May.—“We are just arrived here, from the Cape of Good Hope, with a large fleet of men of war and transport. Our destination is for the Rio de la Plata, where our first object of attack will be Monte Video, and then Buenos Ayres, which places we expect will make but little resistance.”

ITALY, May 26.
Extract of a private letter from Vienna, June 4.

“Though I cannot absolutely vouch for the authenticity of the following letter, which is circulated privately here, yet I cannot refrain from sending you a copy of it, as it is certainly not unsuitable to the character of the man to whom it is attributed:—

“To the King, fo Bavaria.
“SIR AND BROTHER,
I made you a king, and, from particular esteem and respect for your person, sent you my ministers at war and able counsellors to organize and direct the administration of your states; yet though you have enjoyed these nothing really useful, & I consequently have reason to believe you do not possess the qualities necessary to govern well.—I must therefore advise you to abdicate in favor of your son, of whom I have conceived better hopes. As I wish and expect your acquiescence in this proposal, I shall take care to secure to you a suitable pension.”

LIVERPOOL, July 3.
Saturday's Gazette contains an order in Council for liberating all Papenburgh vessels detained previous to the 14th of May.

The Naval Returns up to this day, state the number of ships in commission, to be—Of the line 122, frigates 15, sloops, &c. 181; gun-brigs, &c. 217, making a total of 730 vessels.—The ordinary comprise 24 ships of the line; 18 repairing for service, and 24 building.

We understand that a presentment has been made to the Grand Jury of Westminster, of a public defaulter, who is charged in the deficiency of 800,000l.

On Wednesday, a foreigner of distinction was charged in execution, in the Exchequer, for 20,000l.

ALBANY, August 14.
Extract of a letter from his excellency gov. Hull, to his friend in this city, dated Detroit, 11th July, 1806.

“I arrived here the 6th June, the territory was in a high state of alarm; they expected an attack by the Indians; they were building blockhouses and stockades for an hundred miles in extent. I immediately sent for the chiefs of the different nations. They came according to my request, and in a few days every thing was explained to their satisfaction. They are perfectly friendly, and every thing is entirely tranquil. The people have returned to their usual employments.”

NOV OR NEVER!
By the brig Peace, arrived here on Sunday in 21 days from Trinidad, accounts are received of Miranda having sailed on the 26th ult. for the Spanish main, in the Alexander, having in company the Lilly, British sloop of war, two brigs, two schooners, launches, &c.

The prospects of the crops of corn, are gloomy; indeed; owing to the long drought. We have scarcely had one rain during the summer; and we have heard of several fields, which will not probably produce one barrel to the acre. Indeed, although we cannot say that famine is staring us in the face, yet there is a prospect of greater scarcity, than before known, in the State.

CAPTURE of the SHIP CONCORD.
The ship Concord, captain Richard Ward, jun. from Salem, direct for Rot-

terdam, was captured June 8, off the start, by one of his Britannic majesty's ships, and sent for Portsmouth. The cause of the capture is, that a part of her cargo was the production of one of the enemies colonies (not enemies property.) We understand that the far greater part of this ship's cargo is Mocha Coffee, imported by the owners, George Crownshield and Sons, of that place, and only about a dozen hogheads of coffee is said to be the produce of Bourbon, in the east Indies, not imported by them. The only cargo had been landed several months in the United States, and the duties paid or secured to be paid in the customary manner, and there is no pretence of enemies property. Rotterdam is not blockaded, being one of the excepted ports in Mr. Fox's proclamation for ships going from neutral countries. The ship and cargo was to be brought to trial at the last dates from England, & the question to be decided is whether the *thes* shall be sanctioned by his Majesty's courts of admiralty, or the stolen goods be restored to the rightful owners. If a dismissal takes place, the least favor to be expected, is that the enormous port charges and admiralty expenses will be thrown upon the claimants. Here is a valuable ship, when prosecuting a lawful voyage, with a cargo confessedly neutral, nineteen twentieths of which was purchased in Arabia, a neutral country, arrested merely for having on board a few hhds. of Coffee, supposed to be the produce of an enemy's colony, destined to the port of another belligerent country. Does the Bourbon Coffee contaminate the rest of the cargo? But the production of enemies colonies can be lawfully imported here, and the contamination is an idle pretext to seize the whole. If the British doctrine is to be thus extended to reach a whole cargo because a part was produced in an enemy's colony, the American commerce will be reduced to a name merely, and the people of the United States will enjoy but the shadow, while the substance is swallowed up. The capture of the Concord is to be considered as nothing when we reflect that this is but one among a hundred equally and perhaps more flagrant violations of our neutral rights by the ships of war of Great Britain. From the port of Salem alone, we note the following British captures and condemnations of our ships during the year past:

The ship Hazard, capt. Bullock, at Jamaica, condemned, ship and cargo worth \$90,000
The brig Liberty, Lambert, at Colombo, in Ceylon, the whole condemned, supposed worth 20,000
Ship Prudent, Ford, from Batavia for Salem, same place, condemned, ship and cargo said to be worth 100,000
Ship Well's cargo at Gibraltar condemned, said to have cost 30,000
Brig Hannah, Ropes, at Halifax, vessel and cargo condemned, 30,000
\$270,000

Besides the ship Henry, Russell, captured in the India seas, carried to Bombay and Ceylon, detained 5 or 6 months, and finally released, the whole charged to a considerable amount, being thrown upon the owners.

The ship George Washington, Daniels, captured on her passage from Calcutta, and carried to England, released, owners paying charges.

The ship Messenger, Buffinton, bound to Europe, detained in England, released, and charges thrown upon the owner.

Several other Salem vessels have been stopped in the course of their voyages, & carried out of their way, and though finally restored, we believe in all cases the charges have been paid by the owners.

The fate of the Concord being uncertain, her case need not be stated.

EUROPE.

France, victorious over all the continental powers of Europe—has made three several overtures for a peace, to England.

England neither rejects nor accepts the terms proposed, but conducts a series of quibbled counter-overtures—and mean while has been seeking to excite movements on the continent, with a view to act upon France by the apprehension of a new coalition.

These new overtures—France affects to believe practicable—while she takes measures by which the very first moment would produce new events—ominous as that of Ulm—decisive of the fate of kings and emperors as that of Austerlitz.

The English prints flatter their readers that Prussia will restore Hanover to the English king: as if Prussia and France, had laid aside their policy—the former its systematic plan of arrondissement; and the latter of cutting off England from influence in continental politics.

The military lies so long expected at Paris, which were to have taken place in the early part of May, were postponed on account of Cataro, & the end of that month—they are again postponed to August—that is, every idea of a general peace is suspended till the end of August.

Meanwhile—the armies of the French in Italy are augmented, and Italian troops transferred to France, and Bonaparte carries into operation with the promptitude and decision of a conqueror, every change which his interest & his policy, suggests—and the flat is obeyed with as much promptitude on the shores of Del-

metia, the Elbe, the Tyber, the Danube,

and the Brablen, as on the banks of the Seine and the Rhone.

Bonaparte appears to have taken up the memorable paradox of that manufacturer of paradoxes, who is himself a living paradox—the patron of Porcupine and of the new Porcupine about to appear at New York.

On that occasion when, as if to make the boastings about an English constitution perfectly ridiculous, a few men out of power and self delegated met, and determined how they would govern England—Windham said—give me a peace like a war rather than a war like a peace.

Bravo! said Fox—then the country is saved—

For they got into power.

Bonaparte, however, conducts his peace, with all the effects to him of a successful war.

And England carries on the war as if she was at peace with France; and at war only with neutral nations.

The English papers continue their virulence and ridiculous selfish pride towards the U.S.—the murder of Pierce is vindicated even upon the grounds of resentment which public indignation expressed at the wanton murder and aggression.

It is well worthy of observation, that the English prints in London deduced from the aspersions cast forth by a paper subservient to British views, the New York Evening Post's argument, to sustain the outrage! This was the means employ by England to produce counter revolution in France; and we have it seems our *clitters*.

Arrived, schr. Messenger, White, 21 days from La Vera Cruz—sugars—Robert & John Oliver. Left no American vessels. July 21, in lat. 20, 1 ng. 95, spoke schooner Matchless, from Baltimore, for Vera Cruz; the schooner Regulator, Richards, sailed in co. for N. Orleans, was embargoed 11 days on account of the sailing of a Spanish frigate for Havana, with cash. Off Cuba, was chased for 6 days by two British frigates, one to windward, the other to leeward, escaped the 6th night by getting under the Florida shore undiscovered. Passed in the bay schooners Adherbal, from N. Orleans, and Greyhound, from Havana.

Philadelphia, August 20.
Vessels left at St. Pierre's, Martinico, the 26 h July:—Brigs Nancy, Huggins, of and for Philadelphia, in 5 or 6 days; *Elixa-Ann, Ruthell, of Baltimore, uncertain*; schooner Chance, Ray, of Philadelphia, uncertain. July 27, spoke the schooner Sally, from Boston, going into Baisterre, Guadeloupe. August 14, 20 leagues east from Cape Henry, spoke a long black brig from Baltimore, bound to St. Jago—was informed her name was the Sally, but being close under her stern, I could perceive her name had been recently chalked over; her mainmast was launched, and no fore-top-gallant-mast up. 18th, spoke ship Thomas Chalkley, going to sea without anchors or cables, having lost them that morning in a squall.
