

this place the present summer, we deem it proper to state, that although Trenton has been more unhealthy this season than for many years past, the mortality has been by no means as great as has been represented at a distance. We know of but three adults that have died, of the prevailing disorders, and we believe not more than six or eight children. The diseases which have prevailed and which do still prevail in some degree, are slow fevers, chills and fevers, and the dysentery—the latter disease is by no means as malignant and prevalent, as it has been for several summers past in other parts of the state.

A Salem paper of the 22d inst. states, that a considerable fleet, in which were five line of battle ships, was seen from the central wharves, going into Boston, or nearly that course—supposed to be the French fleet under command of Jerome Bonaparte.

Circumstances seem still to delay the return of the Tunisian ambassador to his own country. We understand that he has proceeded to Washington, to have an interview with the president or some of the heads of departments.

EFFECTS OF SURPRISE.

An attorney being grievously afflicted with the gout, which had confined him several weeks to his chamber, launched out in all those extravagancies of passion which generally attend that excruciating disorder. His pain was so excessive, that, though at other times he was not addicted to profaneness of speech, he, upon this occasion, exercised his tongue in the most bitter invectives, cursing his legs, and wishing the devil and damnation would rid him of it, rather than suffer him to undergo such torture and pain. A chimney sweeper had been directed to sweep that day to sweep the kitchen chimney; he sent his boy before him, with a message that he would immediately follow: the boy, in order to prepare for his master's coming, got up the chimney to observe the state of it, but in coming down he mistook his course, and came down the chimney of the chamber where the attorney was sitting cursing his gouty leg. To account for this boy's mistake, it must be observed, that both the kitchen and chamber chimneys had the same funnel to convey out the smoke. Hamburg, June 16, 1806.

SIR—The following extraordinary production comes from the pen of major Von Streit, in his Prussian majesty's service, and is addressed to the town clerk of Grassenberg, in the territory of the city of Nuremberg; should you be of opinion it will amuse your readers, you will oblige me by inserting it in your paper. It is faithfully translated from the Allgemeine Zeitung, of Friday, May 23, 1806, No 143; page 571.

I remain sir,
your obedient servant.

MR. TOWN CLERK, I have in compliance with the orders I have received already, verbally informed Mr. Town clerk, which information has been repeated by the commanding officer of the place, that the Prussian troops under my command, are to be treated in the same manner, and are to receive the same allowances with the royal imperial French troops in Nuremberg, but to prevent the possibility of a misunderstanding, I repeat it in writing; that the officers are to be furnished with four hot dishes at dinner, besides soup; and are to have wine both at dinner and supper; and always two hot dishes at supper, besides soup. Each non-commissioned officer and private is to have besides his breakfast, two hot dishes at dinner, besides soup, and two quarts of beer, for supper, one hot dish, besides soup, and two quarts of beer. I take this opportunity to desire that Mr. Town Clerk will observe that the troops under my command will regulate the police of the town with the greatest exactness, and that smoking in the street is forbidden, on pain of such corporal punishment as we shall think fit to inflict, and confiscation of the pipe, and after half past nine, no inhabitant will be permitted to be seen in any inn or ale house; the patrol will look to this, arrest all persons who shall be found out after that hour, who will infallibly be punished with fine and whipping. I expect this order will exactly be obeyed. Mr. Town Clerk will immediately provide me with a pen knife and paper folder, which shall be returned on my departure, he will also take care that we get all the newspapers that are read here. The beer in this house is very bad, and very good is to be had at Kloster Wesener, the town clerk will therefore, have several barrels, filled there, and sent to head quarters, or at least from 20 to 30 pitchers every day—it is just the same with the wine; we had a sort of red wine, which at best was only tolerable, it is just out and care must be taken to provide good wine. My officers were contented with that wine and the table in general, although they had not many dishes as they had a right to demand—Care must be taken to provide a desert at least twice a week, together with three bottles of champagne. To preserve good order and prevent the exorbitant bills of inn keepers, I make known that each officer is to have a bottle of wine at dinner, and the same at supper; there are ten officers, therefore twenty bottles of wine must be furnished daily; if this requisition is not immediately complied with, I shall make Mr. Town Clerk answerable for all the unpleasant consequences.

Arrived ship Fame, from Halifax. Passengers in the Fame—Capt. Church, of the Herkimer, from Lima for N. York, condemned as Spanish property; and captain Double, of the Hope, from New

York for Bordeaux, reserved for further proof.

Left at Halifax, ship Hope, Dyer, from St. Domingo for N. York, reserved for further proof; ship Fatouy Amira, Mix, from Bordeaux for N. York, waiting trial; ship Sally, Poor, of New York, for Baltimore for Amsterdam, waiting trial; brig Brillant, Montserrat, fr. Guadeloupe for Baltimore, waiting further proof; Hope, Doole, from N. York for Bordeaux; brig Jenack, Cowson, from Baltimore for Bordeaux, waiting trial; brig Neptune, Crafts, from Bordeaux for New York, do; schooner Rising Sun, from Martinique for New York, do; schooner Venus, Allen, of Weymouth, from Baltimore for Bordeaux, do.

Vessels acquitted, paying costs, and sailed August 4:—Ship Gold n Age, Nye, from Philadelphia, for Tonnongen; ship Manchester, Bunker, from New York, for Amsterdam; brig Izette, Barnes, from Newport, for do; brig Eliza Haley, Grigson, from Philadelphia, for Nantz; sch'r Venus, Henderson, from Edgington, for New York.

Sloop Eagle, Clark, from Matanzas, for Newport, was to sail August 12.

The following was communicated to us by captain Church, from Halifax:

"The Herkimer was condemned by the court, ship and cargo. They also condemned my adventure, amounting to 4000 dollars. One powerful reason for condemning the adventure, was, that 2440 was in specie, which the captors say they never think of giving up. They have liberated several vessels without trial, making the claimants pay all costs. If they bring them to trial, they are sure to make them pay all costs, should vessel and cargo be cleared.

"The brig Hope, Doole, was brought to trial on the 9th of August. After reading the papers it was agreed between the judge and lawyers, that this vessel should lay over for further proof. The judge said it was a case deeply suspected of fraud; had the counsel for the captors urged it, he was of opinion they were entitled to a decree of condemnation.

"The schooner Fame, M. Ichant, was seized by a revenue cutter, under suspicion that she was going to smuggle. So sanguine were they of having her condemned, that they brought her in and discharged her cargo before trial, without first obtaining permission from the court. This affronted the judge so much, that he cleared the schooner, and arranged to tell, decreed the captors to pay cost.

"On the last court day previous to my leaving Halifax, was brought on for trial, 10 tons of cocoa belonging to a Portuguese gentleman, taken in a Spanish brig, from Caracas for Cadiz. The counsel for the captors plead that the cocoa was from an enemy's colony, going to the mother country of that enemy's under an enemy's flag, and of course was subjected to condemnation. The judge, in making up his decree, said, that from the partial friendship existing between the Portuguese government and that of Great Britain decreed this property to be restored.

"This is the conduct of what they are pleased to call their just judge at Halifax. All the principle people say, there is no use in appealing from judge Croke's decisions, for in no case, say they, have his judgments been reversed. He is an independent man, they add, not to be influenced by any one—and above bribery, as he receives £2000 per annum."

FLEETS.

Four large ships of war were seen near Cape Breton, on the 30th of July, standing to the northward, close hauled, with the wind at east. These could not be part of Jerome's squadron; but were probably British vessels.

On the 26th of July, lat. 43, lon. 57, A. WARREN dispatched the brig Scorpion to Newfoundland, to apprise the officers there, that the French fleet had left the Leeward Islands, and were steering northeasterly.

On the 10th of Aug. in lat. 37, 30, lon. 64, 30, a squadron was seen proceeding to the eastward. It is probable this is the French fleet which was off New-York on the 1st inst. They proceeded to the eastward slowly. Ad. WARREN, was far to the northward and eastward of them unless he obtained information, and changed his course.

Jamaica Fleet—July 30, lat. 41, 55, lon. 55, the Jamaica homeward bound fleet, of 178 ships, was met.

Philadelphia, August 27

Extract of a letter from our correspondent dated, Lazaretto, Aug. 26.

"This morning arrived brig Cyrus, captain Smith, 15 days from the Havana.

"Schooner Jefferson, Goff, 15 days from Havana. Captain G. left at Havana, August 11, brig Experiment, Buchus, to sail in 6 days; the sloop Mary and Hannah, uncertain, and the brig Ceres, Shepherd, for New York, in 11 days.

Schooner Fair American, Berry, 25 days from Cayenne. Left there brig Clio, to sail in ten days for Philadelphia. Captain Berry informs me that in lat. 23, lon. 58, the sloop Phoenix, Newbold, of Bermuda and Grenada, bound from Barbadoes for St. Johns Newfoundland, was captured by a Letter of Marque schooner from Guadeloupe for Cayenne. On the 15 of August, lat. 25, 30, long. 66, capt. H. spoke schooner John Granger, from St. Martins, for Providence, R. I., out 5 days, and on the 17th, in lat. 29, 44, long 68, 7, spoke the brig Nancy, Hugbins, from Martinico for Philadelphia, out 9 days.

The schooner Americanus, Parker, 20 days from Curacao. The schooner Thomas arrived 15 days before captain P. sailed.

Schooner Chance, Ray, 24 days from Martinico. Thirty miles to the southward of Cape Henlopen, captain R. spoke a brig from New Castle on Tynes, bound to the Cape peak Bay out 6 months, and who had on the 4th of July, arrived away his main mast—the ship Prosperity, Burk, 6 weeks from Isle M.

Two pieces, one styled Democratic Republic, the other W— shall appear to-morrow.
