Boston-Refretary.

The appearance of the weather, had for some days past, indicated a storm, which came on Saturday last, attended with heavy rain. The wind thro' the day was from South to East. In the night it got more to the Northward; and from midnight until about three in the morning, the wind blew with great violence, from North to North West, after which it abated. It was fortunate that the violence of the gale was of so short duration, for had it continued it must have done great damage.

We are happy to learn, that less damage has been sustained than was apprehended. The ship Atlantic, and brig Martha Bland, were driven from their moorings in Hampton Roads, and were on shore, the former is already off, and the latter will be got off without any damage. Several vessels in the harbour, were drove from their moorings and fasts, but have not sustained any material damage.

Several new buildings were partly blown down, and other wise much injured.

From the coast we have not heard, and as the more violent part of the gale was off shore, it is hoped that little or no damage will be sustained.

This gale will occasion considerable damage in the country, particularly to the corn, which must be blown down. Norfolk Ledger

Extract of a letter from the Isle of France, dated May 21.

"It is well that the American merchants should be informed that the expenses of entering an clearing port charges and office fees at the Isle of France, are increased nearly fourfold. A ship of 300 tons cannot stop there for water under an expence of from 800 to 1000 dollars, and are very often detained from embargoes or dilatoriness in the officers in clearing them out; Indeed for some time past trade meets with every kind of impediment, and a complete military government is established. It would be preferable for vessels to water at Rourigues or Bourbon.

"Markets are stocked for at least 15 months with every article of consumption, and the American vessels have been making wretched voyages for these 12 months past.

"There is a great stagnation in business, owing to the British keeping up a constant cruizer off the Island, and preventing the small French vessels from trading to Bourbon, Madagascar, and the coast of Africa.

"Three successive gales of wind have nearly ruined the crops, and much produce cannot be expected for two years to come."

Copy of a letter addressed to commodore RODGERS, by the officers of the American squadron in the Mediterranean, previous to their departure for the United States.

SIR, We are about to depart for America: Before our separation, receive from us the assurance of our high respect for you as a commander, and sincere esteem as a man. The example afforded to us, as regards the service, and the favors granted us from your politeness and humanity, have conferred obligations which we thus delight to acknowledge, and which we hope will always be remembered with grateful emotion. You, sir, are also about to return home: We pray that you may be received with the distinction so justly due to your valor and patriotism, and that a pleasant passage may hasten you to this happiness.

Some time previous to sailing the communication with Curraoa and the Main was stopped.
