

secure some timber that had floated from shore.

Several negro houses on the plantation of Thomas Hessel, Esq. Waccamaw, destroyed, and part of his dwelling house and barn also, but providentially no lives were lost, although there were five negroes in one of the houses at the time it fell. Young Mr. Christopher Hæzell was the principal sufferer, for, in retreating from the barn, a board torn therefrom by the violence of the wind, in its progress, struck him on the side of the head, but fortunately glancing, only deprived him of sensation for a short time.

A barn and chair shed belonging to John Simons, Esq. were blown down, and in their fall destroyed the bodies of a carriage and chair.

The sloop Industry, Williams, of Philadelphia, was blown on shore high and dry, but has since been got off.

The pilot boat is driven on shore, and considerably injured.

Several other vessels, state, boats, &c. suffered in the gale.

It is conjectured by some gentlemen who visited North Island since the gale, that a vessel has been lost in it, as the beach was strewn with coffee which appeared to be new, and was supposed could be used had it been wet with fresh water only—likewise some pieces of a wreck, a samarra's clothes bag, and several coffee bags, generally sound.

The crops of cotton and corn are in a great measure destroyed, and the losses sustained by the rice planters are incalculable.

From HALIFAX, Aug. 13.

"Captain Whiby of the Leander, was sometime since succeeded in the command of that ship by captain Humphry, from England. The Leander sails for England between this date and the 24th inst. Captain W. goes passenger in her, and a strict enquiry is to be made into the unfortunate occurrence off New York. He is permitted to take home, such officers as he may think necessary to bring forward in his defence.

"In His Majesty's instructions to six officers, captains, &c. &c. dated on the 29th of May last, I find the following paragraph:

"Representations having been made, that Neutral Ships are frequently detained upon frivolous grounds, you are hereby further requested and directed not to interrupt any ships under neutral flags engaged in trade not prohibited by law, except upon proof, or strong ground of presumption, that the ship or the goods belong to His Majesty's enemies, and you are particularly to bear in mind, that neutral vessels, conveying cargoes between this country [England] and the ports of the enemy, carry with them a strong presumption, that the property is either on British or neutral account, and engaged in a legal trade: His Majesty having, in consideration of the present state of commerce, been pleased to allow that trade to be carried on by British and neutral subjects—it is therefore proper that such trade should suffer as little interruption as possible.

Boston, September 10.

The Montezuma, captain Jarvis, from Rotterdam, came to anchor off the Fort; we could not learn how long she had been out, but presume she is a few days later than before received from that quarter, as she was lying at Helvoet, at the time the Washington sailed, arrived here on Saturday.

The brig Nereid, from Rotterdam, 50 days, and two brigs, and one schooner from quarantine, were beating up at sunset.

Captain Tripp, from Grenada, arrived at quarantine, informs, that on the 21st August, in lat. 26. 19, long. 66. 50, seeing a ship dismasted, with shears up to set a topmast, with English colors hoisted half-mast, he bore down for her, while another schooner to leeward hauled up for her. She proved to be a French 84, having 700 men on board. The Frenchman ordered captain T. to send his boat on board, which he did; and was surprised soon after to see it return full of men armed, who brought a tow line on board, and made it fast to his main-mast. Captain T. told them it would tear his vessel to pieces; but he was not heeded. The other vessel, which was commanded by captain Grazier, of Boston, then came up, having two officers and five Frenchmen on board. They stood W. S. W. and came very nigh getting afloat of the man of war, and would have, had not captain T. cut the hawser. Captain T's sails were torn in pieces, and the Frenchman, consisting of a Lieutenant, a Midshipman, and six men, took command of the vessel; and mistaking he intended making a push, hoist about for the ship. The captains of the schooners went on board the ship to find out where they intended going; but could obtain no intelligence; only they wanted to keep the ships head to the W. They had about sixty fathoms cable stuck out of the wardroom, astern, but nobody tended it, to steer the ship; they had got up a main and fore spar masts, but two thirds of the men were lying between decks. One of the crew who could speak English, told captain T. they were going to make sail, and take him in tow, hand his sails, and steer by him; and that if they could not do any thing with the ship, they were coming all on board the two vessels, which could not hold them with swept holds. Captain T. then returned to his vessel, amused the Lieutenant, and made preparations for retaking his vessel, and pursuing his voyage. Four of the Frenchmen were put down the hold, and captain T. taking command of the quarter deck drove the officer below. In the contest captain T's mate was pulled nearly half way down the hold by the Frenchmen; but his men hauled him back, fastened the hatches down, hoisted out the long boat, drove them into it singly, let them go for the ship, and then made sail to get out of gun-shot.

The above ship was Ad. Villamez flag ship, La Foudroyant.

The ship Jane, Bliss, of Philadelphia for Bristol; the Ocean, Gardner, of Baltimore, for Liverpool; the brig William King, of and for Bath; and Lottery, Coffin, of and for Baltimore, sailed 3 days before the Bingham. Captain Barden, the Jane & Orizimbo, on the 30th July, off the Lazaretto, and he saw the Lovely Nan on the 28th July back of the Goodwin Sands.

Left the Navigator, captain Watts, of and for New York, to sail in 5 days. July 29, in the British Chinnel, spoke ship Susan, of Providence, from Plymouth to Amsterdam. August 4, also in the Channel spoke the Aurora, of Portsmouth fr. Plymouth to London, and on the 31st of August in lat. 44, 53, long. 52, spoke the ship Susan Eliza, from Riga, for Boston, out 35 days.

Extract of a letter from our correspondent dated Lazaretto, September 13.

"This morning arrived, the brig Clarissa, Quandrill, 40 days from the Bay of Honduras. The brig Nancy, Williams, 21 days from St. Kitts. And the schr. Hope and Polly, Rogers, 27 days from Trinidad.

Captain Williams, of the brig Nancy, left St. Kitts, on the 21st August, arrived at the Lazaretto on the 13th September. Two days before captain W. sailed from St. Kitts, the brig Osiris, of New York, from Martinique, bound to New York, was brought in by a British man of war for adjudication, and while in their possession, blown ashore in a gale from the south and bilged, the vessel and greatest part of the cargo will be lost—she was loaded with sugar, cotton and coffee.

On the 29th August, lat. 27, N. long. 68, W. saw a very large long boat full of water. On the 2d September we had a very severe gale of wind from S. E. to S. W. which laid us on our beam ends, shifted some of our cargo and the sea washed the boat from our stern. On the 5th September, lat. 34, 20, N. long. 73, 50, W. spoke the brig Susan from Turks Island, bound to New London, on 7 days; all well. At the same time, spoke the schr. James, from Baltimore, bound to Charleston, out 4 days, all well.

On the 10th of September off the Capes of Virginia, in 20 fathom water, picked up a gang of 120 men, full of fresh water, painted red, and the letters R. I. B. painted on one head. Same day picked up two pieces of some ship's top-mast; and the same day, the Capes of Virginia bearing W. S. W. distant fifty miles, saw a schooner under jury masts, she had bright sides, a head, white bottom, and blue counter—the wind coming suddenly at N. E. and blowing fresh, we observed him bear away for Virginia, the same wind continuing 24 hours, I have no doubt but he got safe in, she appeared like a Philadelphia built schooner.

11th September, Chingoteague bearing N. N. W. distant 30 miles, saw a wreck, she appeared to be a schr. about 90 or 100 tons, no masts or bowsprits standing, no name on the upper part of her stern, she had yellow sides, brimstone bottom, no head and deep waist, painted yellow all round the inside, she was full of water and her hatches off.
