We learn that she had been dismasted, and shattered so much in the late gale, as to render her unable to make defence. She was taken by an English 74.

Captain Sampson, of the brig Thomas, arrived at Boston, from St. Petersburg, was boarded on the 14th Aug. in lat. 46, 31, long. 37, from a French man of war, called the Victory, [the Vesteran] commanded by Jerome Bonaparte.

LATEST NEWS FROM FRANCE. The Honor of the New York Gazette have received by the schr. Atlantic, from Nantz, Paris papers to the 29th of July. Their contents are interesting. See the Translations below.

It appears certain, however, that a separate peace was signed on the 20th of July, between Austria and France.—The terms are not published.

The Fortress of Gaeta surrendered on the 18th of July, after sustaining a continual fire of eleven days with open trenches, during which time 300,000 pounds of powder was consumed by the besiegers.

We have seen a letter from Nantz of the first of August, which states, that it was reported, that the Preliminaries of Peace between Great Britain and France, was signed at Paris on the 26th of July.—The writer says, this wants confirmation.

The same letter says, "Last evening's mail brought news from Paris, authorizing the free exportation of grain to any port or ports, by neutrals."—This shows a pacific disposition towards England.

TRANSLATION. PARIS, July 22.

The Jesuits have been ordered to quit the city of Naples in 24 hours, and the kingdom as soon as possible. It is supposed they will return to Russia, the rules of their order not permitting them to settle in any of the Catholic states, not even in those of the Holy Father.

23d.—A courier from Britain has trod closely in the steps of the secretary to the Russian ambassador, who arrived at Calais on the 18th, with dispatches for M. Oubril; the former arrived on the 19th, and immediately proceeded for Paris. The smallest appearance of a reconciliation, receives the wishes and hope of the friends of peace and of humanity.

24th. The minister of Marine has written a circular to the different ports, announcing the signing of the PEACE between France and Russia, and ordered that all Admirals, &c. and commandants of ports, to treat the Russian vessels as friends.

The Fete announced for August is put off till September, to give time for the Grand Army to be present.

It is said, that on the 15th of this month, the discussions which have been carrying on for the arrangements of the affairs of Germany, are terminated; and that the ministers of the Kings of Bavaria and Wurttemberg, of the Elector of Baden, and Landgrave of Hesse Darmstadt, the Duke of Cleves and Berg, the Princes of the House of Nassau, &c. &c. have concluded a treaty of alliance and reciprocal guarantee, under the title of Federation of the Rhine.

The Federation is to be under the protection of FRANCE—that they will have on foot 60,000 men; and the Elector of Baden, the Landgrave of Darmstadt, and the Duke of Cleves, will take the title of Grand Dukes.

The Jewish deputies assemble for the first time on Saturday next in the ancient chapel of St. John, which has been pre-

pared for the occasion. The Kingdom of Italy will send 16 deputies.

26th. The movement of the troops from the interior, towards Germany, has been suspended, in consequence of the Peace with Russia. In a few hours after its signature, M. Oubril set off for St. Petersburg in haste, having first taken a hotel for the new Russian Ambassador. It is thought the ratifications will be exchanged in a month.

28th. It is believed, that Lord Yarmouth, lately arrived from England, will soon appear in public character.

FROM A LONDON PAPER. Public office, Marlborough-street SINGULAR DREAM.

A man was yesterday charged at this office with burglary, in the house of Mr. Neptune, the Nag's Head, Oxford-street, when the following singular evidence was given.

Mr. Neptune stated that yesterday morning, he dreamt two thieves had broken open his house, and entered the bar, the door of which they had propped open with a stick used by himself for that purpose, and were carrying off the liquors. The anxiety of the dream awoke him, he went to listen on the stairs, but every thing appeared quiet. He however, satisfied himself by going down stairs, when the vision was realized—a thief had broken into the house through a back window, and was carrying off the spirits from the bar, the door of which was kept open by the identical stick to which we before alluded. The robber had conveyed a quantity of spirits from the house to an adjoining yard, and he returned for more, when he was secured by Mr. Neptune. The person of the prisoner was identified by a watchman and the prosecutor, and he was fully committed for trial.

From the LITCHFIELD WITNESS. Power of Truth.—It is now very well ascertained that John Allen, esq. of this place has absolutely seceded from federalism—and we are happy to add, from indisputable authority, that Judge Sedgwick, of Stockbridge, late speaker of the national house of representatives, and senator in congress, has followed the example.

The mode of burying Lawyers in London.—A gentleman in the country who had just buried a rich relation, who was a Lawyer, complained to Foote, the Dramatist, of the very great expence attending a country funeral, in carriages, hatbands, scarves, &c. Foote very gravely asked him, whether they were at any expence to bury Lawyers? Yes to be sure we are, replies the gentleman. Oh, says Foote, we never do this in London. How then, says the other, do you manage with your Lawyers? Why, answers Foote, when a Lawyer dies, we lay him out in an upper chamber overnight by himself, lock the door, throw open the windows, and in the morning he is entirely off, and cannot be found by his nearest relations, even if they were disposed to bury him. Indeed, said the gentleman in amazement, what becomes of him? Why, says Foote, we cannot tell, not being acquainted with supernatural causes—all we know of the matter is, that there is a strong smell of brimstone in the chamber the next morning—where the Lawyer is gone the Devil knows.

New-York, September 17.

ARRIVED. The brig Olive, Crowell, in 13 days from Savannah. Passengers, captain Simmons, of the British ship Herculan, (one of the Jamaica fleet,) who with 27 of the crew, were taken from their boat at sea, by a sloop from Bermuda, the ship having foundered. 3 of the crew were lost with the ship. Sailed in co. brig Luna, Starr, for New York—but was left aground on the Cockspar.—The brig Hope, was to sail in 4 days for New York. A schooner from New York arrived two days before capt. Crowell sailed.

The ship Citizen, Allen, (mentioned yesterday) in 18 days from Havana. Left, brig Rajah, Smith, for New York, in 10 days; brig Adeline, Wickham, in 5 for do. The brig John, of Providence, R. I. from Africa, with slaves, was captured near the Moro by a French privateer, and sent into Havanna. In lat. 34, long. 74, spoke ship Helena, from Norfolk, for Cape of Good Hope—had sprung a-leak in the gale of the 2d inst. and was bearing away for Charleston. 40 miles east of Cape Henry, spoke ship United States, 4 days from City Point, for London. Saw 4 American brig going into Havanna. The Citizen was dismasted on the 2d inst. in the gale.

The schooner Atlantic, Howard, of New London, 87 days from Nantz. Left,

6th August, ship Amiable Malilda, Williams, from Norfolk via L'Orient, having put back after being out 18 or 20 days, bound to Norfolk, Independence, Ingraham, from Charleston; Frederick, Moore, do. detained at the mouth of the river; Mississippi, Skidmore, New York; Wm. Penn, Philadelphia; Passenger, Boston; Pehelope, Jappie, New York; Baltic, 36 days from New York, at quarantine; brig Aurora, Ruckles, Philadelphia, to sail in 20 days; Betsey, Maddox, New York, in 15; Jemima and Fanny, New Orleans; and Henry, Spoke, long. 66, sch'r Rolla, 6 days from Boston for Martinique. The sloop Alois, Graves, in 9 days from Charleston. A schooner sailed in co. for New York. The Semiramis was to sail next day for New York. Passengers, part of the crew of the brig Lucinda of Newport, the loss of which vessel we have before noticed. The captain and remainder of the crew were to come in the Semiramis.

The sloop Astrea, Prior, from Richmond. The schooner Virginia, Phillips, in 4 days from Fredericksburgh. The schooner Ann & Elizabeth, James, in 4 days from Fredericksburgh. The schooner Harmony, Lockman, from Baltimore, and 4 days from the Capes. Arrived, schooners Virginia, Phillips, Fredericksburgh; Ann & Elizabeth, James, do.; Harmony, Lockman, Baltimore; sloop Albion, Graves, Charleston; Astrea, Prior, Richmond. Below last night, the ship Delaware, Farrier, in a short passage from Amsterdam.

Philadelphia, Sept. 18. Cleared, schooner Mary, Edwards, Boston; Philip, Cottrel, Charleston. Captain Maffit, from Cape Francois, the 29th of August, in lat. 27 44, spoke the brig Charming Nancy, Davis, of and from Gloucester, for Havana, out 18 days, all well. September 3, off Matanzas, captain Maffit had a very hard gale of wind, which threw him on his beam end, broke his main boom and obliged him to cut away his mainmast, and the same day about 6 P. M. about 40 leagues to the southward of Cape Henry, spoke the ship Eliza, from Norfolk for Bordeaux. On the 5th of September, lat. 36, 14, long. 15, spoke schooner Andrew Myers, from Wilmington to St. Thomas, out 48 hours.
