

Bonaparte, king of Holland, had been assassinated.

CHARLESTON, Sept. 13. The ship Halcyon, driven ashore on the 23d ult. on James Island, was got off on Wednesday evening and has come to town.

Captain King informs us, that while lying in Ocracoke harbor on Monday, the 1st inst. he experienced a most tremendous gale or hurricane. The wind blew with dreadful violence from N. W. and continued about eight hours—upwards of 20 sail of brigs, schrs. and sloops were driven ashore, upset, or carried away their masts. While Captain King was in the act of cutting away his mast, he was ran foul by a New-York brig, his bowsprit carried away, and his upper works much injured, that, supposing the sloop would sink, himself and crew sought their safety by getting on board the brig. A poor crippled negro boy, who could not follow their example, was alone left on board the sloop. In this dreadful situation this faithful creature applied himself to the pumps, and actually kept the vessel free until Captain King returned on board after the gale had subsided. The brig was totally dismasted.

Capt. King did not learn to a certainty whether any lives were lost. It was reported that a schooner had been driven out to sea in such a wrecked situation, that it was feared she would founder. It was also said that a boat's crew were drowned in attempting to get on shore.

On Wednesday last, Capt. Pearce fell in with the hull of a wrecked brig of about 200 tons burthen—bright sides—head broke off—had been loaded with corn, and apparently had a number of passengers on board as considerable quantities of wearing apparel were floating about. She was totally dismasted. Two days before, picked up the topmast and foresail of a ship.

We are requested to state that a meeting of Republican citizens of Baltimore will be held at Mr. Fulton's Globe Inn, THIS-EVENING the 25th inst. for the purpose of fixing upon some eligible person to represent this city in the congress of the United States.

By request, we have given the foregoing notice, although we are not prepared to believe that the meeting proposed can effect any great or good purpose: it would seem improbable, and almost impossible that such an assemblage of our republican citizens should convene as to be adequate to declare the unanimous wishes of the whole: it must be evident, that in such a promiscuous meeting as must necessarily take place, a number of hostile or clashing interests will almost preclude the chance of giving decision or force to any nomination which can be made. If meetings are to be resorted to, to strengthen the republican efforts, let them be conducted on a plan embracing something more of system and practicability.

If the friends of the proposed meeting, have in view, the support and defence of political principle, they could see the accomplishment of the laudable purpose with much more ease and certainty, by the appointment of a regular number of conferees in ward meetings:—if this were done, & we were disposed to adhere to principle more than men, without a sacrifice of our right of suffrage, the great body of our republican fellow citizens could, and no doubt would, support the ticket, which a majority of the congregated conferees might determine on. We find this mode has been adopted, with success, in some of the counties of this state, and in many other quarters of the union.

The successor of Yrujo is said to be already arrived in the United States. Yrujo has been engaged in the construction of machinery for mills for grinding of grain in Spain; the mills are to be wrought by steam—the steam engines are made or to be made in England, and the mill work here; the work is carrying on near Schuylkill not far from the basin of the city aqueducts—and appears to be not nearly finished.

Mr. Prescott. I am highly gratified to observe that our former worthy representatives to congress, are nominated anew, and that they have consented to stand as candidates. Mr. Moore and Mr. MacCreery are both men of worth and of understanding; and are sound republicans. I presume, Mr. MacCreery's residence in the city is such as comes within the meaning of the Act of Assembly, which requires that one of the representatives of this district should belong to Baltimore City. If he be not such a resident, I contend that the provision in the Act of Assembly, which makes such residence a necessary qualification for a national representative, is contrary to the Federal constitution. That great instrument has enumerated certain qualifications for members of the House of Representatives.—They are contained in Article 1st, Sec. 2d, second paragraph, as follows: "No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen." If a candidate be returned, possessed of the above qualifications, he is entitled to his seat in conformity with the constitution. For, according to the rule of fair, legal construction, the enumeration of certain requisites excludes the necessity of any additional ones. The Maryland Legislature might with equal propriety have provided that candidates should be thirty years of age, or that they should have been ten years citizens of the U. States. The Federal Constitution does indeed leave to the State Legislatures, in the 4th sect. of the 1st article, the province of prescribing "the times, places & manner of holding elections;" but this power cannot, by the most forced construction, be extended to the right of requiring any additional qualifications for members to the House of Representatives. Had the Maryland Legislature adverted to the provisions in the National Constitution, I am persuaded it would have been silent on the subject of residence; except so far as to have required the candidates to be citizens of this state. It is certainly desirable that members should belong to that section of the state, from which they are sent; and it will commonly happen that such will be fixed upon as candidates. In this respect Mr. MacCreery is not objectionable, as he is intimately connected with this city, and very generally known by its inhabitants.

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I take the liberty of nominating our former councilmen, Baltzer Shaffer and John Shrim, as worthy to be elected again as members of the First Branch of the City Council, for the Fifth Ward. Also, the former Elector, Robert Gorsuch, as Elector of the Mayor and Second Branch, for the Fifth Ward.

When the vagaries of fancy and the dreams of imagination, and which haunt this editor and fill the columns of his paper, are received by an intelligent community as facts, then the assertion of Mr. Brown may be able to work the malignant effect it was intended to produce; but so long as he maintains that station in the intellectual world which God and nature have assigned to him, there is no danger of his passing for a prophet or enjoying the reputation of inspiration.—It is not true that the candidate thus basely slandered, was ever dismissed from the bench by a republican legislature. The truth is that when the whole judicial system was abolished and a new constitution of judicial magistracy erected upon its ruins, one of the candidates who was upon the bench under the old order of things, was not continued.—But to say that he was dismissed is a wanton and malignant falsehood, which nothing could dictate, but the most envenomed hostility, and shameless disregard of truth.—The entire system was dismissed, and those who held appointments under it, were of course removed.—But it is confidently asserted that with every liberal and sensible mind, this circumstance will not operate to their discredit, and that a discerning public will not suffer it to be used as a weapon to the destruction of their interests.
